

Grace & Peace: From the Pastor's Desk



1 John 4:20-21: "Those who say, 'I love God,' and hate a brother or sister are liars, for those who do not love a brother or sister, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also." Here we are, February, the month we celebrate love. What a difficult day Valentine's Day is for some people. Valentine's Day superimposes the idea that everyone is happily in love with another person when the fact is there are grown adults who never have experienced the kind of love implicitly expected to be in everyone's life. Then there are people who may have gone

through a terrible divorce and feel as though there is no such thing as the type of love Valentine's Day promotes. Or they may have experienced a deep love for someone who has passed away. We truly need to be careful about how we celebrate a day that causes so much pain for so many people.

Instead, we as Christ followers, concentrate on the love God has for all people, and that we too are to have for others. For, as 1st John 4:20-21 says, if we can not love the people whom we can see then how can we love God?

To love doesn't necessarily mean you must like a person. I remember an old Beatle's song, "I don't like you, but I love you." The rest of the song goes into a type of love that Valentine's Day celebrates, but the point made in this one statement is absolutely true... you do not have to like a person to love them with the love of God. Even people who seem evil to the core are loved by God, God deeply desires them to turn away from evil and return to ways that are not self-serving and cause others harm. In other words, God wants them, as God wants us, to live out of love.

Why? Because God is love. And to claim to be Christ followers we too must live out of love. Our love looks past the personalities of others to the promises of heaven. Looking toward the promises of heaven doesn't mean we can ignore our actions in our life here on earth. It means we live to a different standard, that of loving those who are unloving. We love those who will never love us. Love freely given grows; a person can never run out of love when it is the love of God. We love because God loves us, even when we do not deserve that love. Knowing that we are born of God, and going back to God, we love those whom we might otherwise find impossible to love.

So this month celebrate love, the type of love that the world cannot understand, because as followers of Jesus we are in the world but not of the world.



Chicken Pot Pie Soup



- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 lb boneless, skinless chicken breasts about 2 larger breasts
- 1 cup celery diced
- 1 cup carrot cut in 1/4 inch thick small circles
- 1 cup onion finely chopped
- 1/2 tablespoon garlic finely minced
- 2 cups yukon gold potatoes peeled+ cut into 1 inch pieces
- 1 cup yukon gold potatoes peeled+ cut into quarters so that you can remove them at the end
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon dried parsley
- 3 cups chicken broth or bone broth- low sodium!
- 1/4 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/4 teaspoon dried rosemary
- 1 tablespoon fresh parsley for garnish
- 1/2 cup milk of choice almond milk, whole milk, any milk will work

Crockpot Cooking Instructions

Layer chicken, vegetables and potatoes in the crockpot. Add chicken broth. Cover and cook on low for 6 hours.

Once cooked remove the large potato pieces and chicken breasts.

Place large potato quarters, milk and 1/2 cup of juice from the crockpot into blender and blend until smooth. Pour back into the pot.

Shred the chicken and dump back into the pot.

Stir everything together until well combined and

CREATION CARE ACTIVITIES FOR CHILDREN

One of the best creation-care actions that adults can perform is stimulating children to care for creation. Here are activities from ELCA's 2024 "Our Kairos Moment – A Study Guide on Earth's Climate Crisis".

outdoor thermometers outside to come up to temperature. Place one thermometer inside a clear glass or plastic jar and cover it with a lid or plastic wrap. For one hour, measure the differences in temperature between the thermometers. The difference helps explain the greenhouse effect of gases trapping heat inside our atmosphere. https://kidminds.org/how-to-explain-the-greenhouse-effect-to-kids-with-printables/

EARTH TOAST: Higher temperatures can have wide-ranging impacts on land, water, soil and human health. Visit https://tinyurl.com/2b87m62z to learn how to make "Earth Toast". This activity from Left Brain, Craft Brain is a fun, creative way to start a conversation about the effects of heat.

