How Important is The Resurrection?

In hundreds of houses of worship this Easter, people will be told that whether Jesus actually rose from the dead is not important.

"If he remained dead and His body decomposed into dust, we can still think of His spirit as being with us," they will be told.

Is the Resurrection unimportant? Could Jesus have remaind dead after the crucifixion and still be our Saviour?

Let's illustrate. Suppose you are exploring in a wooded area and lose your compass. After walking a long time, you realize you are lost. You cry for help. There is no answer.

In your fright you stumble into a deep, raging stream. You can't swim. You try to climb out, but the current pulls you down. You struggle for life. It seems you will drown.

Then a friend appears at the river bank. He sees your plight and leaps into the water. Soon he has you in tow and is headed toward the shore. You realize he must love you very much, for he is risking his life to save you.

But the strong current proves too much for your friend. His strength gives out. He could let you go and swim to safety himself, but he loves you too much to give up. Both you and your friend are drowned.

This is an unselfish act indeed. What comfort there is in realizing you have a friend who loves you so much he will give his life to save you. And yet, though he gives his life, he cannot save you, for he dies in the attempt. Both of you perish.

This is a picture of lost sinners.

We have all lost our way. "All we like sheep have gone astray" (Isaiah 53:6).

We have all fallen into sin. This brings spiritual death. "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). "Death passed upon all men, for that all have

sinned" (Romans 5:12).

But Christ came to us where we were. "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners" (I Timothy 1:15).

He loved us so much He gave His life to save us. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). "For when we were yet without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly" (Romans 5:6).

"Hereby perceive we the love of god, because he laid down his life for us" (I John 3:16).

Here ends the parallel between the attempt of your friend to rescue you from drowning and Christ's death to save you from sin.

Death could not hold our heavenly Rescuer. After saving us by dying on the cross, He came back to life. Therefore He is able to save us. "For if. . .we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son; much more, being reconciled, we shall be saved by his life" (Romans 5:10).

Because He lives, He can bring us out of the raging torrent of sin which would sweep us to eternal damnation.

He says, "I am he that liveth, and was dead; and, behold, I am alive forevermore, Amen; and have the keys of hell and death" (Revelation 1:18).

Because He lives, He can stay with us and lead us through the dark, treacherous morass of this world until we arrive safely home in heaven.

He says, "Lo, I am with you always" (Matthew 28:20). "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee" (Hebrews 13:5).

"Wherefore he is able to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by him, seeing he ever liveth to make intercession for them" (Hebrews 7:25).

Jesus lives to finish the rescue operation! All we have to do is believe.

Hope

"Why art thou cast down, O my soul? And why art thou disquieted in me? Hope thou in God: For I shall yet praise Him for the help of his countenance." Psalms 42:5

The Apostle Paul was explaining the hope of the resurrection from the grave for Christ's believers, when he made this statement: "If in this life only we have hope in Christ Jesus, we are of all men most miserable." (I Corinthians 15:19) Pauls bold statement shows that the Christian has hope beyond this short lifetime on earth. That hope is also mentioned by John when he explained that we would be like Jesus when he returns to receive His own unto Himself. John wrote:—"and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is. And every man that hath this hope in him purifieth himself, even as he is pure." (I John 3:2-3)

What is hope? Hope is mentioned in the King James version of the New Testament more than fifty times. Hope is expectation. Hope is to be patient. Hope is to trust. Hope is to anticipate with pleasure and confidence. Hope is very closely related to faith. I Thessalonians 2:19 states, "For

what is our hope, or joy, or crown of rejoicing?

In the charity chapter, Paul wrote: "and now abideth these three, faith, hope, charity, but the greatest of these is charity." (I Corinthians 13:13). Charity is derived from the Greek work agape which means love. Here we are told agape is greater than faith. Here we are told that agape is greater than hope, But we are not told that agape abides alone. Agape - love - charity abides with faith. Agape love—charity abides with hope." Now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity." Hope abides with faith and love. Love does not abide alone. Faith does not abide alone.

Galatians 5:5 simply states: "For we through the Spirit wait for the hope of righteousness by faith."

