REFLECTION

It's our Year of Prophesy and Testimonies

After an inspiring, spirit-filled, soul-liberating message, Receive a Blessing, and Be a Blessing, by Deacon H. during our New Year Eve and New Year Day Masses, we, as a church family, were prompted by the spirit to pray our way into the New Year. We prayed in thanksgiving to God for God's blessings over us. We also prayed for the forgiveness of sins against God and our neighbors, and for God's blessings in the New Year based on our various needs and aspirations. These prayer points, which took the place of a published Prayers of the Faithful, were accompanied by inspirational songs. Know Your Faith

I have often heard it said that the form of worship involving hand clapping and waving, shouts, call and response preaching, and general bodily expression of the touch of the Spirit is a "Baptist (particularly Black Baptist) church style of worship." As such it has no place and should not be employed in the Catholic liturgy. History, however, has shown that this form of worship predated the introduction of the Baptist faith and worship to the Black community. It is a common religious practice among the enslaved Africans to engage in ring shout, call and response, and bodily expression of the feeling of the spirit within them, religious practices that survived, among all other things, through transplantation, seasoning, slavery, segregation, and discrimination. These worship practices are originally Black. They are born out of who they were: their cultural, spiritual, and historical identity.

In the Second Vatican Council document, Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, paragraph 37, the Church emphasized and encouraged the adaptation of our liturgy to our cultural and spiritual identity, "provided [such identity] harmonize with [the liturgy] true and authentic spirit." Our challenge thus becomes reflecting on and discovering our identity, who we are, and what sets us apart as St. Joseph (Maysville) Church family. A well-defined identity properly adapted to our liturgical life will go a long way to make our worship truly our own and truly spirit-filled. And so, I throw the challenge to us members of St. Joseph (Maysville) Church family, what is or what do you think is our identity?
