ANNUAL UNIT RECHARTERING

The Boy Scouts of America requires each Scouting unit, whether Pack, Troop, Team, Crew, Ship of Post, to renew its charter annually. This assures that the Chartered Organization still is using Scouting's programs to serve youth, is actively supporting its unit, and assures that the unit roster is up to date. We refer to this annual renewal as "Rechartering."



Our unit's current charters expire on the last day of December. Charters must be renewed by your District's Recharter Day (see the list of dates and locations below). In the event that you cannot turn in your unit's recharter at your District please Rechartering Day, arrangements to get it to your District Executive or District Commissioner ahead of time (Recharters must be received prior to December 10th to be considered as an "On-time" Unit).

Please remember that submitting an ontime Recharter is a component of BSA's Journey to Excellence and the Council's yearly Unit Incentive Program. Please (continued on page 2)

Scouting's Journey to Excellence (JTE) is the performance measurement and recognition program for units to measure their performance against the Boy Scouts of America's basic standards. JTE benchmarks units against standards of excellence in categories measuring: advancement, recruitment and retention, quality program delivery, camp participation, unit planning and

budgeting, and rechartering. Every unit is then ranked according to their level of achievement as: gold, silver or bronze. Units can also purchase patches or pins for the JTE level achieved to recognize their members.

Units must complete the JTE requirements and submit the required from by their District Rechartering Day to qualify in 2015. Please contact your District Commissioner or District Executive if you have questions about JTE or need assistance in completing the requirements.

EAGLE SCHOLARSHIP HONOREE

Sons of the American Revolution Scholarship

Eagle Scout Duncan McKechney of Troop 273, Fairport has been named the winner of the Sons of the American Revolution Eagle Scout Scholarship contest for all of New York State.



Over 3,000 eagle Scouts were eligible to compete in the state contest this year. McKechney, earlier this year was named the winner of the Rochester area SAR contest. The contest entries were judged on Leadership in scouting, merit badges, Community, school and religious activities and a 500 word essay on the American Revolution.



2016 CAMP DIRECTORS

As the colors of the leaves change and the sounds of summer adventure fade from our camps it is time to begin planning for summer camp in 2016. We are pleased to announce that all three of our camp and reservation directors will be returning for another season.

Warren Cutler Scout Reservation and Camp Director for Cub Scout Adventure Camp.

SITE DEPOSITS NOW DUE FOR CAMP

All camps are accepting site deposits for the 2016 camping season. This year units are able to reserve the campsite in the week they are attending. Units that attended this summer were able to reserve their campsite before they left camp. Now, any unreserved campsite is up for grabs. Now is the time to reserve the campsite that your troop wants, needs and must have. A few conditions apply, these can be found on the site reservation form. In addition to reserving your campsite for this summer, site reservations must be made before December 18 in order to secure early bird pricing for the Scouts and adults attending camp. If you don't have a site deposit in by December 18 the regular camp fee will apply for your unit at camp.

To reserve your campsite, locate the 2016 Campsite Reservation form in the forms sections of the council website, fill it out completely and send to the Scout Service Center with your \$100 site deposit.

EARLY BIRD REGISTRATION – THE BEST WAY TO CAMP

It's important to plan early for camp and be prepared for the early bird deadlines. In order to qualify for early bird rates for Boy Scout Camp the unit must register for a campsite by December 18, 2015, deposits must be paid for each Scout and Adult by the camp deposit deadline and full early bird payment must be made for each Scout and Adult by the early bird deadline. If any of the payment deadlines are missed the early bird price will not apply for that Scout or adult attending camp. Why does early bird matter? The planning process for camps can be like looking into a crystal ball at times. It is helpful for the camp administration to know how many youth and adults are attending early in the season so that we can secure best rates for supplies because we are able to plan ahead.

As we get closer to camp the expenses increase. If you help us out by registering early we want to help you out with the best price for camp. So please, plan ahead, register early and save money! Please note that registration deadlines have changed from 2015. Please reference the campsite reservation form with 2016 pricing and the council calendar to determine deadlines.

IMPORTANT SUMMER CAMP PLANNING TIPS:

Adult Discounts for Boy Scout Resident Camps: New in 2016.... Bring five Scouts to camp and one adult camps free. Bring ten Scouts to camp and two adults camp free. You take the time out of work to make camp happen for your Scouts and we thank you!

