

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? A Message From Fr. Brian Johnson

January 3, 2020

Matthew 2:1-12

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches.

Happy Epiphany! The 'wise men' or 'starwatchers' from the east arrive in Jerusalem seeking the new born king. The sudden appearance of a massive light (a star) in the sky, is what led them to the birth place of the Jesus! Their distant travel from the Far East signifies the universal nature of Jesus' mission. He came for all people. Jesus did not come only for a particular country or a particular ethnic clan of people. No, Jesus came to be Savior for everyone, if He is accepted. And these foreign pilgrims accept and recognize Christ as their Lord, too. And they are not just spiritual tourists, curious about joining the next fashion or trying to win favor with a rising political figure. No, they came to worship and adore Jesus religiously as their Messiah. They even bring sacrificial gifts to present Him as a sign of their commitment. I find the wise men to be great examples of humility and openness to God. They ask questions and seek signs. Not being knowledgeable about Hebrew prophecy, they stop and ask for specifics in Jerusalem (Matt 2:2). They look up, and follow the light (Matt 2:9), open to hear other voices and discern dreams (Matt 2:12). They are humble seekers and know that the universe is alive by the active and creative direction of God's hand. As Psalm 19:2-3 says, "The heavens declare the glory of God; the firmament proclaims the works of his hands. Day unto day pours forth speech; night unto night whispers knowledge." Romans 1:20 tells us how we may see God's direction in nature, when it says "Ever since the creation of the world, God's invisible attributes of eternal power and divinity have been able to be understood and perceived in what he has made." Jesus Himself will later say in Matthew 6:26-30 that we can see God's design and care in nature by reflecting upon the splendor of flowers and the feeding and flight of birds. So the wise men teach me the importance of being observant and watching for God's signs, all the time. They could have ignored the new light. Or felt discouraged by such a long shot possibility of actually locating the base or source of the new star. But they had faith and humility that moved them to search out what God was up to with these new sights. Yes, just like the old 1970's rock song said, "signs, signs everywhere a sign". I simply add, "signs from God".

It didn't get much news attention, but did you hear about the catastrophic collapse back last month of the iconic 'radio telescope' in Arecibo, Puerto Rico? The telescope had a massive 'eye' lens (weighing 900 tons) suspended by cables over the huge 'receiving bowl' dish. It had survived many hurricanes and earthquakes, but through the slow suffering of time's wear and one more hurricane last August, its cables failed. Engineers had been strategizing about its decommissioning and salvage, but it completely collapsed and crashed to earth itself on December 1, 2020 (Ironically, a drone happened to be in the air to see & record its fall!) The primary work of the telescope was to track asteroids that could enter the orbit-path of earth. The telescope had made an appearance itself in the 1995 James Bond movie "Goldeneye". My point in all of this, is that we may need new eyes on the sky now. But, the wise men in Jesus' time were those eyes to notice and inquire about the novel stellar sight in the sky marking Jesus' birth. I love how they didn't just note the new star, they went further to pursue its meaning. They are 'sc-eye-in-tists, right? The wise men show the perfect disposition of a disciple that 'asks, seeks, & knocks' (Matthew 7:7). Humbled by discovering something unseen before, they sought to search out an answer and its meaning. I've heard that the most exciting words to hear in a scientist's laboratory is, "Hmm, I didn't expect that!" It signals something novel or unexpected that begs for more research. So, the wise men saw a new light and pursued its explanation. Studying their field deeply, they discovered their God. They traveled to study a remarkable new star in the sky, and they discovered the maker of all suns (Genesis 1:3). Most remarkable of all, this mighty God chose to be humbly born into creation alongside us, Christ the light of the world (John 8:12).

Another Saint in Time of Plague: Josemaría Escrivá de Balaguer y Albás (Born 1-9-1902 Died 6-26-1975)

Josemaría Escrivá de Balaguer y Albás, the founder of the religious order, *Opus Dei*, can be seen as a patron-saint helper of those suffering from COVID due to his own suffering all his life from Type 1 Diabetes, among other chronic ailments. Since diabetes is one of several risk factors for worsening complications of COVID, St Josemaria Escriva is a great modern saint to seek prayer from to avoid COVID or to live through it with only minor symptoms.

