PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE...

Presbyterian Pastor Eugene Peterson has guided many a pastor to more faithful performance of his/her duties. As I settle in here at FPC, there are a few wise pieces of his advice that stick with me, and I wanted to share them.

One, like myself, Peterson was raised in a Pentecostal church with a devoted mother who over performed in service of the gospel. In Fact, he calls himself a Presbycostal—a hashtag that has nothing to do with speaking in tongues or any other aspect of Pente-



costal belief. No, I would sum up the take-away from the faith of his youth as this: *if theology can't be lived, then it isn't theology.* I don't know if this really comes from Pentecostalism—it seems to me that Calvin had this aspect of Christian piety down long ago. No matter its actual source, I believe Peterson has it right—the gospel is meant to be transformative in a way that does not separate action from belief, systemization from service. I hope this is always an aspect of my preaching: theological nuggets one can tuck away for faith and encouragement are fine but integrating them into lifestyle is the goal.

Two, in his book, <u>The Pastor</u>, Peterson asks, "the where does the Pastor work?" In the office? In the pulpit? On her cell phone at the stop light? No, Peterson asserts that the "place" of the Pastor's work is the congregation. The church is its people, he reminds us and to work in a church is to attach to and work among the people. Yes, you have a right to expect office hours from me, this is not an anti-office rant—quite the opposite. Being in the office not only keeps me accessible, but also has the effect of helping me to focus on what matters—the work of the Pastor in their congregation.

Three, Peterson titled one of his books, <u>A Long Obedience in the Right Direction: Discipleship in an Instant Society.</u> The full quote upon which his title is based comes from an unusual source, Friedrich Nietzsche of "God is Dead" fame. But even a broken clock can be right twice a day! Nietzsche said, "The essential thing in heaven and earth is that there should be a long obedience in the same direction; there results, and has always resulted in the long run, something which has made life worth living." For me, that says it all. Loving church, seeking God's will always requires taking the long view. Theologically every church is connected to the universal church; we do not labor alone but are part of a powerful force with varying gifts that is one through all of time and space. Put a little more simply, we are connected to a massive plan that began at an empty tomb and will end at an end-time feast in God's presence; we are just a piece of a bigger puzzle, and the whole. That makes faith something bigger—but it also means this, incremental steps through decades of change, generations which hold the faith for their "work-shift" committees and councils which make decisions for our future in God...these are all just part of a chain. We are accountable not for the whole picture—this is God's plan after all. We are accountable for our small section of God's assignment, in our time, and in our place—to build on the foundation laid by generations before us and knowing we are part of a long obedience in the right direction.

Faith, patience, prayer and work—fidelity to the scripture and the willingness to put our hope into action...these are our tools to do God's will in obedience to the great commission. So, let us move forward together in that long obedience in the right direction.

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NURSE'S NOTES...

July is most celebrated for Independence Day on the 4th oh July. I do happen to have a story to share with you about Independence Day. Here it goes:

A story was told many years ago about a young Hispanic man who was new to the United States of America.

Feeling a bit out of place, but desperately wanting to fit in and learn about the culture of America in general, and the outrageously popular sport of baseball in particular, Jose (pronounced ho-zay) decided to attend a local baseball sporting event. This particular ball game was played on the 4th of July.

He was a bit surprised before the game started to see the massive crowd stand to its feet and begin to sing.

As Jose was not a man of large stature, he became a bit dismayed, wondering if he would be able to see the ball game with large numbers of tall Amercanos standing all around him.

As soon as they faced the flag and raised their voices in song, however, Jose was put at ease. How welcoming they all were! Their concern for him touched his heart deeply.

The very first thing that gigantic mass of people sang to him was: "Jose, can you see?"

Happy 4th of July everyone!

July is eye injury prevention month. According to WebMD the top causes of eye injuries are as follows:

• Blow to your eye:

A strike to the eye with a hard object like a baseball, rock, or fist can damage the eye, eyelids, and muscles or bones that surround the eye. If the injury is mild, you may get a swollen eyelid or black eye. If it's more sever, you might also notice bleeding inside the eye. If you're hit enough, it could break the bones around your eye. Sometimes the eye muscles get trapped inside the broken bone, and will need to be freed with surgery.

Cut or Scratch:

A stick, finger, or other object can accidentally get into your eye and scratch the cornea, the clear dome -like cover over your eye. A scratch can cause symptoms like: blurred vision, light sensitivity, pain, redness or excess tears.

Small scratches usually will heal on their own. Deeper injuries can cause long-term vision problems.

Object in the eye:

Grains of sand, wood chips, metal shavings, or slivers of glass can get into the eye. A sharp object inside your eye can scratch or cut your cornea.

Having something in your eye will feel uncomfortable and it might make your eye water. When the cornea is scratched, it will feel like something is inside your eye and you can't get it out.



NURSE'S NOTES...

Chemical Burns:

Represent 7%-10% of eye injuries. Although many burns result in minor discomfort, every chemical exposure or burn should be taken seriously. Permanent damage is possible and can be blinding or life-altering.

