

## The Good Shepherd

John 10:1-18

Dear MPI Supporters,

It is intriguing to me as I ponder the relationship of the sheep to the Shepherd and the Shepherd to Ed MacKenzie, President the sheep. This illustration found in John chapter 10, is also emphasized other places in scripture.

"All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned everyone to his own way; and the LORD hath laid on him the iniquity of us all." Isaiah 53:6.

The Church is to be shepherded by leaders that care for the flock. The shepherd knows the sheep by name.

I just read a story about mountain shepherds that I would like to share with you. During the summer months, heat causes the valleys to dry up. To save the sheep they must get them to higher ground. The Shepherds must get their sheep to the high country where there are green fields to graze. To get there requires a great deal of effort as the way is steep and there are many rugged and jagged rocks. The older sheep resist, they have been that way before and they don't want to do it again! As a result, the Shepherds carry the lambs on their shoulders, carrying them up the steep trails. The older sheep want to be close to their young. They trust the Shepherd so they follow along, in spite of the hard, difficult climb.

Spiritual shepherds, in caring for their flocks, especially for the young and the weak, may make changes that the older rams and ewes resist. If the shepherd is willing to carry the lambs and boldly lead the way to new heights, greener pastures, the older ones will follow. This may be the only way for the flock to flourish and to survive.

This is something to think about. Is there a lesson in this for us today? "The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters." Psalms 23:1-2

# Thailand SULADS working in Huai Fai Village

Dear Mama Ruth.

August 1, 2013

Good day to you and to Papa Ed! ^\_^

Ana and Laika are well. Some days are dragging and some are inspiring. We are continually reading, writing and learning Mien language every day and we go to some families' farm every week to build relationship bridges with the people. We also still have some time with our church members especially every night for worship. We have reminded the members again about our church fundamental beliefs because they have already forgotten. Their attendance on Sabbath until the AY Program is improving though there is always someone who prefers to keep Sabbath at home alone. We have started to keep daily track of their attendance on worship schedules. We have also already reminded them about the faithful giving of tithes in the most careful way. Every day, members of the church come and visit our home. And every day, we find time to visit them, too.

With regards to our non-Adventist friends in the village, by God's help and grace, they have started breaking down their barriers. Where before they look suspicious and prejudice while talking cautiously with us. Now they visit our house and invite us to spend time visiting their house too. Oftentimes we join them in their small-talk gatherings and spend time with people who just got back from their farms or in the store during the late afternoon. There were some who refused to talk to us before but now they greet us always when we meet along the roads.

We took special care and attention with the Head of the village, his wife and kids by spending time with the village Head's wife to let her know us personally. We also have schedule every week to go to anybody's farm who wants us to go with them. We bring our own food and share it with them. Usually, they ask about our kind of food because pork is their staple meat especially when they go to their farm. They often wonder why we eat vegetables and rice only.

Lately, more of the people that were prejudice before now invite us to go to the farm with them. Maybe it is because we don't want them to pay us for a day's work but in return they give us some of their vegetables or invite us to ride in their car for free when we need to go to town.

A lot of the mothers, grandmothers, children and teenagers are coming to our house to ask for some medicines, or to treat their wounds, or inform us when someone is sick. Sometimes they just come to talk and spend time with us or to watch as the children play with us. By now, we could feel that they treat us like we belong in their community already.

We still go every week to school and teach children English words, songs and phrases and teach them right conduct and good behavior. We want the children to know that having the right conduct, good manners and clean body is important and honorable. Often people tease or laugh

at anyone who is doing what is right. We want the children to feel proud of doing what is right. One grandmother told us that she wanted her grandchild to be with us on Saturdays and Sundays because she can learn more from us. Before, that grandmother was counted as one of the prejudiced people.

On Sundays, we have one family taking Bible Studies. Whenever we talk about Sabbath, they still feel awkward. We don't want to move along too hastily. We don't want them to think that we are forcing them to be Christians. We allow them first to know us, spend more time with us, let them know our beliefs and show them how that we respect our God through our actions. Then they can see the differences between people who really trust in God and those who do not.

We want them to share their own beliefs freely with us first without prejudice and then we share our own. We also need quality SDA believers in the area which takes time and continuous effort. We already share our beliefs with close friends, for by then we know they won't get offended.