Bring a Troop Bonus: If a troop that has not camped at Massawepie Scout Camps or Camp Babcock Hovey in the 2014 or 2015 camping seasons attends camp in 2016 with at least ten Scouts, and identifies you or your troop as a reference, your unit will receive \$200 in your unit account at the Scout Service Center. Excludes new units started after January 2015. Camp is more fun with friends, bring them to camp with you!

Scouts can attend a second week of camp at a STEEP Discount:

What's more fun than a week at camp? More than one week of camp! Scouts can attend a second week of camp as a provisional Scout for a very steep discount. Depending on when a Scout registers and pays for their second week of camp the fee could be about 40% less than their first week of camp. All Scouts are encouraged to attend camp for a second week and finish merit badges and keep the adventure going. The discounted second week only applies to Seneca Waterways Council Scouts attending a second week of a Seneca Waterways Council camp. Spend a week at Camp Babcock-Hovey and then spend a week at Massawepie Scout Camps or spend two or three or four weeks at one of the camps. This is a deal too good to be true. Only 200 spots are available at both camps at this discounted price so make your reservations for your two or more weeks at camp today!

Second week of camp at Massawepie Scout Camps:

• Early Bird (paid by 4/27) = \$190 Regular Registration = \$255

Second week of camp at Camp Babcock-Hovey:

• Early Bird (paid by 4/28) = \$190 Regular Registration = \$235

Campership Application Available

The Executive Board of the Seneca Waterways Council is committed to ensuring that all Scouts that want to attend a summer camp experience are able to do so. The cost of camp that a Scout pays is about half of the true cost of camp. The Council operating budget keeps the cost of camp low so that all Scouting families can attend a camp experience. Think about the cost of a camp hosted by another organization. A local non-profit organization that hosts a week of resident summer camp does so at the cost of \$900 for one week. Without our council operating budget subsidizing our camping programs, our cost of camp would be close to that cost. In addition to keeping the cost low for every Scout attending camp, the council allocated additional dollars to support Scouts that need additional assistance.

A new campership application is being used for 2016. Forms from previous years will not be accepted. The current campership form can be downloaded from the council website under the forms section. Questions about camperships can be directed to camping@senecawaterways.org.

APPLY NOW FOR CAMP STAFF!

Working at summer camp is more than a job, it's an adventure, it's freedom, it's giving back to the Scouting program. If you relate to this, then there's the perfect place waiting for you: summer camp. Each of our three camps are currently accepting applications for seasonal camp staff.

Imagine a job where almost anything is possible:

- Live, play, and work in the great outdoors.
- Go on active adventures.
- Make new friends from all over
- Bank more money than you think
 — with few expenses.
- Become a child's hero.
- Learn leadership skills.

Camp jobs offer invaluable skill-building, leadership, training, and enrichment opportunities that can't be found anywhere else! Camp experiences allow you to learn and develop skills that will enhance your job marketability. The benefits go far beyond a paycheck, too. Business executives often note that experience as a camp counselor translates into excellent management

and personnel skills. College credit can sometimes be obtained from working at camp. Check with your college advisor to see if you qualify.

For the camp staff application find it on the council website under the forms section. Camp staff interviews will take place November through January. Don't miss out on the opportunity.

INCIDENT REPORTS

An incident report should be filed if an injury or a near injury occurs at a Scouting event. To file an incident report please locate the Incident Report form at www.senecawaterways.org under the Forms Section. Print out the incident report and complete the requested fields. Incident reports should be e-mailed to coi@senecawaterways.org.

Once the incident report is received the insurance support team will record the incident and send you a letter with information about secondary accident and sickness insurance and a claim form. The initial accident claim should be sent by the injured party to the insurance company within 30 days of the incident. After filing the claim with the insurance company, all further communication about the incident, such as new medical bills, is with the insurance company. Do

not delay in sending your incident report or submitting documents to the accident insurance company as delays could result in rejection of the claim.

CERTIFICATES OF INSURANCE

Certificates of liability insurance are available when an organization has requested proof of insurance or has requested that they be added as an additional insured on our general liability policy. In order to write a certificate of insurance we need to know for what the organization is looking. Please locate the certificate of insurance request form www.senecawaterways.org under the Forms Section. Please complete the information and include a copy of any agreement with the organization requesting the certificate. The request form and support information should be sent to coi@senecawaterways.org. It may take up to fourteen days for a certificate to be processed.