Paul referred to this hope as an anchor of the soul, sure and steadfast. (Hebrews 6:19) Peter spoke of Christ having begotten us again to a lively (living-alive) hope. (I Peter 1:8) He also admonished believers to be ready to give an answer for a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear. (I Peter 3:15) When Paul stood on trial before the council he testified "of the hope and resurrection of the dead, am I called in question." (Acts 23:6')

It is needless for Christians to be frustrated or ashamed when trials, testings and temptations come and when things simply go wrong. Scripture deals with this. Paul wrote about standing grace in Romans 5:2-5; "By whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand and rejoice in hope of the glory of God. And not only so, but we glory in tribulations also; knowing that tribulation worketh patience; and patience, experience, and experience hope: and hope maketh not ashamed because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us." Rather than being ashamed or frustrated by our trials, we rejoice in hope.

In I Thessalonians 5:8 we find the recommendation of putting on spiritual armor, as we also find in the sixth


chapter of Ephesians. One of the important parts of the armor is the helmet that protects the head and the brain. Paul gave this recommendation, "But let us who are of the day, be sober, putting on the breastplate of faith and love; and for a helmet, the hope of salvation." (I Thessalonians 5:8).

There are people who do not have this hope. We read in Ephesians 2:12, "That at that time ye were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel and strangers from the covenants of promise having no hope and without God in the world." When men are without Christ, they are aliens to God and have no hope. Paul compared those who have no hope against the believers that die in Christ. We read in I Thessalonians 4:14-17 that Christians who have died in Christ are called: 1. Them which are asleep, 2. Them also which sleep in Jesus and 3. The dead in Christ. These he compared against others who have no hope. It is evident that those who die in Christ have the hope of the resurrection. It is explained here that when Christ returns the dead in Christ shall rise first after which the living Christians will be caught up together with them to ever be with the Lord. Furthermore we are advised that we must comfort each other with this hope.

Throughout the fall and winter months most all of us look forward to springtime and summer. We know that winter will give way to warmer times. This is not faith—this is hope. So we can also rest in the hope of the resurrection. It is God's firm committment to those that obey Him.

Now abides Hope—along with faith and love. Hope thou in

Have you ever noticed how often Jesus was not there just when someone thought He ought to be? He seemed to have a knack of being gone just when others thought He ought to be present.

It started back in Nazareth when He was a babe. Remember the story in Matthew 2:13-15 how Joseph slipped his little family out of the Holy Land into Egypt when Herod's soldiers were trying to kill the infant King? The soldiers massacred al the babies in the Bethlehem area, trying to kill off the threat to Herod's throne. But when they wanted to find Jesus and kill Him, He wasn't there. He was gone.

Then at age 12, Jesus' family made its trek to Jerusalem for the Passover. It was a time of traditional observances, of fellowship, of escape and vacation for Mary and Joseph. They took Jesus along to learn and see and share in this heritage.

But God had other plans for his Son. When the days had passed and the little family was on the way back with their friends, they looked for Jesus, and He wasn't there! Perhaps they wanted to ask Him how He felt about this annual pilgrimage, but they couldn't find Him. He wasn't playing with the other boys in the long caravan as they thought. He was gone!

They found Him back in Jerusalem absorbed in deep religious discussions with the temple personnel. He was gone from His earthly parents, but quite happy in His Father's work. When asked why He had caused alarm by His absence, He replied, "Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?"

Then one day He left home for good. As His ministry unfolded, His disciples left their nets and moneychanging tables to follow Him. Later a reunion in His hometown was planned. (Read Luke 4:16-30). Part of the schedule was to attend a service in the familiar Nazareth synagogue.

As the visiting celebrity the hometown boy was invited to stand and read from the Holy Book. And He was allowed to comment on the Scriptures.

The congregation waited—perhaps with smiles of joy on their faces in anticipation of some grateful words about the religious leaders of His hometown. Would He recall those who had taught Him? Would He reflect the golden truths that had been ingrained in His mind those years before?

No! His words fell as foreign phrases on their ears. He gave a strange new twist to their beliefs. He read from Isaiah 61 and dared to identify himself as the worker of these prophetic truths!

They were angered. How dare He?

There was but one way to deal with such a heretic, no matter if His family were village residents. Kill Him!

