Deforestation, reforestation, and bird conservation in Brazil Dr. Liz Walsh, UTEP

Join Sierra Club's Liz Walsh for a presentation on her recent trip to <u>South-Wild Amazon Lodge</u>, a cutting-edge rainforest conservation and reforestation project. The French government's Forest Service purchased the property about 25 years ago. At that time, 6,000 acres (nearly 10 square miles) was unproductive cattle pasture. It has since been replanted with millions of trees. Wildlife is rebounding with harpy eagle nests, umbrella birds, hoatzins, Brazilian tapirs, and more!

AT FEATHER LAKE

Feather Lake has two sources of water. The main source is runoff from intense storm events, of which there have been very few for almost two years now. The other is unused irrigation water discharged either into the Mesa Drain upstream of the lake or into the Mesa Drain Interceptor at a point immediately downstream of the lake. In the latter case, water discharged to the Interceptor can build up and backflow into Feather Lake.

This year, there have been several discharges of irrigation water to the Mesa Drain upstream of Feather Lake. Each time, the water flooded a modest area near the lake inlet—where our water-level gauge is located—then quickly soaked into the soil. More substantial have been discharges to the Mesa Drain Interceptor downstream of the lake. This water has kept a large area on the back side of the lake basin consistently flooded and has promoted an extensive stand of emergent vegetation.

Our next workday at Feather Lake will be **Sat.**, **August 10** starting at **8 a.m.** We'll be clearing downed tree limbs and other obstacles from the inner berm that winds through the basin. Join us. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.

It continues to be an exceptional year for water availability at Rio Bosque, and the park's vegetation and wildlife are responding.



Black-necked Stilts and American Avocets nested in good numbers. The park's resident beaver continues to play an outsized role influencing the water system. And a pair of White-tailed Kites has been present since late May. This species last nested at Rio Bosque in 2017. We are hoping that drought will end in 2024.


