
Jesus went to Jerusalem knowing full well what awaited him - betrayal, rejection, and crucifixion. The people of Jerusalem, however, were ready to hail him as their Messianic King! Little did they know what it would cost this king to usher in his kingdom. Jesus' entry into Jerusalem astride a colt was a direct fulfillment of the Messianic prophecy of Zechariah (9:9): Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion. Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem. Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he, and riding on a donkey and upon a colt the foal of a donkey. Those who believe, hope, and love receive Christ's kingdom of peace and eternal life. The colt was a sign of peace. Jesus enters Jerusalem in meekness and humility, as the Messianic King who offers victory and peace to his people. That victory and peace would be secured in the cross and resurrection which would soon take place at the time of Passover.

Jesus Christ came to bring us the kingdom of God. He is the true King who offers peace, joy, and everlasting life for those who accept his kingship. Does the King of glory find a welcome entry in our hearts and homes? Do our walls echo with the praise of his glory? Let us pray: Lord Jesus, be the King and Ruler of my heart, mind, life, and home. May my life reflect your meekness and humility that you may be honored as the King of glory! May I wish you all a most blessed Holy Week!

Saint of the Week ... St. Oscar Romero

Born in 1917, St. Oscar Romero became the "voice of the voiceless" in El Salvador. He entered seminary at age 13, and for most of his priesthood, he was quiet and unassuming. Then, civil war broke out, and the poor were being oppressed. Fellow priests were being killed around him.

Leading up to his appointment as Archbishop of San Salvador in 1977, he realized that as a follower of Christ he needed to stand against the government's human rights abuses. He spoke out on his radio show and called for the protection of the poor and marginalized. His weekly radio sermons, broadcast throughout the country, were regarded by many as the most trustworthy source of news available.



Feast Day: March 24

On March 23, 1980, Archbishop Romero spoke on his radio show, imploring soldiers to follow God's law above their military orders to kill unarmed civilians. "No soldier is obliged to obey an order that goes against the law of God," he said. "I beseech you. I beg you. I command you! In the name of God: 'Cease the repression!'" Romero was fully aware of the risk of violence and death that faced him when he bravely spoke out. The next day, while celebrating Mass in a hospital chapel, a car pulled up and a gunman fired a single shot, striking and killing Romero.

The Archbishop's funeral was celebrated in the plaza outside the cathedral and drew an estimated 250,000 mourners. In 2015, Pope Francis authorized a decree recognizing him as a martyr for the faith; he was beatified later that year. When St. Oscar Romero was canonized in 2018, Pope Francis wore the same blood-stained belt that Romero wore the day he was assassinated.

Romero is remembered for always speaking out for the poor, and he's inspired individuals and institutions to continue his work long after his death.



Divine Mercy Sunday

Looking ahead, we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday the second Sunday of Easter (this year on April 7). Divine Mercy Sunday is a day of profound significance for millions of Catholics worldwide, emphasizing God's

boundless love and mercy for humanity. It invites us to seek forgiveness, reconciliation and spiritual renewal.

History of Divine Mercy Sunday

In the 1930s a nun from the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy, Sister Faustina, claimed to have received personal visits from Jesus. He revealed an image of himself with two rays emanating from his heart: one red (symbolizing blood) and the other pale (symbolizing water). The words, "Jesus, I trust in you," appeared at the bottom of the image. Sister Faustina was canonized by Pope John Paul II in 2000. On the same day, he declared that the Second Sunday of Easter would be known as Divine Mercy Sunday.