Then it happened. Just as they lifted rocks to stone Him, this Jesus, this challenger of precious traditions disappeared. Just when they aimed their rocks, He was gone!

The years passed. Jesus' popularity rose and waned. One day word came that one of His close friends—Lazarus, brother to Mary and Martha—was ill. (Read John 11:1-46). The call went out for Jesus, the healer, the friend, to come and do what He could for Lazarus. How angry Mary and Martha were when the time passed, Lazarus grew worse, and Jesus failed to show up.

Just when they needed Him the most, Jesus was gone!

When Jesus finally showed up, Lazarus was dead. The accusation was crisp, cold and clear: "My brother would not have died if You had been here."

Where had He been? "Gone!" They put the blame on Him.

But you know the outcome. In not being there, Jesus found opportunity for a miracle greater than healing: restoring life to a dead man. What an impact on the crowd! What a memory for each one who witnessed it!

"Gone" isn't necessarily bad. It may be frightening, threatening, unusual; but often "gone" is the door to the miraculous.

Now the Easter season has come. All the disappearances of Jesus' life are but trivia compared to the great disappearance of that first Easter.

The Sabbath was past. The disciples had been in hiding, nursing their wounds, trying to forget the past and plan for a future without their Leader.

With the rising of the sun the women went to the garden where they last saw the precious form of their Master. Many questions were in their minds. Would the guards let them near the tomb? Would they be permitted to embalm the body of their Lord? Who would move the stone away from the door of the tomb to let them in?

But when they arrived, they found the stone was already rolled away, and two men in shining garments stood by the tomb. These were not Roman soldiers. They weren't grave robbers or aides to the high priest. Why, they were angels, messengers of the Almighty.

And they spoke to the women. "Why seek ye the living among the dead? He is not here, but is risen; remember how he spake unto you...?"

Gone!

Not reburied somewhere. Not stolen by His enemies. Not just mysteriously missing. No. He had risen. He was alive. But gone! Gone from the tomb and alive forevermore in the hearts of the faithful. That was the angels' marvelous message.

For one eternal moment that single word meant all they needed to know. Gone!

For all these centuries that one great fact has held together the vast hopes and dreams of countless Christians of every continent. The tomb still stands, but the Occupant is gone. And because He lives, we too can live.

"Gone" can be good news. Think of all the places on earth where you wouldn't want to find someone you loved: on the battlefront; on skid row; at death's door in a hospital emergency room. There must be dozens of places where "gone" is good news. "Gone" can be victory.

And Christ's being gone from the tomb is the heart of Easter. The best news ever published. The greatest story ever told.

God's Plan Of Tithing

Mal. 3:7-10. Even from the days of Your Fathers are Ye gone away from Mine ordinances, and have not kept them. Return unto Me, and I will return unto You, saith the Lord of hosts. But Ye said, wherein shall we return? V. 8

Will a man rob God? Yet ye have robbed Me. But ye say wherein have we robbed Thee? In tithes and offerings. V.9 Ye are cursed with a curse; for ye have robbed Me, even this whole Nation. V.10. Bring ye all the tithes into the store house, that there may be meat in Mine house, and prove Me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open You the windows of Heaven, and pour You out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it. Verses 11 through 18 continue to tell us what the Lord will do if We do these things that He has commanded Us to do.

This is just another one of the things that God has commanded us to do. Titheing is a very vital part of Gods plan. Some will say that it was just a part of The Mosiac Law, no titheing was done before the law, Gen. 14:18-20, and Mel-chizedeck, King of Salem, brought forth bread and wine: and He was the priest of the most high God. And he blessed him, and said, blessed be Abram of the most high God, possessor of heaven and earth: and blessed be the most high God, which hath delivered thine enemies into thy hand. And He gave tithes of all.

