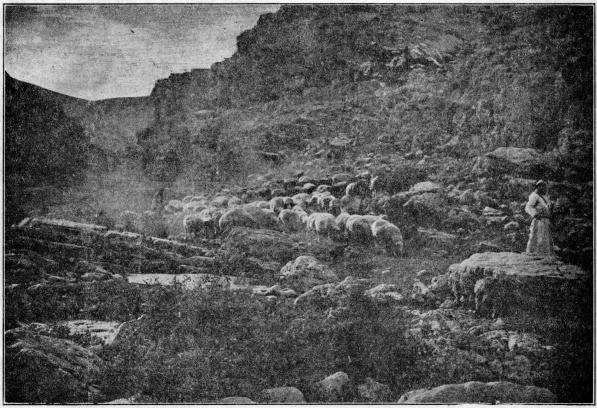

The Prodigal Son.

The prodigal son is the wise son. He was called the wise son by the early Christians. We find the story in Luke 15:11 to 32. First we find his retreat from God. A backslider is one who falls from grace or goes back on God. He was faring sumptuously at home but wanted to see the world, so he slipped out and went into a strange land, got away from God. First, His position in life, he was in a strange country. Second, His condition in life, he was in want. Third, His association, he was joined to a citizen, he was in the wrong crowd. Backsliders stay away from church and from Christians and get into trouble. In Luke 15; 17 to 19 we find retribution before God. "And when he came to himself he said, How many hired servants of my father's have bread enough and to spare, and I perish with hunger. I will arise and go to my father and will say unto him, Father I have sinned against heaven, and before thee and am no more worthy to be called thy son, make me as one of thy hired servants." prodigal made a discovery, he came to himself. Backsliders minds are dull and blinded, it is necessary for them to come to themselves. They see the other fellows conditions, see the hypocrites in the church and say there is nothing to it. The prodigal had a desire to come back. If a backslider has no desire to return he is in a pitiful condition. If you have a desire to come back to God put in practice what the prodigal did. It is so much more blessed to walk with God. He also had a determination, he said, I will return unto my father. Just so the backslider should say I am going to get back to God. The way of the transgressor is hard. I will confess my transgressions and turn away from sin. What is your determination, is it to live in that condition or return to God? His confession was, I have sinned. If we confess our sins He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. He that covers his sin shall not prosper. His father had compassion on him. We have in the word where God is married to backsliding Israel. Some believe in the security of the soul no matter how far you stray away, but the Bible does not teach it that way. When the prodigal returned they began to make merry, just so when one gets back to God there is a shout in the camp.

About Jesus.

The way of salvation is a simple way. John 10;9. The kingdom of God is nigh unto you. Jesus is the door, we must enter through the door. A wayfaring man, though a fool, will not err therein. Find out for yourself what takes place.

About Isaiah

Isaiah had a vision. He saw the Lord on a throne, and above it the seraphims. He said,

Mary also chose. She chose to be at His feet. You make the choice today, He will fill all your need for body soul and spirit.

HOLY SACRAMENT OF BREAD AND WINE, IT'S SIGNIFICANCE

(Charles F. Parham)

Nations forget many things, but they never forget the blood shed by their heroes who have fought to deliver them from the power of a foreign foe and the heels of a tyrant. So long as the stars and stripes shall wave, the small boy of America will have a Fourth of July. The Sacrament of bread and wine of which the Christians partake, can be likened to the celebration of the Fourth of July in America, only it is much more wonderful, for the blood which was shed on Calvary's cross delivers us from all sin, appetites, passions and lust, while the shedding of mere human blood during the many wars can deliver us from nothing save the power of a human foe. The blood of the Lamb atones for all our sins and sets the prisoner free. In His broken body is found the cure for all our diseases, for by His stripes we are healed. "Behold the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world."

The combined amount of blood which was shed during the Revolutionary war and Civil War, was but a drop in the bucket compared with the power of emancipation which was purchased with the blood that was shed for the remission of our sins. During the great war with Germany, the boys who went to France to fight for their country were good, bad and indifferent. Many perished on the field of battle and preachers endorsed this belief. It was said, that the most wicked of these boys, providing they could conceive something of the great cause for which they were fighting, the instant that their blood flowed, though their sins be as scarlet they would be transformed to the realms of glory. This was a consolation to many mothers, but nevertheless, there was no truth in it. Man, through the shedding of his own blood, no matter how pure it may be, could not save himself, for to one alone, has that power been given, even Jesus Christ the Savior of the world. Not all the blood spilled on the battle field had the virtue to redeem a soul.