Most chemical burns to the eyes occur at work, but some can take place in the home with regular household cleaners.

Radiation:

The sun's ultraviolet, or UV, rays can burn your eyes, just like they can burn your skin. Signs that you've been exposed to too much UV radiation are red eyes, light sensitivity, tearing, and a feeling like something is in your eyes.

In the long run, too much sun and other forms of radiation can make you more likely to get cataracts or macular degeneration, a breakdown of a small area of the retina.

When to call a doctor?:

You can treat lots of minor eye injuries on your own. A deep cut or broken bone needs medical help. Also, see a doctor for anything sharp in your eye, like a piece of metal or glass.

Call your doctor if you have any of these signs of a more serious injury:

- A noticeable change in vision
- Swelling in the eye
- Double Vision
- Severe Pain
- ◆ Torn eyelid
- Headache

When to call 911?:

Go to an emergency room or call 911 right away if:

- A piece of metal, glass, or object is stuck in your eye
- A chemical got in your eye, and the pain didn't go away after you flushed the eye with water

How to protect your eyes and prevent injuries?:

The best way to protect your eyes is to wear safety glasses or goggles whenever you work with chemicals or are around metal, glass, or other objects that could fly into your eyes. Also put on safety glasses when you use tools like a lawnmower, trimmer, or leaf blower.

Eye guards are a must for sports like basketball and racquetball. If you play baseball or football, protect your eyes with a shield attached to your helmet.

Other ways to guard against eye injuries:


- Remove small rocks and other debris from your lawn before you mow, so your lawnmower doesn't kick them up into your eyes.
- Fix or replace any tools or equipment that might break apart while you use them.



NURSE'S NOTES...(continued)

- Read the instructions before using chemicals like fertilizer or cleaning products. Never mix chemicals unless the label says to do so.
- Use machine guards and work screens while working with equipment on the job.
- When you go outside, wear sunglasses that block out 99% to 100% of the sun's radiation.





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

CLERK'S REPORT

PASTOR'S REPORT

Pastor Leanne thanked the office staff for their helpfulness. She will be preaching at the Outdoor Worship Service and is engaging the congregation in "cottage" meetings. A special summer confirmation class is being scheduled. A date for Pastor Leanne's installation service will need to be set.

COMMITTEE REPORTS (from meeting and minutes)

Administrative and Personnel: The committee is reviewing applications for the Christian Education Director.

Business and Finance: A subcommittee of Property and Equipment Committee (Nanc Skaret, Linda Tonolli, Ann Lynch, Donna Richter and Sue Sorlie) has proposed a stained glass hanging be designed by BSC art instructor, Barb Thorsen, made of pieces from the demolished Presbyterian Church (1892-1967). The stained glass pieces were saved by Ardeth Taylor whose daughter, Kathy, gave the pieces back to FPC. Session approved the use of \$1,000 from Memorial Fund to proceed with this project.

Session also approved a request from Worship & Music Committee to use about \$3,000 from the Merritt Reserve Fund to replace the amplifier for the Carillon Bells and Choir speaker and to purchase digital wireless system with beltpack and lapel.

Christian Education: Seven youth will be attending Clearwater Forest Camp, with Dennis Rosenkranz and Pastor Leanne providing transportation. Congregational donations to help assist campers with the cost will be appreciated.

Membership: Attendance pads for the pews were purchased; ushers collect them at the end of Sunday worship. Planning for the Outdoor Worship Service is going well, with Wilton, Mandan and Bismarck churches participating. Eight people enjoyed the golf outing.

Outreach: Session approved scholarships for Olivia Bachmeier, Mark Jensen, Cole Svihovec, and Runick Fru.

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SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Annually, \$2,000 is given to the University of Jamestown from the Samuel and Bertha Merritt Trust Fund. The Higher Power Lunch was deemed a success. The Backpack program which serves about 1,200 children weekly, received 206 jars of jelly/peanut butter from FPC.

Property and Equipment: Thanks to Bob Kinnischtzke for adding the mulch around the trees on Thayer Ave. The committee sponsored a workday at church on June 16.

Stewardship: \$455 of the Pentecost Offering will go to the playground equipment for the Child Care Center. The committee will probably be using the "Pony Express" method for Stewardship this fall.

Worship and Music: Dakota Sound Systems will provide the updated equipment approved by Session.

Child Care Center Board: Chair Ella Gutzke reported to Session on the current financial status of the CCC. A strain on the budget is the unintended consequence of a 2015 policy concerning vacation time for CCC staff. A proposal to change this policy will be reviewed by Administrative and Personnel Committee, with their recommendation coming to the Session in July.

Fine Arts Festival: Pastor Leanne will meet with the committee on June 27th.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Pastor Leanne will lead the long-range planning/visioning after the "cottage" meetings are held. She may ask Session to focus on the driving forces for church vibrancy, the church's visibility in the community and cyber presence.
