High School students begin communications internship program

TRENTON, NJ -- The Trenton Public Education Foundation, along with local media outlets and area

corporations, kicked off the second year of the Trenton Youth Communications Partnership with a

celebration event at Trenton Central High School yesterday.

"The thirteen Trenton Central High School students chosen to take part in the program were able to

meet some of the mentors and hear details about their internships," said Pamela Pruitt, TPEF board

president. This year's program will run through May 31, with final projects being presented at a

showcase on June 1, she said.

The Trenton Youth Communications Partnership is a program that pairs journalists, public relations

practitioners and other professionals with high school students interested in pursuing careers in media

and communications. "With the guidance of their mentors, these students will get a first-hand look at

what it takes to succeed in these fields," said Pruitt.

"Because we received overwhelmingly positive reviews from both students and mentoring

organizations last year, we decided to expand the program. This year we have more than double the

participants," said Pruitt.