Jesus said to His disciples as He broke and handed them the bread, "This is my body which was broken for you, this do in remembrance of me." Unless you can see back of water baptism, and what lies beyond the emblems

of bread and wine, it is a dead farce to partake of it. Unless we can catch a vision of Jesus as He hung on the cross, His broken body and shed blood can be of no value to us. We cannot expect to receive the blessings which it holds for us unless we can picture Him who bore the chastisement of our peace upon the cross. When Martin Luther came to Rome seeking some way by which he could obtain the assurance that his sins had been blotted out, he was told that if he would climb the stairs of the cathedral of that city and kiss the toes of the image of Christ fastened at the top, he would obtain remission for his sins. When only halfway up, however, he caught by faith a glimpse of the real Savior on the cross; instead of the image and painted blood which flowed from His wounds, he saw the flow of real blood and at once his burden rolled away. It was no longer necessary to continue the painful task of climbing that magnificent building, for he knew that his sins were blotted out by the precious blood of the Lamb to be remembered against him no more; so with joy unspeakable in his heart he hastened down to set the town on fire with the news of a free salvation.

It would be a grand and glorious thing if every Catholic could see Jesus and His shed blood behind the crufixes and the images to which they bow. Likewise He took the cup and said, 'This is my blood which was shed for many for the remission of sins, drink ye all of it. As often as ye drink, do it in remembrance of me. Whosoever eateth and drinketh unworthily eateth and drinketh condemnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body.

The Bible states, that without the shedding of blood, there could be no remission of sins. We may engage in all manner of good deeds and moral living, and all these will fail to gain you eternal life, because God Almighty from the foundations of the world loaded our sins upon the slain Lamb of Calvary. If we do not accept His shed blood to blot out our sins, we are damned and lost already. There is life in a look at the crucified One. There is not only forgiveness and the blotting out of sins, but there is cleansing, purging and sanctifying power in the blood. Our only hope of unity in the future is, that we let the blood of Christ flow through us and take out all the old traditions and creeds that have been handed down to us

by the elders of our particular congregation. So long as we argue and contend over forms and ceremonies we will not experience spiritual blessings from above, for the Holy Spirit cannot abide where there is discord and contention. Salvation lies not in the keeping of church rituals but in the sacrifice which was made away back on the old rugged cross. A great deal of the things practiced in the Protestant churches today, are taken from the Catholics. Some of us would rather die than give up what we think is right or what we believe ought to be right regardless of whether it is commanded in The Book or not. A man convinced against his will, is of the same opinion still. We are putting those unnecessary teachings above the blood redemption, and therefore are spiritually dead.

Christ did not teach that only certain denominations should partake of the sacrament. All those who have a spirit of unity in their hearts toward every other sect or organization are invited to partake of the emblems which so fittingly represents His broken body and shed blood. Man must examine himself to see that he has naught against his neighbor and that he is right with God, for no one but the man himself has a right to decide whether he shall participate in this Holy communion. If you have aught against another, your sins are unforgiven and you cannot claim to be a Christian. If you do not forgive man his trespasses, neither will your heavenly Father forgive you your trespasses. You must have an open heart when you come to this part of the Lord's worship, giving thanks to God for sending His Son to die for you, and asking Him to give the benefits which He intended you should have through the death, burial and resurrection of His dear Son. Though it is hard for most of us to understand the wonderful love which led Jesus to suffer for us on the cross, yet by faith we must accept the plan of salvation laid down for us, and when partaking of the bread and wine, do so believing it is worth what God says it is. All who love God, have a right to drink of the cup and eat of the bread and by so doing you may feel the cleansing and sanctifying power of the blood. Once the burden has rolled away, if the devil tries to remind you of your past life, just remember that your deeds of the past have been placed under the blood, and

your sins are blotted out once for all. And if you are sick and afflicted as you eat of the bread representing His body which was broken for your healing, ask God to bless the bread to its intended use. He took our infirmities and bore our sickness, and by His stripes we are healed. If we discern the Lord's body and keep His commandments and trust in Him for our healing we shall be healed. We must not doubt for a moment His power to heal and to save, for He healeth your diseases and reneweth your youth like the eagle. Believers shall lay hands on the sick and they shall recover. Send for the elders of the church and they will anoint you with oil, and the prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up, and if they have committed sin, He will forgive them. God will keep His promise if we be sincere, and as we partake of the bread we must look to Him humbly for our healing.