Giving tithes of all is good, but that does not mean that there is not a set rule for paying tithes. One more place in the scripture that I know of speaks of the people giving all. Acts. 4:34-35, "Neither was there any among them that lacked: for as many of them that were possessors of lands or houses sold them, and brought the prices of the things that were sold, and laid them down at the apostles' feet: and distribution was made unto every man according as He had need." Evidently this was not practiced very long because we have no further record of this being done any more. There is another scripture that talks about the collection for the poor saints, but this is speaking of a collection not titheing, 1 Cor. 16:1-2, Now concerning the collection for the saints, as I have given order to the churches in or of Galatia. even so do Ye. Upon the first day of the week let everyone of You lay by Him in store, as God hath prospered Him, that there be no gatherings when I come. This was alms or

We would like to give you all of the scripture on titheing that we can, but I am sure that you can take a good concordance and find many more than we will be able to use in this lesson, but I believe that tithes is for the support of the ministry, offerings and gifts are for the support of the church. Alms are to help the needy, some believe that tithes can be used to pay on the church bills, or build churches, no, tithes is for the support of the ministry. Tithes is one tenth of our increase, now that does not mean after We have paid all of our bills and bought what We want, if it did there would never be any left to give to the Lord, for many people still live from one pay day to the next one. I will tell you from my own experience why we must first pay our tithes, then the other. When I first converted, we were taught tithing, but I was in debt and money in those days was not so

plentiful as it is today, and I thought that I must first pay bills, then I will pay tithes. But there was never very much left so I only gave what I thought I could. But I soon found that this would not work, when I paid tithes first, then I also had enough to pay my bills also. You can not out give God. He never promised to make anyone rich because they pay tithes. He said he would return to us four fold, but that doesn't always mean money. People say, but I don't have very much to give, it isn't how much we give, but it is being faithful with what we have.

Consider the poor widow who only gave two mites, Mark 12:42 also Luke 21:1-4. I received a letter one time with a dime in it from a lady that I had never heard from before and she said that it was her tithes and in those days you could still buy a loaf of bread for a dime, and that was just what we needed at that time. It may seem strange to people today to think that there was ever a time when people did not have the money to even buy a loaf of bread, but there are many of us that do remember those times. Some churches say we cannot support a pastor. Let me give you an example. A pastor should be willing to live like his congregation, not above, not below, just in round figures let us say there are ten families in a church and each one of these families earn \$100.00 per week. Ten percent of their earnings would be \$10.00, which multiplied by ten would be \$100.00 per week. Then after He paid his tithes he would have only \$90.00, left the same as all the other 10 families. So you see how tithing will work if Gods people are faithful. So we are to pay tithes on our gross income, as I stated before we pay the car, the house, the grocery bill, etc. first We will never have but very little left to give to God's work. Old Testament scriptures speak of the tithe of the grain and fruits of the field, in those days money was not used as it is today. It was more like barter system, they worked on farms and received and paid tithes with the same, Lev. 27:30-33 The tithe of the orchard, field, flock, herd, was the Lords, so is our wages or salary. Numbers 18:24-28 tells us who the tithe belongs to, it was the only inheritance that the Levites, (Priest tribe) had. It also informs us that as the priests received tithes, they also paid tithes.

Neh. 13:5 also gives us further instruction as to who should receive tithes, then the tenth verse, also gives us the reason why sometimes ministers have to work. I would like to say this, I do not believe that we as a church, should ever call a pastor or an evangelist or party and expect someone else to support them, also when you have a revival, do not give all of your finance to either the pastor or the evangelist party. If you do, then one suffers, I have known this to happen. What I am trying to convey to us is this: If you worked on a job and they hired some new men to work and said to you, we can't pay you anything until we get through with these other men. Would you go ahead and work for nothing? No? Well, that is just what we are doing when we ask a pastor to wait until a revival is over before we give him any more tithes, or if we do not support the evangelistic party, we are doing the same thing, Deut. 12:5-6 tells us to bring all tithes and offerings to the place where we worship.

The question may be asked, does the minister have to pay tithes? Yes, Heb. 7:9 and as I may so say, Levi also, who receiveth tithes, paid tithes in Abraham, many of the different church denominations pay their tithes into the church, and then the church pays them a salary. I have no quarrel with anyone about this, I simply believe that we have a better way which I also believe to be God's way.

New Testament Scriptures

Matt. 23:23, Luke 18:12, I. Cor. 9:13-14, 2 Cor. 9:6-7. Please read these scriptures which all speak of tithing and offerings.

In conclusion may I say that the important thing for all Christians is to support all phases of the work of God, but every church body should be (and should feel a responsibility) for their own church and pastor, but I do not feel that our responsibility ends there, so don't fail to support the work of God.