Proof of Accident and Sickness insurance is often requested by other Boy Scout Councils when using their property. A proof of accident and sickness insurance can be e-mailed to you if you send a request to coi@senecawaterways.org.

EAGLE SCOUT SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Dozens of organization in our Community and nationally concur in the value of your achievement and offer you further tangible recognition with scholarship awards. Most of these awards are available only to Eagle Scouts. I hope you will be taking advantage of these opportunities. Here are some of them:

Louis and Sally Langie Scholarship:

This program is available only to Eagles in Seneca Waterways Council. It is worth \$12,500 per year, and renewable for a total of 4 years. You apply during your senior year in high school, and must (1) be registered as a Scout or Explorer – so stay active in Scouting, (2) have an SAT score of 1090 or an ACT score of 26, (3) have demonstrated leadership as a Scout and participation in extracurricular activities, (4) have a financial need, and (4) be endorsed by a volunteer or professional Scout Leader who knows you personally. The application must be in by April 1 of your senior year.

Sons of the American Revolution Eagle Scout Awards:

All entrants receive a patch and strongly worded letter of congratulations, which can be incorporated into your college entrance or financial aid application. Winners in Rochester receive a \$200 award and medial; another \$350 award and bronze Eagle trophy is added when you win at the State level and an \$8,000 scholarship, trip to their national convention, and Crystal Eagle at the National level and \$4,000 and \$2,000 scholarships to the national runners-community service; 35% for a two page essay and four generation ancestor chart.

You may enter each and every year until you are a senior or college freshman for this one: enter early, and enter every year! For details, you should check their website at www.sar.org, then click on "Youth Programs" then on "Eagle Contest". Application forms can be downloaded from there.

American Legion Eagle Scout of the Year:

The Legion awards an \$8,000 scholarship and three second place \$2,000 scholarships. Criteria that are considered include high school grades and extra curriculars; community service and participation; religious awards; your Scouting records, OA, Jamboree and other activities; your Eagle Service Project; and four letters of recommendation.

National Eagle Scout Association Scholarships:

NESA and the Boy Scout National Office administer 20 scholarships of \$8,000 each and one \$40,000, scholarship. Competition is open to high school seniors still active as Eagle Scouts. Check with our service center for applications, or at the BSA National website identified below; the deadline is February 28.

Prudential Community Service Awards:

Each year, Prudential selects 100 young men and women for a trip to Washington with their parents, and a \$5,000 cash award. Many past winners have used their Eagle Service

Project as part of their nominating application. The program is open to anyone with any part of whose project was completed prior to September. Check with your school guidance counselor on how to apply.

J. C. Penney Golden Rule Awards:

Each year, J. C. Penney awards \$7,500 locally to community volunteers. Again, your service project is appropriate to a nominating application. Depending on your project, you would be eligible to compete in the "Youth" division, or possibly the "Education" or "Group" division, depending on what your service project was. The winner gets \$1,000 donated to his organization, two second place winners each receive \$500 donations. Check with your school guidance counselor for details. Here's a chance for you to get some new camping gear for your Troop.

High School Service Credits:

Many school districts now grant credit for community service projects. Your Eagle service project may already qualify you for such credits. Other Districts do not grant credits, but do tally the hours, incorporate them into your transcript, and use them in their letters of recommendation in your college application. Make sure to see your guidance counselor in regards to the school's policy. For example, the Pittsford School grant one-fourth credit for 75 hours of service, and up to a total of one credit over four years. In addition, Webster, Irondequoit, West Irondequoit, Churchville-Chili, and Wheatland-Chili have similar programs started or underway. All Catholic high schools *mandate* community service. So make sure your Eagle Service Project and other Scouting service time is incorporated into those records. Remember, more and financial aid decisions.

St. John Fisher College Community Service Scholarships: St. John Fisher offers 35 scholarships, each of which underwrites one-third of the total cost of a four year education. Applications are available from their Admissions Office. You must be nominated, and your application for this program is completed by the adult leader of the organization that sponsored your project, such as your school principal, priest, park ranger, etc.

The Army, Navy and Air Force ROTC Programs grant additional points for your Eagle rank when you are being considered for an award. There are many variations on them, but most are now "full freight" four-year deals. This could be worth over \$120,000 at many private schools, such as Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT), Brockport, Cornell, Columbia or Dartmouth. You incur an eight-year active and reserve duty obligation. Check with your school guidance counselor or, for the Army, call 1-800-USA ROTC. Also, don't forget the Service Academies.