If the sick fully realized the meaning of the words as given in the Lord's prayer, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven," their faith would be strengthened and then their healing would come. It is not the will of God that there should be sickness and sorrow in heaven and if His will be done on earth as it is heaven the same thing will apply to us at the present time. God will stand back of His promises but we must first have faith. When God has healed us we should then devote our lives to His service. Instead, many of us desire our healing so that we may be able to join in the pleasures of the world, neglecting the work of God. haps that is the reason our healing does not come faster. If we have a selfish motive back of our desire to be healed, perhaps it is better for us to remain the way we are. Sometime God has to bring affliction upon us before we are brought to a sense of the danger that lies beyond some of our ambitions. If we do not intend to do anything for God, why should we expect favors from Him? As we come to partake of the sacrament of bread and wine, let us do so with all earnestness and thanksgiving believing that God is able to all things. If we rest on God's promises, and are willing to His will, He will not fail us when we are need of anything. If we are called to be ministers in foreign countries, He will equip us with the necessary tools by enabling us to speak in different languages. Whatever we feel is our

duty, God wants us to do, and if we take it to Him in prayer He will remove our difficulties and handicaps. "The blood of the everlasting covenant makes you perfect in every work to do His will." In one instance, a certain man who loved children asked God for the power to talk to them and win them by his words. His wish was granted in a most marvelous manner.

'Miracles have taken place by the giving of this the Lord's supper. Many have been marvelously healed of divers diseases, for they looked away to the cross on Calvary, and saw there, the blood that was shed for their sins, and the body that was broken for their healing.

FUEL FOR THE FLAME

Dear ones in Christ:

I want to come to you at this time with the deepest spiritual note I can sound, with a message from the very life and heart of the Master; hoping that this message will command the attention of those who are at one with Christ in His world-wide redemptive work.

There is no more spiritual and mysterious truth than that Christ our Head is actually and entirely dependent upon the members of His Body, the Church, for carrying out the plans which He, as Head, has formed. We need a missionary ministry, full of passion to redeem; clear-eyed to discover the on going of Christ's work; faithful in its stewardship at home and abroad; Apostolic in its assurance that Christ has ordained it to bear fruit; Apostolic in its eagerness to spread far and wide the gospel of the risen and ascended Lord. Until the clergy are afire, it is useless to expect the laity to be so. There is not a single instance of a minister really interested in foreign mission, praying and working for them, who has not met with an encouraging response at length from a certain number of his people.

An informed church will be a transformed church. Ignorance is the source of weakness; know and you will believe; Know, and you will pray; Know and you will help in the front rank. Information is the fuel without which the fire can not burn. Fuel is not the fire, and

cannot of itself create fire, but where there is fire, fuel is indispensible to keep it burning, or to make it burn with greater intensity. But such a ministry who are thus to conquer, must first be conquered and set on fire of God. Personal consecration for personal service is a conception of living that grows more and more attractive to a multitude of our finest minds. These are: A clear vision of what the world is and needs; a deep feeling of compassion towards a lost world; a burning desire to send the gospel to the ends of the earth.

Missionary work is twofold in its influence. The torch we hold up for others, illuminates our own path. If we are in earnest to plant the church of Christ in the ends of the earth, and bring the light of the gospel, our own light will ourn brighter.

Until Christians are led to listen, think and pray for opened eyes to look upon these fields, "white unto the harvest" intrusted to them, they never will recognize the greatness of the work, their own unfitness, or the urgent need of waiting for a divine power to fit them for the task.

There is one chief incentive and inspiring truth that towers above all others. If as a whole, Christians would grasp the full meaning there would be an awakening such as never was known of. This is the incentive; Isa. 53:10-12. To help to win for the Lamb that was slain, the reward of His suffering; To feel that we must compensate Him in some way for the awful sufferings which He endured in working out our salvation. The only way we can reward Him is by bringing souls to Him. When souls are brought to Christ that is compensation for the travail of His soul. In no other way can we so effectively bring the suffering Savior the reward of His passion as by missionary labor, at home or abroad, whether we go ourselves or enable others to go.

