Vision

100% of identified participants meet the state proficiency reading target by spring of third grade and have their families receive the necessary support to succeed.

- Women, Infants and Children (WIC) participants


Why is this needed?

Investing in their first eight years is critical.

Research shows children who are not proficient in reading by the end of third grade are less likely to succeed in school and as adults which has a direct impact on long-term employment & financial stability.


Return on investment



Executive Function Skills Build Throughout Childhood and Adolescence