All Service Academy appointments are "full freight", i.e., tuition, room, board and spending one in eight (versus less than one in one hundred of all young men nationally) of the Cadets at all the Academies (West Point, Annapolis, and Colorado Springs, as well as the Coast Guard at Groton, and the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy on Long Island) are fellow Eagles.

Your Eagle Scout rank is one of the items scored and credited by each of these school's Admissions Officers. The services estimate that the cost of a four-year program at West Point, Annapolis, Colorado Springs, Gorton or Kings Point is over \$250,000 but to you, it's free!

Captain James J. Regan Memorial Scholarship:

Offers a one-time \$5,000 award to a Law Enforcement Explorer based on academics, extracurriculars and a short essay. The application must be received by March 1 at the Exploring Division, Boy Scouts of America, and 1325 West Walnut Hill Lane, P.O. Box 152079, Irving, Texas 75015-2079

Eastern Orthodox Committee on Scouting:

Located in Freeport, New York offers a \$500 and \$1,000 scholarship on acceptance to a four-year accredited college or university. You must be an Eagle Scout, active in a Scouting Unit, a member of the Eastern Orthodox Church, have received their religious medal, and "demonstrated practical citizenship". You apply in your senior year to George N. Boulukos, 862 Guy Lombardo Avenue, Freeport, NY 11520.

Urner Goodman Scholarship of the Order of the Arrow:

Scholarship consists of five \$4,000 scholarships to Eagle Scouts planning professional careers in Scouting. Applications are available from the Order of the Arrow Office, Boy Scouts of America, 1325 West Walnut Hill Lane, P.O. Box 152079, Irving, Texas 75015-2019.

Frank D. Visceglia Memorial Scholarship:

A \$1,000 scholarship is available to Eagle Scouts whose Eagle Scout Projects focused either on the environment or the economy. Deadline is September 30. Applications are available from Frank D. Visceglia Memorial Scholarship Programs, Attention: Dennis Kohl, 12 Mount Pleasant Turnpike, Denville, New Jersey 07834.

Frank L. Weil Memorial Eagle Scout Scholarship:

A \$1,000 scholarship with two second place \$500 awards is available to Eagle Scouts of the Jewish faith who have earned

their Ner Tamid medal. Applications are due by January 1 of each year. Contact is the National Jewish Committee on Scouting, S226, Boy Scouts of America, 1325 West Walnut Hill Lane, P.O. Box 152079, Irving, Texas 75015-2029.

Law Enforcement Assistance Award:

An award of \$1,000 and an engraved plaque is available to Eagle Explorers who assist law enforcement agencies in a meaningful and exceptional way. Successful candidates must have performed an act which "assisted in the prevention or solution of a serious crime or an act which assisted in leading to the apprehension of a wanted felony suspect." The award is payable to accredited colleges for tuition only. Applications must be mailed by March 1 to the Exploring Division, S210, Boy Scouts of America, 1325 West Walnut Hill Lane, P.O. Box 152079, Irving, Texas 75015-2079.

Choate Rosemary Hall School:

Located in Wallingford, Connecticut is one of the most highly regarded prep schools, which tracks its graduates into some of the most selective colleges in America. It offers a full tuition (\$21, 920) scholarship to entering Eagles in high school, or for a "fifth year" prior to college. The contact is Choate Rosemary Hall Admissions, P.O. Box 788, Wallingford, CT 06492.

Sheryl A. Horak Law Enforcement Explorer Memorial Scholarship:

A \$1,000, one-time scholarship for law enforcement Eagle Explorers in their senior year of high school. Criteria include your academic record, leadership, extra-curriculars and a personal statement on why you want a law enforcement career. Applications are due March 1. The contact is Exploring Division, S210, Boy Scouts of America, 1325 West Walnut Hill Lane, P.O. Box 152079, Irving, Texas 75015-2079.

Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms Special Agents' Scholarships and the U.S. Customs Law Enforcement Explorer Scholarships:

A \$1,000 scholarship, from each Bureau, is awarded every other year to Eagle Law Enforcement Explorers. Applications are available from our Servicenter and should be certified locally by March 15, and sent in by April 1.

A number of individual colleges and universities offer scholarships for Eagle Scouts. All awards are administered by the financial aid or admissions office of each college. (Many of these scholarships have been endowed by Eagle Scout alumni of these colleges who, to fulfill their Eagle charge, have been given back more than they got from Scouting.)
