Here is what I'm thinking...

I confess that I am writing this late. It is already March 2 and I am just sitting down to finally reflect on life and faith. It does not help that yesterday was Super Tuesday—arguably the noisiest day of this year so far. I have found the election craziness to be simultaneously both upsetting and fascinating. One reporter compared it to a tragic car accident from which you can't seem to look away. In that way, I admit that much of the distracting noise is self-inflicted. I listen to the reports on TV and radio, and I read articles in the paper and magazines. I justify time spent this way with the need to be informed, though I seldom feel smarter after indulging in reports of political side-swipes and all too frequent head-on crashes.

But, occasionally, I run into something that provokes serious reflection. On the recommendation of my son-in-law's father, who was for many years the Political Editor of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, I read an article published in the most recent Rolling Stone magazine titled, How America Made Trump Unstoppable. In this very lengthy article, the writer forces us as a nation to answer the questions we have about today's political situation by looking in the mirror. The truth he is suggesting is that what disturbs us about our current political situation is a reflection of who we are and how we think and act as a people. Could it be that it is the glaring honesty of self-recognition that both draws and repels us? Maybe the noise of this election will shake us awake and call us to be our better selves.

So here's what I'm thinking...this is true, not only for politics, but for religion as well. Lent is a season of honest reflection on how our life does or does not reflect the faith we proclaim. We have incorporated a time of reflection into our worship time this Lent so that the stories of Jesus may shine light into our darkness to bring self-awareness and renewed efforts to live in that light. One of the most important ways that we as Brethren and as followers of Christ do this is by bringing the light of "Love Feast" into the darkness of Holy Week. Jesus tells us to "do this in remembrance of me" not because he wants to be famous, but because he wants us to remain faithful—to remember who and whose we are. Jesus knew there would be distracting noise in our lives so he gave us the ritual to call our attention back to who we are as followers of one who lived love, compassion, and forgiveness.

Please join us for this gathering of remembering and returning to lives of faith and to our better selves.


