D-DAY'S 80th ANNIVERSARY June 6, 1944 – June 6, 2024 *By: Thomas T. Hassell, Jr.*

On June 6, 2024, we commemorated the 80th anniversary of D-Day. We remember the fallen and honor the legacy of those who changed the course of history.

The vast scope of D-Day far surpasses the ability to capture its entirety in a newsletter article. Therefore, the focus here is on two aspects of the invasion, both of which illustrate the courage and flexibility of American servicemen.

Chronologically, the airborne invasion was first, as it occurred pre-dawn. Paratroops of the 82nd and 101st airborne divisions were met with withering Nazi anti-aircraft fire as they entered French airspace. The C-47 pilots, in numerous cases, got off course or lost their nerve, resulting in the Paratroops to be ordered to jump, so the plane could turn back. They jumped into total darkness, having no idea where they were. All prior planning had to be abandoned. Those fortunate enough to make it to the ground, went into hiding, having only a metal clicker for communication. These were used in an attempt to locate fellow troops. Many were killed or wounded by Nazi troops as they descended. Others were killed as they dangled helplessly from tree limbs.

One unusual case involved Private John Steele of the 82nd Airborne. He descended in the dark and ended with his parachute snagged on a church spire in the village of Sainte-Mere-Eglise (a commune in the northwestern French department of Manche, in Normandy).

The Germans saw him, cut him down, and took him prisoner, but with American courage and savvy, he escaped and was able to connect with other American troops.

A noteworthy and critical part of the sea invasion involved the 2nd Ranger

Battalion under the command of Lieutenant Colonel James Rudder and got the name, "Rudders Rangers". They were given the unenviable task of scaling both sides of Pointe du Hoc, an area on the western end of Omaha Beach and having cliffs 100 feet high. Upon reaching the top they were to knock out German guns and troops. They succeeded with the help of rocket fired grapnel hooks attached to long ropes. They also used ladders loaned to them by the London Fire Department. The climb was made against heavy German gunfire and potato mashers (grenades) being rolled down on them.

In 1964, at the 20th reunion of the Ranger Battalion, General Rudder stood at Pointe du Hoc, looked down at Omaha Beach and said, *"How in the hell did we do it?"*. The answer to his question involves American courage, honor, and commitment.

Virginia Legislature Passes Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Education Program (VMSDEP) Funding Bill

RICHMOND,VA – In a breakthrough decision, the Virginia Senate and House of Delegates have passed a bill to fully repeal recent cost-cutting measures, ensuring the Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Education Program (VMSDEP) receives full funding. This important legislation will provide tuition-free college education to the spouses and children of military members and first responders who were killed or disabled as a result of their service.

For weeks, military families and advocates for veterans have called for the immediate reversal of cost-cutting measures that threatened the integrity of WMSDEP. Today, their voices have been heard and answered with decisive action from the General Assembly. The Lieutenant Governor, a steadfast supporter of veterans, first responders and military families, has been a vocal advocate for the bill's passage, urging both the Senate and the House of Delegates to prioritize this essential program.

The Lieutenant Governor expressed heartfelt gratitude and support for the passage of this bill, stating, "As a veteran, I understand the sacrifices made by our military families. Ensuring tuition -free education for the spouses and children of those who have given their all for our country is the least we can do. This program is a small token of our immense gratitude and a promise to better the lives of those who have suffered the ultimate loss."

The WMSDEP will play a pivotal role in upholding Virginia's commitment to its military and first responder families providing them with the opportunity to pursue higher education and improve their lives. Richmond Navy League member RDML Mike Curran, USN (Ret.) heard that call and has offered to take the lead as he explains in the following message:

The USNL Richmond Chapter is in the forming stages of a Legislative Affairs Committee led by RDML (Ret.) Mike Curran. The vision of the Legislative Affairs Committee is to advocate for Naval/Maritime issues at the federal, state, and local levels that are in line with USNL's advocacy mission objectives. As we are located in the Capital of the Commonwealth, we are uniquely positioned to interact with the Virginia State Legislature to educate, advocate, and seek support from State Senators and Representatives. Some of the issues we can influence are further reduction of state taxation of military retirements, protecting the Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Education Program (VMSDEP), and funding for climate-resilient base infrastructure in Hampton Roads.

As we are in the beginning stages, USNL National HQ has offered to provide a one-hour training session on Legislative Affairs (LA). Once we gather the names of interested members, we will schedule training. We are seeking members to participate in the training and serve as members of the committee. Any amount of time and effort committee members can provide will be greatly appreciated. Once our committee is in place with our agenda of advocacy issues, we will partner with USNL National HQ LA for support and coordination with other chapters and military-affiliated groups.