THE EARTH AS AN APPLE: Imagine the earth as an apple. Cut the apple into quarters. One quarter is land and the rest is water. Cut the land quarter in half again to produce two 1/8th pieces of apple. One of those pieces is land covered with mountains, desert or ice. The other eighth is flat livable land. Cut the livable land into four pieces. Three of those are either wet, hot, rocky, infertile or covered with roads and buildings for cities. The other piece (one thirty-second) when peeled represents the topsoil of the earth that is suitable for growing the food that we eat. PAPER EGG CARTON GARDEN STARTER: Gather a paper egg carton, some soil and seeds. Fill the carton with soil and plant one seed in each cup. Place the tray on a water-resistant tray in a sunny location and water the seeds a bit each day. As your seeds start to sprout, talk about all the resources that are needed for plants to grow: organic matter in soil, water and sunlight. After the seeds have grown and have two sets of leaves, the egg carton can be separated into 12 sections and each planted in your garden or raised bed/pot. Try starting flower seeds or vegetable seeds. Enjoy! How does God's creation work together to create new life? Adapted from Our Kairos Moment "Planting in an Ice Cube Tray".

This Month in History February

February 2, 1848 - The war between the U.S. and Mexico ended with the signing of the <u>Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo</u>. In exchange for \$15 million, the U.S. acquired the areas encompassing parts or all of present day California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, and Texas. The treaty was ratified on March 10, 1848.

February 3, 1821 - The first female physician in the U.S., Elizabeth Blackwell (1821-1910) was born near Bristol, England. As a girl, her family moved to New York State. She was awarded her MD by the Medical Institute of Geneva, New York, in 1849. She then established a hospital in New York City run by an all-female staff. She was also active in training women to be nurses for service in the American Civil War.

February 3, 1870 - The 15th <u>Amendment</u> to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, guaranteeing the right of citizens to vote, regardless of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

February 3, 1913 - The 16th <u>Amendment</u> to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, granting Congress the authority to collect income taxes.

February 4, 1861 - Apache Chief Cochise was arrested in Arizona by the U.S. Army for raiding a ranch. Cochise then escaped and declared war, beginning the period known as the Apache Wars, which lasted 25 years.

February 6, 1933 - The 20th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was adopted. It set the date for the Presidential Inauguration as January 20th, instead of the old date of March 4th. It also sets January 3rd as the official opening date of Congress.

February 8, 1910 - The Boy Scouts of America was founded by William Boyce in Washington, D.C., modeled after the British Boy Scouts.

February 11, 1987 - American inventor <u>Thomas Edison</u> (1847-1931) was born in Milan, Ohio. Throughout his lifetime he acquired over 1,200 patents including the incandescent bulb, phonograph and movie camera. Best known for his quote, "Genius is one percent inspiration and ninety-nine percent perspiration.

February 13, 1635 - Boston Latin School, the first tax-payer supported (public) school in America was established in Boston, Massachusetts.

February 17, 1865 - During the American Civil War, <u>Fort Sumter</u> in South Carolina was returned to the Union after nearly a year and a half under Confederate control. The fort had been the scene of the first shots of the war.

February 20, 1962 - Astronaut John Glenn became the first American launched into orbit.

February 27, 1950 - The 22nd <u>Amendment</u> to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, limiting the president to two terms or a maximum of ten years in office.

Why is Valentine's Day celebrated on February 14th?

In general, early Christians often opted to celebrate holidays on days that coincide with existing festivals and celebrations (like Christmas and winter solstice), so they placed Valentine's Day on February 14th, while Lupercalia was celebrated on February 15th.

St. Valentine's Day was a feast day in the Catholic religion, added to the liturgical calendar around 500 AD. The day was commemorated for martyred saints named—you guessed it—Valentine. Differing legends celebrate three different saints called Valentine or Valentinus, but since very little was known about these men and there were conflicting reports of the St. Valentine Day story, the <u>feast day was removed</u> from the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar in 1969.

But even though not much is known about the real history of the Saint Valentines on whom the holiday is based, the legend of Saint Valentine has several tellings. One legend says that Saint Valentine refused to convert to paganism and was executed by Roman Emperor Claudius II. Prior to his execution, he was able to miraculously heal the daughter of his jailer, who then converted to Christianity along with his family. Another legend says a bishop called Saint Valentine of Terni is the true namesake of the holiday; this Saint Valentine was also executed.