It needed Christ to come from heaven to save men out of the world; it needs nothing less than the spirit of heaven in Christ's disciples to free them from the spirit of the world, to make them willing to sacrifice all to win the world for Christ. It takes the same spirit through which Christ gave His life for the world, to revive His church to win the world for God. No weariness or toil is spared or self-denial counted, when the heart is really enlist-

ed. The world-wide proclamation of the gospel awaits accomplishment by this generation. This is the last generation privileged to accomplish the task. If we fail what then?

In all we expect to undertake for God in the Bible School work here, we desire to engage in activities that reflect the mind and will of Christ. The problem of the school is this; not how to train an occassional man or woman for the foreign field, but how to kindle the missionary passion in every man that passes through the school, that they may thereby become more able ministers for Christ.

The primary and essential thing is that there shall be within the school a sacred altar of missionary passion, where at the torch of every student shall be kindled and the lips of everyone shall be touched with the living coal. For the sake of the ones who possibly have gifts for service abroad, the Bible School should be hot with zeal for evangelization, charged with solemn anxiety for the world's condition, so that no one can live within its walls without facing for themselves the solemn question, Is it Christ's will for me that I go forth to serve Him in the regions beyond?

God has, and is doing so now, blessing every real movement who give missionary work its proper place in all their labors for Him. We as a body of earnest Christians, are offering up our prayers in this direction. Also have agreed to help in as far as the Lord enables us in a financial way, a missionary and family who are laboring in Africa. We feel that it is in the order of the Lord that this work at Roswell shall be 100 per cent missionary. This privilege is open to all who are like-minded and any money given for that cause, will be gladly received and forwarded, every cent, to our brother in Africa.

Wailing Wall Given Moslems

But Jews Allowed to Use It

LONDON, June 9—The government commission appointed to adjudicate differences between Moslems and Jews over rights to the use of the wailing wall at Jerusalem for devotional purposes Monday ruled that sole ownership of the wall is vested in the Moslems.

At the same time the commission held that the Jews should have free access to the wall for purposes of devotion at all times under definite conditions regarding appurtenances of worship.

It is stipulated that the Jews shall not blow the ram's horn near the wall nor cause any avoidable disturbance to the Moslems and that the Moslems, in turn, must not annoy the Jews during their devotions.

Moslem ownership is established by reason of the fact that the wall forms an integral part of the Haram Esh Sherif area which is a Wagf property.

Ownership of the pavement in front of the wall and the adjacent Moroccan quarter opposite the wall also is vested in the Moslems, the commission found.

The ruling stipulates that Moslems shall not construct, repair or demolish any building adjacent to the wall in such manner as to encroach on the pavement or to interfere with the Jews during their devotional visits.

Political speeches or demonstrations of any kind near the wall are prohibited and the report states that it should be a matter of common interest to both parties that the pavement should be kept clean and the wall should not be disfigured.—Houston Post Dispatch.

FRUIT BEARING BRANCHES

I wonder how many of our readers have picked berries or made garden this year? I enjoy outdoor work, and often get spiritual lessons from nature, the handiwork of God.

As I looked at my raspberry patch this year, I thought at first there were not very many berries, but as I pushed back the non-fruit bearing branches so upright and full of leaves. I found the branches which were bearing the most abundant fruit, were bent down to the ground, hidden away, and could only be found by searching carefully for them. When these branches are raised to pick off the fruit, they may sometimes be broken but you may say, "what does it matter?" Their life work is over, they have done their part, and borne their fruit for others. By another year, the unfruitful branches which are now so fresh and unburdened, will have weathered the winter's rain and snow, withstood the storms and blasts and will be humbly bent to the ground, bearing fruit.

I raised up a branch, laden with ripe juicy fruit, eagerly picked a handful of berries, but in so doing I had carelessly broken the branch that had given me the fruit. As I threw the broken branch aside, I thought, is this not also true sometimes in the Lord's vineyard? Are we always mindful of the burdened branch which has borne for us the precious message of the gospel? Jesus was thinking of the grape vine when He said, as the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye abide in me. John 15-4. If we injure the branch, do we not also hurt the vine?

