Joe demonstrated a way to make flowers that I had not seen before. These look like a lot of fun to make and while he used a soft wood (section of a 2X4) these would be great out of poplar, sycamore, or maple. I wouldn't recommend an open grained wood since the stem is turned down to less than a ¼" and that can get a bit sketchy. While you could use possibly ambrosia maple or a lightly spalted wood that also could be a bit unstable but with a little skill and a whole lot of luck could produce some really great results. The lighter wood though can be dyed or colored as you wish to more closely match real flowers or make a bunch for the grandkids to color as they please. I bet Mom or Grandma would love a few of these and possibly a little Weed Pot to put them in for Mother's Day.


Thanks Joe for the great Demo. I think you will need to do this again when we get back to the normal meetings.

Cleaning a Scroll Chuck

Woodturning is a dirty and dusty process. Your scroll chuck is almost certainly accumulating wood dust and debris inside. This causes friction, obstruction and

generally less than optimum performance. Fortunately, this is relatively easy to remedy. Cleaning your scroll chuck is quick and easy. The photos included are of a Super Nova 2 but most chucks are similar and instructions can be found online.



Disassembly requires only one special tool, snap ring pliers. These make removal of the snap ring easier and safer than needle nose pliers.



Mark the movable jaws prior to disassembly. It is not always absolutely necessary to return parts to their original position, but it can eliminate potential difficulties. A sharpie will do until you make a permanent mark with a center punch.



Completely disassemble the chuck as shown in the photos. Once the snap ring is removed the black plastic cover can be a challenge to remove especially if it has been a while since the chuck was cleaned last. Keep at it and it will come out.





Clean all parts and inspect for damage. Mineral spirits and a toothbrush work well for cleaning. I used emery cloth to remove some of the surface rust caused by green wood. For more challenging rust Home Depot sells a product called Metal Rescue that is amazing for removing rust. A 1 Gallon jug will last for years as it can be reused over and over.



Lubricate with your choice of lubricant. It is possible to find support for just about any lubricant on the internet. You can even find some people that say you should not

lubricate at all. This chuck was lubricated with grease at the factory. I used Teflon lube on sliding surfaces and grease on the gears.



Now for assembly. The trickiest part is timing the jaws. Nova assembles the jaw numbers in a clockwise order. Note the jaws are machined differently.

Carefully turn the chuck upside down keeping the jaws from moving, Place the scroll in and rotate it until it engages the jaws. All jaws must move together and close into a square at the center. Pinions and plastic housing are installed then the snap ring.

You are finished!
