The Reverend's Ruminations - February 2022

With the short, frigid days of midwinter upon us, I pray that you are finding ways to embrace the beauty of the snow-covered landscape around us and keeping yourself spiritually connected, while doing your best to avoid any symptoms associated with "seasonal affective disorder." If you do find yourself struggling with SAD symptoms like oversleeping, low energy, appetite changes, or loss of interest in activities you once enjoyed, I pray that you take such signs seriously and reach out for medical help. I am also available to talk if you just need to process a lesser feeling some refer to as "the winter doldrums."

Though it may not seem so yet, we are already gaining minutes of daylight. I promise, spring is not as far away as it may seem! As we look expectantly toward warmer and longer days ahead, may we draw strength from the words of our Savior who said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life" (John 8:12, NRSV).



If you are looking for inspiration during the chilly days ahead, perhaps this is an excellent time to dig into your Bible a bit and examine the passages that will be part of our worship services in the weeks ahead. The gospel readings will come from the 5th, 6th, and 9th chapters of Luke, including the stories of Jesus calling his first disciples, sharing wisdom about blessings and woes, and offering some tough teaching about love for our enemies and not being judgmental of others. These days in our news and social media cycles, it seems we could all use a refresher on these basic concepts!?!

The epistle lessons (from which I'm continuing to preach this year) will be concentrating on the 15th chapter of First Corinthians, where the Apostle Paul examines the core Christian truth of Christ's resurrection, and its impact on our understanding of the resulting resurrection of believers after death, as well as our vision of what a resurrection body will look like. Though I could not dream of speaking as eloquently as Paul, let me echo his words as we look toward February's sermons: *"For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures..." (1 Cor. 15:3-4, NRSV). May we each hold fast to the miracle and promise of this guiding tenet of our faith!*

I will briefly be escaping the cold February 6-11 to attend the "Chaplain Spiritual Leadership Course" at the Air Force Chaplain Corps College at Maxwell AFB in Montgomery, Alabama. Ellen has graciously agreed to preach on Feb. 6 as I fly to Alabama to start the course on Monday morning. CSLC is one more step toward hopefully getting promoted in the near future, and will concentrate on additional skills to better advise commanders and senior enlisted leaders on moral, spiritual, ethical, and religious matters that impact the planning and application of Air Force programs and missions.

May you remain healthy and inspired as we step carefully into 2022,

Members Present: Marilyn Forstrom, Abigail Roiger, Cathy Celander, Robbin Celander, Jane Kotewa, Wendy Ziemer, Kay Campe, Catherine Johnson, Larry Thompson, Dave Adams, Sue Kruse, Ellen Germain and Christina Hainy. Ex-officio members present: Pastor Germain and Dara Bliesmer, Ass't Treasurer.

The Council met in Heritage Hall. The meeting was called to order by Moderator, Marilyn Forstrom. Pastor Cory led in prayer. Minutes of the December meeting were approved as printed. Motion M/S/C (Dave/Larry).

Treasurer's Report: Catherine Johnson presented the treasurer's report. Motion to receive the treasurer's report was M/S/C (Ellen/Abigail).

Pastor's Report: Pastor Cory talked about his recent and upcoming activities. He was away for a 4-day drill, and Bruce covered pulpit supply. He will be going to Alabama for a week-long course, and Ellen Germain will be covering.

BOARD REPORTS:

Here in cold opening months of a new year, I <u>challenge you to log into your free **rightnow** <u>MEDIA</u> account and find a study or show that doesn't just occupy a long winter night, but rather inspires you toward a deeper faith. When you do, would you drop me an email so that I can share some member picks with next month's newsletter readers?</u>

This month I'd like to promote a RNM series that we're going to be watching and discussing throughout the spring with our Adult Sunday School class—which, by the way, is open to anyone from confirmation age on up at 9:15 Sunday mornings in the chapel! Early last year the group enjoyed studying the Gospel of Luke through a series called *Eyewitness*, in which familiar Bible passages, as well as the history and culture of the region, are brought to life as they are explored by narrators portraying the famous characters. In this spring's study, we will be examining many of the epistle lessons of the year as we unpack **Paul's Letters.** Here is a brief description:

Paul's Letters is composed of narrative accounts by Bible personalities about the letters of Paul found in the New Testament, such as Eunice helping us understand his Letter to the Galatians, or Aquila and Priscilla talking about First Corinthians. Together, the videos and study guides provide a good overview of the letters of Paul. By placing the letters in the approximate order in which they were written, this series provides special insights that are sometimes missed when reading in the order they are found in the New Testament.

Lemon Chicken Piccata

Ingredients

- 4 chicken breasts, boneless and skinless
- ${\bf 1}$ c panko bread crumbs, or 1/2 cup flour
- pinch salt and pepper
- 2 Tbsp vegetable oil
- 7 Tbsp butter, unsalted and divided
- 2 medium lemons
- 1 large shallot, minced
- 1 large garlic clove, minced
- 2 c chicken stock (I use low sodium)
- 1 Tbsp chicken stock concentrate, optional
- 2 Tbsp capers, drained
- **3** Tbsp parsley, finely chopped and divided

Directions

1. Heat oven to 180 degrees. Juice one whole lemon, reserving juice. Cut the second lemon from pole to pole and cut off the end pieces. Fruit side down, slice ONE lemon half into very slender slices, reserve. Use the other cut half for additional juice to make 1/4 cup of fresh lemon juice or plate garnish.

2. Butterfly each chicken breast into two pieces, then cut each piece in half. Pound chicken to about 1/2 inch thick. Dry chicken thoroughly with paper towels. Salt and pepper both sides lightly. In a large skillet, add 2 Tbsp oil and 2 Tbsp butter. Heat to medium high. Dredge chicken pieces in panko bread crumbs or flour. Fry half the chicken pieces until browned, about 2 minutes. Flip chicken pieces and brown on the other side for an additional few minutes until they are cooked through. Add the remaining 2 Tbsp oil and 2 Tbsp butter for the second batch of chicken and repeat.



Plain or smothered & covered! Delicious either way.

Cook time: 30 Min Prep time: 30 Min Serves: 4

READERS' RECIPES

Plate the pieces as they cook, wrap with foil and keep in a warm oven. NOTE: If chicken is browning too quickly, reduce heat to avoid burning.

3. While chicken stays warm in oven, add the shallots to the skillet. If more butter is needed to saute the shallots, feel free to add a bit. Stir quickly for about a minute until they begin to soften. Add the garlic and stir for another 30 seconds until fragrant. Add the chicken broth, stock concentrate, lemon juice and lemon slices. Bring liquid to a simmer and continue simmering until the broth reduces to about 1 1/2 cups - around 10 minutes. Add the capers and parsley to the stock, then add 3 TBS of the remaining butter and swirl the pan off the heat until the butter is melted. Plate the chicken and ladle the sauce on top. Sprinkle with a bit of leftover parsley if you wish.
