Dear Middle School Parents:

Summer is approaching, and it is time for the incoming 6th, 7th and 8th grade students to consider what books they will be reading to increase their word power and genre experience. The list on the next page includes the required reading for the summer as well as choices for two additional books that must be read. Please choose books by different authors to broaden your student's literary experience.

These Accelerated Reader books can be obtained from a local library, a bookstore, online, or the school library. We have an AR test for any choice on the list, and the AR points gained from summer reading will be factored into the student's Accelerated Reading goal. During the first week of school, students must give the literature teacher a list of the books read. Students have a choice of coming in during summer school hours to take an AR test on each book when they have finished reading it, or they may wait and take the test during the first week back to school. If a test is not taken, a book report of three paragraphs will be required upon returning to school.

Students need to be prepared for assignments in literature as well as writing regarding the required summer reading book. If the required book is read at the beginning of summer, it will be necessary to review it at or near the beginning of school in order to be prepared for these assignments. We suggest purchasing a paperback copy of the book so your student can highlight important facts, events, and new vocabulary words as well as write notes in the margins.

We strongly encourage you to have your child begin reading these books immediately, and not save the reading for the end of the summer. Some books could also be a great "family read" which would allow for discussion

and increased comprehension. Benefits to reading aloud:

- Promotes family unity and learning
- Demonstrates that parents also value books
- Listening level is usually higher than reading level, therefore challenging vocabulary and intriguing topics can better be understood
- Parents can read the books they never took the time to read as students
- Encourages students to become lifelong readers
- Reading together makes it fun! No one misses out on some other activity because all are enjoying the same pastime.