St Josemaria was born on January 9, 1902 to parents José Escrivá y Corzán and María de los Dolores Albás y Blanc in in Aragón, Spain. He was one of six children. His father was a cloth merchant and part owner of a textile company. When he was only two, Josemaria was stricken with fever and epileptic-type seizures. Doctors surrendered any hope of curing him, and after intense prayer by his parents and family, Josemaria miraculously rallied back to health. After recovering, his parents took him to the shrine of Our Lady of Torreciudad to dedicate him to her in thanksgiving. Between 1910-1913, three of his sisters died suddenly. Unfortunately, in 1915, his father's textile company went bankrupt, and the family had to relocate to the city of Logrono. His father found work as a clerk in a clothing store. As a little boy, Josemaria was very devout and felt called to serve God in some 'dedicated' way. He had a conversion moment one day when he met a Carmelite monk walking by him in the street. The monk was sacrificially walking barefoot in the snow. Stepping into the footprints in the snow, Josemaria felt the call to begin practicing strict penances and mortifications. His father blessed his religious efforts. Josemaria began studying for the priesthood in 1920 at the seminary of San Carlos in Saragossa. He was ordained deacon at 22 (1924), the same year his father died. Josemaria worked to support his mother, brother and sister. He was ordained a priest the following year. He had been studying for a Civil Law Degree at the University of Saragossa. He served a short while in a rural parish, before working as a chaplain at the Foundation of the Sick.


In October 1928, St Josemaria had a vision of God telling him to start 'Opus Dei', as a spiritual association of men in all occupations or crafts, aspiring to holiness (not just religious orders). Opus Dei is known for its 'universal call to holiness'. Its mission is to foster sanctification for everyone regardless of work or job duties. Any occupation can serve to 'glorify God'. Josemaria later broadens the membership of Opeus Dei to women, married couples and religious, for all people can serve God and dedicate their work to God for his glory and their sanctification. Opus Dei focuses on formation of spiritual disciples in universities, unions, business and trade fellowships. In 1931 he was appointed chaplain of St Elizabeth foundation, serving the sick. In 1933, he started the first apostolic work of Opus Dei, which was a spiritual formation group at the DYA (Derecho y Arquitectura) Academy. This became a student residence house following a religious rule. In 1936, as the Spanish Civil war heated up, he moved to Barcelona and began missions there. By 1938, he was back in Burgos taking up pastoral and education work, reconnecting with Opus Dei contacts at multiple universities. He wrote the spiritual books "The Way" and "The Rosary" in 1939. In 1943 he founded the Priestly Society of the Holy Cross to supply his formation houses at universities with priests-directors. His preaching, retreats and writings circulated widely. Opus Dei groups spread to many other European, South American and North American countries. In 1955 he earned a doctorate in sacred theology at Lateran University, and served in Curia as consultor for Seminaries and Canon Law. The Order continued to grow rapidly and in 1970, St Josemaria began construction of the shrine of Torreciudad (Our Lady of Angels), honoring the Virgin Mary for his childhood miracle. He died a month before its formal dedication in July 1975 (He died June 26, 1975). The shrine remains the spiritual center of Opus Dei, and the most popular destination for opus Dei pilgrimages. Members of Opus Dei numbered some 60,000 in 80 countries, the year he died. He founded many colleges and universities all over the world, such as Pontifical University of the Holy Cross, University of Navarre and the University of Peru. Despite his frequent health problems and the recurrence of complications (Diabetes), he steadfastly maintained penitential practices and apostolic work among the poor and the sick. He was familiar with obstacles to gospel work due to government instability, health problems and societal dislocation (economic and moral). As a modern saint, St Josemaria is an example of keeping focused on Christ in whatever work/occupation we engage in and not be deterred by interruptions. Often sick himself, he served the sick, and despite opposition he persisted in evangelizing any and everywhere. A few of his sayings include: "Bring light to everything", "Add a supernatural motive to your ordinary work, and God sanctifies it" and "Action is worthless without prayer, and prayer is worth more with sacrifice." St Josemaria Escriva, pray for us!
