The young are born and cared for as well as the plants grow new leaves and become green again. And if you look you can see Gods promise of life everywhere. Mothers Day

In its present form, Mother's Day was established by Anna Marie Jarvis, with the help of Philadelphia merchant John Wanamaker following the death of her mother Ann Jarvis on May 9, 1905. A small service was held on May 12, 1907 in the Andrew's Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton, West Virginia where Anna's mother had been teaching Sunday school. But the first "official" service was on May 10, 1908 in the same church, accompanied by a larger ceremony in the Wanamaker Auditorium in the Wanamaker's store on Philadelphia. The next year the day was reported to be widely celebrated in New York.

Jarvis then campaigned to establish Mother's Day first as a U.S. national holiday and then later as an international holiday. The holiday was declared officially by the state of West Virginia in 1910, and the rest of states followed quickly. On May 8, 1914, the U.S. Congress passed a law designating the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day and requesting a proclamation. On May 9, 1914 President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation declaring the first national Mother's Day as a day for American citizens to show the flag in honor of those mothers whose sons had died in war.

In 1934, U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt approved a stamp commemorating the holiday.

In May 2008 the U.S. House of Representatives voted twice on a resolution commemorating Mother's Day, the first one being unanimous (with 21 members not voting). The Grafton's church, where the first celebration was held, is now the International Mother's Day Shrine and is a National Historic Landmark.

Thanks to the kind and generous support of our congregation, the congregation of Calvary Baptist Church and our Brewerton neighbors and friends, our Adopt a Family Easter food basket project made Easter special for 90 local families in need. As we celebrated the holiest day in our church calendar, Resurrection Sunday, we demonstrated what it means to be Easter people; giving of ourselves and living our lives the way Jesus taught us. It is amazing to witness the power of love through the hands and hearts of many who come together to make it all happen. As our congregation and our pantry partners at Calvary Baptist Church led the way, filling bags with food items and making cash donations, our Saddlecreek neighbors conducted a food drive and collected a vast assortment of holiday food items. In addition, we received amazing support from the Friday morning Zumba group as well as the Twilight Stitchers. The Boy Scouts from Pack 3112, led by Mike Harwood, once again volunteered their time and energy, along with their leaders and families to fill each box with all the items needed to create a special holiday meal featuring either a ham, turkey or chicken. We were even able to create Easter bags filled with special treats, for each of the children. The Boy Scouts and the Leiser Family returned after worship on Palm Sunday to deliver a portion of the baskets and to assist with basket pickups that day as well. The remaining baskets were picked up during pantry the Tuesday and Thursday prior to Easter. It was wonderful to witness so many people working together toward a common goal; demonstrating once again, what it means to share our time, talents and energy to help our neighbors in need.

What's New in the Pantry...

The bountiful blessings continue to find their way to our pantry...we received a check in the amount of \$278.18, representing our share of the 2016 Church World Service CROP Hunger Walk. The total amount raised in the Cicero/Brewerton walk was \$3,338.20 of which \$2,503.65 was donated to Church World Service in support of the work they do around the world to fight hunger. The remaining \$834.55 was split evenly with our pantry, Sacred Heart (Cicero) & Divine Mercy (Central Square) each receiving almost \$300 to help us reach out to those in need in our communities. We appreciate BUMC's support of the CROP Walk each year.

On April 25th, we were visited by Alice and Nadine representing the Fort Brewerton/Greater Oneida Lake Chamber of Commerce. They presented us with a check in the amount of \$500 to help us continue our work in support of those in need in the Brewerton community. The Chamber sponsored a wine tasting event with the proceeds going to our pantry, Divine Mercy in Central Square and the North Shore Pantry in Cleveland. As they toured the pantry, I shared with them that we had just received an order from the Food Bank of CNY. As I pulled the invoice from my desk to reveal the amount spent, the figure \$501.28 appeared! God does work in mysterious ways around the pantry! They were impressed at how much we are able to buy through the Food Bank. Their donation will help us fill our shelves in the weeks to come.

Thank you for your continued support of our food pantry mission. Together we are making a difference in the lives of MANY – clients and volunteers, alike!
