### **SCRIPTURAL REFLECTION: ANGER & LOVE**

Recently I stumbled into a TV show titled, My Little Secret. It showed horrible stories of teens who murdered their parent(s), driven by various reasons (or lack of) and emotions. The one I briefly watched (for fear of nightmares) was nearing the end anyway. The daughter had stabbed her mother almost 40 times! Her reason: she (daughter) was angry with her. No, the teen was not emotionally or psychologically sick. She was actually an 'A' student. She was intelligent enough, aided by some loophole in the system, to not only be free in less than years, but applied to Harvard. She was accepted until she was identified.

Now that's an extreme case of what pure anger can do. We have seen it again and again in our society and around the world. In our homes and all around us, we have seen lesser forms and effects of anger. The gospel invites us to observe Jesus in a rare moment of anger and learn a few things from the Master.

An angry Jesus, whip in hand! That's beyond anger, that's more like furious! This image will not sit well with many of us who would rather an eternally smiling Jesus. The good news is that Jesus is the gentlest guy who ever walked our planet! But that doesn't mean He was weak. When the occasion demanded it, He was very strong and very assertive. The saying goes that virtue lies in the middle. That will help us in a lot we do in life and in our relationship with God. First, our relationship with God.

Not too long ago, the Church focused on a strict God and what He demands from us. It drove many into this fear-filled relationship with God, much like the child of a very strict no-nonsense parent. Now, that has been or is being corrected. But we might be heading into another extreme where God loves us so much that He's cool with just about whatever we do that makes us happy or will simply dismiss them with a wave of hand. Well, Jesus was cool and gentle with the marginalized and with sinners who knew their need of repentance. As for those on the other side of that divide, He never minced words in trying to bring them, like straying sheep, back into the fold. Today, He used whip to achieve just that and clean up their mess.

Now, let's see how Jesus' example could help us in what we do daily. First, Jesus was OK with being angry, reminding us that there's a good side to anger. Call it good anger. Good anger is an anger that can spur us to make right that which is blatantly wrong. There are times we ought to be angry. An unjust situation should make us angry. In this case, it becomes an expression of love, especially, if we're acting like Jesus, that is, doing it for God and for the good of our neighbors.

Finally, there's bad anger. Another saying comes to mind: you can measure the size of a person's soul by the size of the things that make that person angry. I'm always awed and frustrated at the extent we get worked up (including myself) over practically inconsequential things. Making it even worse, unlike Jesus, our Master and our model, most often our anger is motivated and propelled to great heights by our selfish interests.

May our Lenten journey help us appreciate the two sides of Jesus and help us imitate Him.

# FRANCES OF ROME RELIGIOUS (1384 - 1440) MARCH 9<sup>TH</sup>

Frances' life combines aspects of secular and religious life. A devoted and loving wife, she longed for a lifestyle of prayer and service, so she organized a group of women to minister to the needs of Rome's poor.

Born of wealthy parents, Frances found herself attracted to the religious life during her youth. But her parents objected and a young nobleman was selected to be her husband.

As she became acquainted with her new relatives, Frances soon discovered that the wife of her husband's brother also wished to live a life of service and prayer. So the two, Frances and Vannozza, set out together - with their husbands' blessings to help the poor.

Frances fell ill for a time, but this apparently only deepened her commitment to the suffering people she met. The years passed, and Frances gave birth to two sons and a daughter. With the new responsibilities of family life, the young mother turned her attention more to the needs of her own household. The family flourished under Frances' care, but within a few years a great plague began to sweep across Italy. It struck Rome with devastating cruelty and left Frances' second son dead. In an effort to help alleviate some of the suffering, Frances used all her money and sold her possessions to buy whatever the sick might possibly need. When all the resources had been exhausted, Frances and Vannozza went door to door begging. Later, Frances' daughter died, and the saint opened a section of her house as a hospital.

Frances became more and more convinced that this way of life was so necessary for the world, and it was not long before she requested and was given permission to found a society of women bound by no vows. They simply offered themselves to God and to the service of the poor. Once the society was established, Frances chose not to live at the community residence, but rather at home with her husband. She did this for seven years, until her husband passed away, and then came to live the remainder of her life with the society - serving the poorest of the poor.

**COMMENT**: Looking at the exemplary life of fidelity to God and devotion to her fellow human beings which Frances of Rome was blessed to lead, one cannot help but be reminded of Mother Teresa of Calcutta, who loved Jesus Christ in prayer and also in the poor. The life of Frances of Rome calls each of us not only to look deeply for God in prayer, but also to carry our devotion to Jesus living in the suffering of our world. Frances shows us that this life need not be restricted to those bound by vows.

**QUOTE:** In *Something Beautiful for God*, Mother Teresa said of the sisters in her community: "Let Christ radiate and live His life in her and through her in the slums. Let the poor seeing her be drawn to Christ and invite Him to enter their homes and lives." Says Frances of Rome: "It is most laudable in a married woman to be devout, but she must never forget that she is a housewife. And sometimes she must leave God at the altar to find Him in her housekeeping" (*Butler's Lives of the Saints*).
