#### A TIME OF CLEANSING

Ex. 20:1-17; Ps. 19:8-11; 1Cor. 1:22-25; John 2:13-25

A traffic officer was on a routine patrol when he noticed a driver running the red light. "Wham-wham," goes the siren, and the unfortunate driver was pulled over. "Do you realize what you have just done?" asked the traffic officer. "I have no idea, officer;" replied the driver. "You just ran a red light!" The officer retorted. "Sir, I am a very respectable man in the community," the guilty driver continued, "I did watch carefully, to my right and to my left. I made sure that there was no traffic approaching before I went though the red light...by the way, it does not make any sense for me to be waiting at the red light when there is no other vehicle within sighting distance..." At the end of his defense and argument, the traffic officer ticketed him. The law is the law! Sometimes it might not make any sense to you, but it must still be kept for the sake of order and safety.

Last week, at our annual Lenten Recollection, the Archbishop, Timothy Cardinal Dolan, told us how he received a letter from someone questioning why he is interfering in other people's private lives. "Why should you or the Church for that matter tell people how to live their lives?" The writer went on, "Why must the Church make laws forbidding the use of contraceptives? People should be allowed to make their choices and live their lives the way they want!"

Of course, people have the right to make choices, but have you ever imagine how chaotic it would be if we were a lawless society? There are those who would be quick to dismiss God's laws (The Ten Commandment) as unnecessary and unattainable. There are some who would like us to do away with the Constitution – civil, criminal, traffic or sanitary laws. Can you imagine what would happen if we were ruled by the whims and caprices of our politicians or dictators – what our community would turn out to be if individuals were to behave and act as they please? Sometimes, you and I appreciate the law as long as it favors us. We get mad if someone runs a red light or drives recklessly - we want justice exerted if someone were to cause us harm, physical or emotional. But, on the other hand, we sometimes become unreceptive to God's Laws or even civil laws. There is always chaos when people become nonconforming and do not allow the laws to work as they were originally intended.

Today's Scripture deals with God's laws - the Ten Commandments, which formed part of the Sinai Covenant between God and His people. They are far more superior to civil laws. The objective of the Commandments is to bring about respect and love for God and our fellow human being. They were given so that the people of God could love and worship God above all things and love their neighbor as themselves. The existence of the law is not an end, but a means that will lead us to holiness and eternal life if we obey and live by it. As we see in today's gospel, God's children have not always been faithful to His Laws - you and I have sometimes turned the Temple of God (our bodies) into a "den of thieves" by flouting God's laws and by committing sins.

Jesus, in cleansing the Temple, demonstrates to us that Lent is a time of cleansing – a time for self-introspection – to make amends in areas where we have not been faithful to God and His commandments. This week's Parish Mission will surely afford us the opportunity to recommit ourselves to God and be faithful to our baptismal promises.

#### THE COLLECTION

It is a familiar routine. A collection is taken up- for a baby gift, a departing colleague or a local event. With varying degrees of willingness, we put our money in the basket and feel that we have done our duty.

That same invitation is made to us in an entirely different context every Sunday as we gather to offer God thanks and praise. During the liturgy of the word, we listen to the voice of God in the scriptures, proclaim our belief in the creed and offer prayers for the needs of the church and the world. Then a collection is taken up.

It is commonly understood that the money given during the collection will be used to support the ongoing work of the church. This includes setting aside a portion of those funds to be used directly for those in need. But this age of credit cards and automatic fund transfers, isn't there a more efficient way to do this?

If it were only a matter of paying the bills, yes, there are probably simpler ways to collect money. But our monetary contributions are more than just financial transactions; they symbolize our willingness to place our lives at God's disposal and to be ourselves transformed into the body and blood of Christ. The act of bringing our hard-earned money (in cash or check, in an envelope or not) and placing it in the basket together is a ritual sign of the real offering that will happen when the priest invites us, "Lift up your hearts," and we respond, "We have lifted them up to the Lord."

Clearly, such a vision is beyond the realm of simple accounting. The pooling of our resources is a preparation for the pooling of our lives in loving service to one another and the poor.
