As We Gather ~ Holding God to His Word

Jacob wrestled with God; he would not let Him go until he received a blessing from Him (Gen. 32:22–32). So it was with the Canaanite woman. Though Jesus seemed to ignore and reject her, she continued to call upon His name and look to Him for help (Mt. 15:21–28). Even when the Lord called her a little dog, she held on to Him in faith and would not let Him wriggle out of His words: "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." This Gentile woman shows herself to be a true Israelite, who struggles with God and man in Christ and prevails. "O woman, great is your faith! Be it done for you as you desire" (Mt. 15:27–28). This is the sanctifying will of God (1 Thess. 4:1–7)—to test your faith in order that it may be refined and strengthened. For tribulation produces perseverance; perseverance, character; character, hope. And hope in Christ does not disappoint (Rom. 5:1–5).

The Bringing Servant of God: Sermons Series for the Season of Lent Rev. Dr. Joel G. Koepp

This year, we will be spend our Lenten Mid-week services reflecting on the Servant Songs in Isaiah (Isaiah 42:1-9; 49:1-13; 50:4-11; 52:13-15). This Wednesday, we will look at the Second Sermon Song, Isaiah 49:1-13. We will also read through the Pastoral Epistle 1 Timothy. It is beautiful letter written by Paul to Timothy. What we will ponder in our hearts is the reality of the "The Bringing Servant of God." Each week, we will look closely at one aspect prophesied by Isaiah about the coming Messiah in three main ways: (1) What the messiah is proclaimed to bring; (2) How that prophecy was fulfilled in the Passion and life of Christ; (3) the full significance and realization of what Christ has brought both now and in the time to come. While there is a common thread that runs throughout each of the texts, each one proclaims the truth of the ultimate grace and mercy of God as shown in the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ for you. As we spend this season in Christ's Passion, I encourage you to prayerfully consider The Suffering Servant FOR YOU!

It is common practice for many to fast during this time, usually done by "giving something up for Lent." It is not a mandated practice, but it can be a helpful one, if done properly. The idea behind "giving something up," is to restore priority to our days in the Word of God. If you choose to fast from something, whatever time you have normally spent in that activity, you instead are to fill that time with Reading the Scriptures and prayer. This year, I encourage you to read through Isaiah in the mornings taking a chapter or two at a time, and the Letter's of 1 & 2 Timothy, and Titus in the evenings.

May the Lord bless your Lent Season, and bring us to the joyful celebration of Easter!

<u>Liturgical Colors (X)</u>

Pentecost and the Commemoration of Martyrs: Red

Red symbolizes fire, and therefore, red is appropriate for the Feast of Pentecost and those festivals of renewal in the Holy Spirit, like Reformation, church dedications an anniversary of a congregation, missions, Confirmation, and Ordinations. The red of fire began when the Church grew out of the Pentecost event, when the Gospel was preached to all nations and in every language as the Holy Spirit came upon the Apostles as tongues of fire. (Acts 2:1-21) The same Spirit continues to come to the Church today through the 'God-breathed' or 'God-Spirited' Word. (2 Tim. 3:16) The Holy Spirit comes to comfort us through the Office of the Holy Ministry in which that Word is hidden in Preaching and the Sacraments. Our Lord breathed on those whom He sent out, saying, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you withhold forgiveness from any, it is withheld." (John 20:22-23) It is through this means of grace, which flow through this Office of Christ, that we breathe-in the Spirit of our Lord. We receive new life into our nostrils just as Adam did at creation. (Gen. 2:7) Through Baptism, Absolution, Preaching, and the Lord's Supper, we receive the very life and Spirit of Jesus. We are made new creatures, just like Adam before his fall and our own fall into sin. Again, we can live eternally with our Lord in paradise.

Red is also the color of blood, and is reserved for commemorations of those saints who were martyred, including most of the Holy Apostles and the Holy Innocents. The color red is also used on Holy Cross Day because it is a tribute to the sacred cross on which our Lord shed His most precious blood.