A messenger of God must humbly wait on God and "abide in Him" to bear fruit and as we gladly receive and are blest by the precious fruit, are we mindful also of the faithful branch (rooted and grounded in love) who has brought us the blessing? Are we always as considerate as we should be of the life and needs of God's messengers, or do we by some unkind or thoughtless word or deed, or by careless neglect, break their hearts, and add needless burdens to their lives? Let us pray for God's messengers, everywhere, who have faithfully withstood the winter blasts of grief and sorrow, trials and testings, and are now humbly and prayerfully bearing fruit to bless the peo-

I took my sharpened hoe, and went to my garden which I had neglected for other work. There is a "careless weed" that will crowd out our plants if we will let it, and how the weeds had grown. As I vigorously endeavored to destroy the weeds, I carelessly, cut down a poor little cucumber plant, which (though surrounded by weeds, which were sapping its life) was still alive and needed help. Here was I while seeking to destroy the weeds and promote its growth, had by one sharp blow, in an unguarded moment, utterly destroyed the little plant that I was trying to help! Dear workers, does this not sometimes occur in the Lord's field? While we are earnestly trying to destroy sin, let us watch and pray, lest by some sharp cut an unkind word or deed-that we do not offend and destroy some weak christian struggling for existence under hard circumstances. Mat. 18-6 7. But whoso shall offend one of these little ones which believe in me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea. Woe unto the world because of offenses! for it must needs be that offenses come: but woe to that man by whom the offense cometh! Luke 17-1. Then said He unto the disciples it is impossible but that offenses will come, but woe unto him through whom they come.

How grieved will be the tender heart of the Great Husbandman, as He goes into His garden if He finds one of "these little ones which believed in Him," had perished through neglect, or was offended and killed by unkindness.

Let us also watch the garden of our hearts,

that the "careless weed' 'does not creep in, for it, and the weed of discouragement are very dangerous and destructive to our spiritual life as they spring up unnoticed and grow so quickly. It is the little foxes that spoil the vines. Song of Solomon 2:15. CHRIST, THE DOOR

Verily, verily I say unto you; he that entereth not by the door into the sheepfold, but climbeth up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber.—John 10, 1-10.

Jesus tells us that He is the Door of the sheepfold, and adds, "By me, if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out and find pasture." These words show that faith in Him as the sacrifice for sin and the Mediator between God and man, is the only way by which any can truly enter God's kingdom either here or hereafter. Outward ordinances are necessary, but outward ordinances will not profit without a heartfelt acknowledgement of Christ as the only foundation on which a sinner can safely build his hopes. A moral or rather a holy life is necessary; but mere morality, which at best is tainted by a thousand imperfections of motive and performance, will prove as a quick-sand to those who trust in it as the ground of acceptance with God. No man can come unto God but by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. "If any man enter in" says our Lord. This Door is not for righteous persons but for sinners-not for those who need no salvation; but for those who do. It is open for one and all who apply for admittance. Any poor sinner that cries sincerely, and knocks heartily shall be permitted to enter.

It is as good for the persecuting Saul as for the loving John, and it is as needful for John as for Saul. It stands as wide for the penitent robber expiring on the cross as it did for the inquiring Nicodemus, who came privately to Jesus, and Nicodemus must look at it as steadily and enter it as humbly as the penitent robber.

And what are the advantages the man obtains who thus enters in?

First: Safety—"He shall be saved"—saved from the curse of the law, the wrath to come, the roaring lion who goes about seeking whom he may devour, from the king of terrors, a world lying in wickedness, and evil heart of unbelief in departing from the living God—saved in the Lord with an everlasting salvation.

Second: Liberty—"He shall go in and out," sheep, under the care of a good shepherd, go in at night for protection, and in the morning go out for food. The expression denotes that what is done for the Christian's safety does not com-

promise his liberty—He knows the truth, and the truth makes him free—and he is free indeed, free to go wherever he pleases in Immanuel's land—free to partake of all the privileges of God.

Third: Plenty—"And find pasture." One said who realized this: "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures. He leadeth me beside the still waters." So Isaiah: "They shall feed in the way"—the ways of God's commandments, ordinances and dispensations. "I am come," says Christ, "that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." Life and all that is necessary for life, is abundantly drawn forth out of His fullness by all those who with simple and true hearts apply to Him.

Jesus is "the Door" through which the shepherds also must enter. As no man can be introduced into this spiritual fold but through Him, so no man can rightfully enter among its occupants as a shepherd, no man can have a legimate claim to be considered as one of their shepherds, but one who enters through Christ as the Door-no man can act the part of a faithful shepherd to Christ's spiritual flock, but one who enters in through the Door, who possesses the qualifications which Jesus Christ can only confer, and who has received the call which Jesus Christ requires. The general idea is: Everything connected with membership and office in the true spiritual church of God is under the management of our Lord.
