

Privacy & Security Policy of The Agra Treasurers' Web Site

Our privacy policy is based on two things: *indigence* and *incompetence*.

—INDIGENCE—

A WEB SITE is analogous in many respects to rented real estate: a house, apartment, or building. One rents the site from a landlord, or “host.” We at THE AGRA TREASURERS rent our Web site from a host called, rather whimsically, “Go Daddy®”. The more monthly “rent” we pay, the more perquisites we receive. Since we choose to pay the minimum rent (in keeping with our philosophy of holding costs down), we receive few perquisites.