We want to gain their trust before we give them Bible because if they are not yet ready, we are afraid that we may be doing harm for us and for the next missionaries. We don't want to be accused of forcing them which may close the door for others or they may chase us away from their village. Their culture is very tight with their own set of norms. They listen to their relatives' words, and they easily sympathize.

All these qualities are good but we need to wait for the right time for these qualities to be used for the Lord. During evening worships, sometimes we have visitors. And we always urge our church members to stand to their faith and let people see the difference Jesus makes. We need more of everybody's prayers. Thank you very much for your continual support and prayers.

La Loma Luz Adventist Hospital has been using these dishes at the hospital now for several months. The hospital would like to solicit funds to furnish all of the churches in Belize, Central America, including home churches, with one of these dishes. **The discounted cost for 20 dishes is \$3,000**. The churches will cover the cost of transportation and installation. There are a total of about 130 to 140 churches and related locations in Belize. The total needed for this project is \$21,000; **20 dishes will be sent each time for every \$3,000 raised!**

As I work night after night in the evangelistic campaign conducted by Elder Adan Sosa in my village, I was greatly blessed to be a part of such powerful and wonderful work. One night as soon as the service came to a close, my mom came to me and said, "There is someone on the outside of the tent who wants to speak to you." I said "Me?" "Yes you!" Okay then, I will be there but who could it be, I asked. Then she said it is Cun, and when she said the name I could not believe it.

To me this man seems to have a personal problem with me. So many times we have met and he always gives me a negative impression. It seems that he doesn't want anything to do with me and for this reason I was so surprised.

Anyhow, I walked up to him that night and shook his hand and said "Good night, Cun, how are you? Is everything okay?" He said very sadly, "No, things are not okay." He then said I need to talk with you somewhere more private." I said okay, so I took him to the side of the tent and there we talked.

He said his family is falling apart and he really needed someone to talk to and from the moment he got to the service he wanted to find someone he could trust. When he saw me, something said to him, *he is the one you must talk to.* A voice was strong in his mind pointing him to me.

That night I asked God to give me the right words to say that could encourage and comfort his soul, and God did so. With a trembling voice and tears in his eyes he asked, "Do you think my family has a solution to unite once more?" I answered and said, "Sure, the God I serve is a God of reconciliation not separation, He is the God of the impossibilities."

That night I prayed with him and he left greatly encouraged to face another day. He was attending the campaign for the following two weeks and also made a decision to be baptized the final Sabbath, but did not do it in the end. His entire family is Seventh-Day Adventist except for him.

We have made an agreement that we will meet more regularly to talk about God and to start a Bible study. He is now attending our church services at nights even though he did not get baptized. Indeed, there is a true desire in him to serve God.

The Lord has taught me a very important lesson: Never judge someone by their outward appearance! I pray that I can always be an approachable person for those who want to know about God. Please pray for Cun and his family that very soon he can give his life over to Jesus and join his family in serving Him with all his heart.

In September 2012 I had the privilege to be re-elected as the Personal Ministry DSirector of my home church. Through this department I began a series of cottage meetings and formed 5 groups who were trained and on a weekly basis went out to give Bible studies in a chosen home. The Easy Bible Study Series that we formulated as Bible Workers was the materials used for studying weekly.

Your humble servant was also a leader of one of those groups, apart from just being a director. My meetings were held every Friday night at my grandfather's home. There I had the privilege to meet a very interesting young man, 17 years old. His name is Carlos Ortiz, and he lives next door to my grandfather's house.

We invited him to join us in study and he brought along his nieces and nephews, about 10 of them total. He is a member of another denomination and very active, energetic, and spiritual.

As a child I attended an Adventist elementary school in my hometown of Huizachal on the Pacific coast of south Mexico. Since there is no Adventist middle school here, I attended a non-denomination school, where I graduated on July 5<sup>th</sup>, 2013.

God gave me many opportunities to testify to my classmates. I sent motivational text messages to fellow students. While some students made presentations of the evolution of man, I discussed how God created the Earth. I shared short inspirational video clips with my classmates. Those opened the way to talk about the love of God, while answering their questions.

My teacher said that we were all required to dance during an upcoming parade. Those who did not participate would fail the class. I told the teacher that I would be willing to fail my class instead of losing my crown of eternal life. I asked the teacher if there was another activity I could participate in. I was allowed to hand out water to my classmates instead of dancing.

On another occasion, I was able to help my classmate David who had a health condition. Doctors had given him a prognosis to live for 7 to 9 years. During that time, we continued studying together.
