Church's Anniversary/Homecoming 2017

"A Synopsis"

Mt. Olive Baptist Church, Wicomico Church, Virginia, where Rev. Dr. Tyron Williams and Rev. Beatrice Williams serve as pastor and associate pastor respectively, was the place where fellowship was prevalent in abundance on September 23&24, 2017. The historical event was the celebration of the church's 144th Anniversary/64th Homecoming.

The theme: "Remembering the Past, Embracing the Present, Visualizing the Future" (Acts 2:44-47) was manifested in the displays both inside and outside of the church.

Among the large crowd that traveled from near and far to be a part of the two-day celebration were a former pastor, former interim pastors, family members of some of the deceased pastors, the church's Helping Hand Ministries of Baltimore, Maryland, Washington, D.C., and Virginia, and many members and friends.

Pastor Williams graciously moved throughout the crowd extending greetings with smiles and warm handshakes.

Saturday, September 23, 2017 was labeled as "Down Home Day." Artifacts displayed from the past included replicas of the first shelter for worship (The Brush Arbor) and the sanctuary of the old church equipped for a Sunday Morning Worship Service. Also on display were "The Farmers' Market", old photos, Bibles, clothing of the pastor when baptizing, tools for work, household utensils, and other artifacts. Some people wore attire typical of the era. The culminating activity for Saturday was an outdoor banquet. The preacher for the banquet was Rev. Angelo Chatmon, a former interim pastor of Mt. Olive and the present pastor of Pilgrim Journey Baptist Church, Henrico, Virginia.

Among those in attendance at the banquet who spoke and received memorial plaques in memory of deceased pastors were the family of: Rev. Nelson Lee (first pastor), Rev. J. J. Nickens (sixth pastor), and Rev. B. L. Robinson (seventh pastor).

Sunday's activities began with a "march" from the old church site to the present site. Sunday School, held under the Brush Arbor, was taught by Rev. Beatrice Williams. Rev. Ronald Turner, a former pastor of Mt. Olive delivered the "preached word" at Sunday's worship service. Rev. Turner is presently a national and international church consultant, while serving as pastor of Grace of God Christian Ministries in Michigan.

Rev. Williams, the Homecoming Committee, along with the entire Mt. Olive Church family, extend our deepest appreciation and gratitude to everyone who contributed to making our anniversary/homecoming a most memorable event in the legacy of Mt. Olive.



TEACHING AND REACHING FOR TRANSFORMATION



With the gravity of politics, power and position, we can forget how sweet and influential the grace of God is. Grace sustains us on our journey through the inevitable hard places and difficult seasons.

In *Transforming Grace* by Jerry Bridges, he reveals that we can never rightly understand God's grace until we understand our place as those who need His grace.

"We were dead in our transgressions, but God intervened. We were in bondage to sin, but God intervened. We were objects of wrath, but God intervened. God Who is rich in mercy intervened. Because of His great love for us, God intervened and made us alive with Christ, even when we were dead in our transgressions and sins. All this is summed up in one succinct statement: 'it is by grace you have been saved.' Our condition was hopeless, but God intervened in grace."



The Transforming Power of Grace (Rom. 6:14)

- We are transformed by changing how we think. Transformation in our life begins by knowing who we are in Christ or seeing ourselves in the way God sees us in Christ. As our mind is renewed, our emotions are transformed, and thus our behavior changes. Our emotions are not transformed by trying harder, but by seeing more clearly as we feed on God's Word. "...be transformed by the renewing of your mind..." (Rom. 12:2)
- By seeing our life through the lens of grace, we are equipped to reign in life or to walk in all that Jesus accomplished for us. We desire to fully experience what He freely provided on the cross. Wherever sin abounds, God's grace can abound "much more" as it is accessed through Jesus. We will never have more grace available to us than what is ours on the day we were born again. "...those who receive abundance of grace and of the gift of righteousness will reign in life through... Jesus...where sin abounded, grace abounded much more, so that as sin reigned in death, even so grace might reign ...through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Rom. 5:17-21)
- Paul declared that all who desire Jesus to be Lord of their life are "under grace." Living by grace means that we relate to God on the basis of what Jesus accomplished for us on the cross. "For sin shall not have dominion over you, for you are not under law but under grace. What then? Shall we sin because we are not under law but under grace? Certainly not!" (Rom. 6:14-15)
- We are under grace (6:14): To be under grace includes being enjoyed by God, empowered by the indwelling Spirit, and being under Jesus' generous and merciful leadership.
