LOVE AND HATRED

"Love your neighbor as you (love) yourself" (Vayikra 19:18)

This most famous of all Biblical quotations is perhaps the best known and least practiced suggestion in all of world literature. The apparently simple recommendation is actually very hard to reach. It is for this reason that Hillel, when quoting this verse does not use the language of the Bible but rather the rather strange formulation in the negative, "Don't do unto others what is hateful to you." It is easier to understand what we need to avoid than what we must do. Moving away from negative feelings, setting aside rancor and hatred are more practicable than to actually experience love for others as we love ourselves.

Why hatred and why do we feel anger and resentment against others? The Rabbis say that the Second Temple was destroyed, not because people sinned or because they abandoned the Torah commandments, but rather because they had gratuitous hatred (sin'at hinam) towards each other. (Yoma 9b). The Talmud Yerushalmi (Yoma 1:1) adds that the people "engaged in Torah learning and possessed every good trait but...they felt hatred towards one another."

Rav Henoch Leibowitz, ztz'l, asks a profound question, "How is it possible that such people, giants in Torah learning and possessed of such noble character traits and avoiding any sin could have fallen prey to this insidious hatred and especially when they were by nature generous people? Rav Leibowitz analyzes this strange phenomenon in great depth.

The first issue that requires an explanation is that there are circumstances when hating people is appropriate. That is when the people are committing grievous sins or hurting society. In such cases, one is allowed to feel hatred towards such people and may even be obligatory to have such negative feelings. (Pesahim 113b) We who live in a society where hatred has produced tragic results may feel great resistance to this concept, but we must understand the Talmudic concept of hatred as similar to repudiation and avoidance rather than the idea of aggression that usually accompanies our idea of hatred.

Then, Rav Leibowitz, introduces another difficulty in that there are other Talmudic sources that actually encourage us to suppress our feelings of hatred. The Torah itself asks us "Do not feel hatred for your brother in your heart." (Vayikra 19:18) The Talmud (Baba Metzia 32b) says that the need to suppress hatred surpasses another mitzvah in the Torah, avoiding animal suffering. How can we reconcile these two ideas, the obligation to hate and the need to cancel one's hatred? The Tosafot explains that when one hates another person, the hatred increases when the other begins to hate back. Now the hatred that started as a result of one person's actions, now becomes simple hatred because the other person hates us. While it may be appropriate to feel hatred towards the person committing a serious crime, one should hate the person because he is evil and not because he hates us.

Rav Leibowitz concludes that this fine distinction enables us to see why great people may fall prey to gratuitous hatred. The inability to separate the correct feelings in a measured way from the simple experience of personal grievance and offense that makes us jump at other people is the source of much hatred today. Hate the act, not the man. In normal interpersonal relationships, this must be the dictum

Unfortunately, once the cycle of anger and hatred starts, it acquires its own life and energy. In some cases, anger becomes a source of energy for some people and in extreme cases, such as sadism, even the source of pleasure. This is the psychological origin of gratuitous hatred (sin'at chinam), the hatred that becomes its own cause. We are allowed to feel discomfort and even anger at people when they do the wrong things or when they hurt us. But we must be

vigilant that in this natural and acceptable process we do not cross the line and begin hating the whole person and engaging in the gratuitous feeling of anger. To remove the feeling of hatred from our hearts is the beginning of the fulfillment of "loving your neighbor as yourself."