But according to others—and this is how Saint Valentine became affiliated with a love-focused holiday—Saint Valentine was a Roman priest who performed weddings for soldiers forbidden to marry, because of a Roman emperor's edict decreeing married soldiers did not make good warriors and thus young men could not marry. This Saint Valentine wore a ring with a Cupid on it—a symbol of love—that helped soldiers recognize him. And, in a precursor to greeting cards, he handed out paper hearts to remind Christians of their love for God.

Because of this legend, Saint Valentine became known as the patron saint of love. The Saint Valentine prayer asks Saint Valentine to connect lovers together, so that two become one, and the couple remembers their devotion to God.

While the Saint Valentine story set the groundwork for establishing the day as a holiday for romantic love, what truly solidified the connection between Saint Valentine and love was a poem by medieval author Geoffrey Chaucer in 1375, which historians consider the origin of the "modern" celebration of Valentine's Day, where we celebrate our romantic partnership with one other person.

Why do we celebrate Valentine's Day?

Chaucer lived in the Middle Ages, the era of courtly love, when broad, romantic statements of devotion—poems, songs, paintings—celebrated partnership. By the end of the 15th century, the word "valentine" was being used to describe a lover in poems and songs of the day, and in the 18th century, a book called *The Young Man's Valentine Writer* was published in England. By the mid-19th century, mass-produced paper Valentine's Cards were being created (though <u>DIY Valentine's card ideas</u> are still worth trying), and Valentine's Day as we know it was born.

Over the years (and centuries), Valentine's Day has been a religious celebration, an ancient ritual day, and a commercial holiday. All that change means the meaning of Valentine's Day is truly whatever you want it to be: You can skip the celebrations completely, buy yourself some chocolate or flowers, or express your love and appreciation for the people in your life, whether they're co-workers, romantic partners, friends, or family members.





Facts about the Bible I bet you didn't know!!!!

1. The Long and Short of It

When it comes to the books of the Bible, the longest is Psalms, which contains 150 chapters (or psalms) made up of 43 743 words. The shortest book is 3 John, with only one chapter and 299 words. The longest and shortest chapters also belong to Psalms: Psalm 119 has 176 verses, while Psalm 117 only has two. Esther 8:9 is the longest verse with 90 words.

The shortest verse? John 11:35, with only two words: "Jesus wept."

2. It's About 611 000 Words Long

That's 24 000 words more than Leo Tolstoy's *War and Peace* and over 40 000 words less than Victor Hugo's *Les Misérables*! Of course, the word count varies when translated from the original languages, so don't start counting every single word in your copy/version of the Bible for the sake of accuracy.

3. The Word "Trinity" Is Never Mentioned

Twenty Bible verses mention all three members of the <u>Holy Trinity</u>: God the Father, God the Son (Jesus Christ), and God the Holy Spirit. But the word "Trinity" itself? It's not mentioned at all.

4. Traditionally, 40 Authors Wrote The Bible

A diverse range of authors wrote the Bible over a period of 1500 years. From shepherds and fishermen to soldiers and physicians, at least 40 individuals were inspired by the Holy Spirit to put God's message into words for his people. The first five books are often credited to Moses (despite the fact that he died before some of these events occurred), Paul wrote the most individual documents (13 letters), and the identities of some writers are still unknown to this day.

5. Only 93 Women Speak in The Bible

188 women are named in the Bible, and of those women, only 93 speak (and only 49 are named). Together, they speak 14 056 words – that's 1.1% of the Bible's content.

6. It Was Written In Three Continents

The majority of the Bible was written in what is modern-day Israel in Asia. Some of the New Testament epistles, however, were written from cities in Europe, while some passages from the book of Jeremiah were written in Egypt, right here in Africa.

7. And It Was Written in Three Languages

Originally, the Bible was written in Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek. Portions of the Old Testament were written in Hebrew, the language of their readers, while small parts were written in Aramaic. When the New Testament was written, the commonly-spoken language at the time was Greek, hence why the second part of the biblical text was written in Greek.

- 9. Bear with and forgive complaints against others (Colossians 3:13).
 - 10. Encourage and esteem one another (1 Thessalonians 5:11-14).
