## CHAPTER MEETING SUMMARY

On November 20, fifteen members "Zoomed" into the monthly chapter meeting. **Kay Landers** welcomed all and invited everyone to introduce themselves and to respond to one of three questions. Eight members chose to name their favorite author(s), and the list included a few children's authors—Patricia Polacco (twice), Pleasant DeSpain, and Robert Munsch—and many other writers, including Melissa Gates, James Herriot, Garrison Keillor, Barak Obama, Tom Robbins, and one father. Nobody named any specific new stories they had learned, but seven talked about how their storytelling is different this year. One relatively new teller who has not yet told in a school is going to tell to her grandchildren. Another, who is accustomed to co-telling, has learned to introduce herself and to answer questions. One is adding poems to her repertoire; another is personalizing her stories. A couple are learning to tell at different grade levels, and another is honing her virtual presentation skills by doing weekly video announcements for Anthem Ranch.

**Kathy Daniels** shared "The Pumpkin Giant," which she had revised based on feed-back offered at the Story Circle, and Kay provided an update on the Broomfield Council of the Arts and Humanities (BCAH). She reported the sudden, unexpected death of Sherill Bunetta, BCAH's President and Treasurer, and then provided an overview of BCAH, explaining the support we receive and encouraging everyone to financially support BCAH. For an annual contribution of at least \$25 you receive the quarterly newsletter. Details are available on the BCAH webpage (<a href="www.artsinbroomfield.org">www.artsinbroomfield.org</a>). When you visit that website, click on "Programs" and check out the Spellbinders webpage. Kay also announced that Sherill's death has delayed our planned BCAH-sponsored Webinar; it will no longer be part of the world-wide Tellabration. Instead it will be called "Stories for the Season" and will be presented on **Saturday**, **December 12 from 4:00-5:00 PM**. **Kathy Daniels** gave us a "Library Moment," suggesting a few books of stories suitable for adults. They included *A Treasury of Western Folklore* and collections of Jack Tales and stories by James Thurber. We do not have access to our library during the Covid shutdown, so Kathy will deliver them to anyone who expresses interest. She also reminded us that the library contains many issues of *Storytelling* magazine that contain one- or two-page stories that she can copy and send. Let her know if you are interested. **Vicki Tiedeman** used "Screen Share" to walk us through the data sheet and noted that few members have reported their activities. She reminded us that she also can provide a simple worksheet and will post data for members who prefer that approach. Kay emphasized that having accurate data on the number of listeners we serve is essential. *If you have not yet reported your activities, please do so at once!* 

Three groups of four or five members then teamed up for an improv exercise that we called "Round Robin Stories." The challenge was for the team members to create a story built on either an opening line or a story title with no time to prepare. One team member would begin the story and tell for two minutes followed by the other team members in sequence, each picking up the story and adding his/her "two minutes worth." The story starters were: (1) "T'was the Day After Christmas" and (2) "Once there was a near-sighted young witch..." and (3) "It was a dark and stormy Christmas Eve..." Each story took odd twists and turns and none are likely to ever appear in print, but we had a few laughs (which are much-needed in these trying times).

Marylin Bittner shared "The King's Thanksgiving," a story she found at <a href="www.apples4theteacher.com">www.apples4theteacher.com</a>, and enhanced with visual props. Kay then encouraged all to send "get well" wishes to Judy Lloyd, who is recovering in ICU following extensive emergency spine surgery that will be followed by a lengthy rehab period.