MILITARY SEALIFT COMMAND

The commanders of U.S. Transportation Command and Military Sealift Command joined hundreds of maritime industry leaders, May 22, to celebrate National Maritime Day during a ceremony hosted by The Propeller Club, Port of Norfolk, aboard the former battleship **USS** *Wisconsin* (**BB-64**).

National Maritime Day is a time-honored tradition that recognizes one of the country's most important industries. Each year, ceremonies and celebrations throughout the country recognize National Maritime Day and the people the maritime industry depends on.

MSC Commander, Rear Admiral Sobeck, spoke highly of the thousands of Merchant Mariners serving on vessels globally.

"Whether in peacetime or conflict, it is American merchant mariners who deliver essential goods to far-reaching corners of our globe. These seafarers bravely face threats to include combatant's pirates, disease outbreaks, and natural disasters yet they consistently heed the call to serve their fellow Americans. Today, and every day, we honor merchant marines past and present."

RADM Sobeck thanked the Mariners for all they had done to support MSC, our Navy, and the defense of our nation over the past 75 years.

"National Maritime Day marks the date in 1819 that the **SS Savannah** set sail on the first transoceanic voyage under steam power, and the maritime industry's remarkable contribution to this event," said USTRANSCOM Commander Gen. Jacqueline Van Ovost.

The ceremonial event concluded with the reading of the National Maritime Day proclamation, and a wreath laying from the CROMO, a local historic dive vessel, in remembrance of mariners who died in service to The United States. \vec{x}

USS *Normandy* is moored pier side at her homeport of Norfolk, VA conducting a maintenance availability as she prepares to go out to sea again in the coming weeks.

Normandy returned on July 13th from a two-and-a-half-month service deployment to the Sixth Fleet Area of Responsibility. While on her service deployment **Normandy** returned to her namesake of Normandy, France where the ship commemorated the 80th Anniversary of the D-Day Invasion. Additionally, while in the European Theater, **Normandy** made two port calls to Naval Station Rota, Spain and one port call to Rotterdam, Netherlands. While in the Netherlands sailors had the opportunity to take a quick train ride to the city of Amsterdam.

Prior to *Normandy's* Dutch port call, she ventured to the Norwegian Sea where she conducted a PHOTOEX with USS Tennessee (SSBN 734), an E-6B Mercury, and a P-8 Poseidon.

On July 25th, 2024, CAPT Nathan P. Diaz took command of **USS** *Normandy*. Team *Normandy* would like to extend a huge welcome to CAPT Diaz and wish CAPT Errol Robinson fair winds and following seas as he continues his career at the Pentagon.

Homecoming for USS Gravely with the Eisenhower Strike Group By: Courtney Mustin, Liaison

Temperatures and emotions ran very high on July 14th as family, friends and onlookers watched **USS Gravely** sail up the Elizabeth River and into its berth on the pier at Norfolk Naval Station after nearly nine months' deployment. There was a great swell of love, relief, pride and gratitude among the crowd as all waited with anxious anticipation of the first embrace of their loved ones after so long a time.

Welcoming home the sailors was a section of the Navy band playing familiar tunes on the pier to raise the spirits even higher. A tent with music, food and drinks were set up to lessen the oppressive heat and give people a chance to wait more comfortably. As the tugboat guided Gravely to its docking station banners, balloons, flowers and cameras were all raised to capture the moment it was tied up with the entire crew manning the rail. It was a beautiful sight, and one that marked the dedication and the sacrifices Navy sailors, and their families make to keep our country free and safe.

A motorcade of dignitaries proceeded down the pier to the ship to greet and escort the CO back to the base after which sailors began to disembark in search of their loved ones there to welcome them home. Anyone fortunate enough to witness this homecoming was bound to realize in that experience what a privilege it is to be an American.

USCGC Legare (WMEC 912) has officially been delivered to Baltimore, Maryland, and handed over to the Coast Guard Yard for the Service Life Extension Program (SLEP). The crew has officially transitioned to operating as USCGC Spencer (WMEC 905). The upcoming inport period will primarily focus on the new hull, currently in drydock. While preparations to reach this stage was time-consuming, the challenges ahead promise to be equally demanding, if not more so. Nevertheless, the team is fully prepared for the task.

Following the conclusion of our Proficiency Patrol, a much-needed standdown period began. This was immediately followed by an intensive twoweek SLEP preparation phase. In a concerted effort involving all hands, nonessential materials were systematically offloaded via a daisy chain process and transferred to conex (container express) boxes for long-term storage.

After this offload phase, *Legare* embarked on a two-day transit up the Chesapeake Bay to Curtis Bay, near Baltimore. Along the way, the ship anchored twice: once in Cape Charles, VA, and later by the US Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD. Approaching Baltimore, we crossed over the remains of the Francis Scott Key Bridge and observed heightened Coast Guard activities as MV Dali (Neopanamax Container Ship) prepared for a dead ship tow to Portsmouth, VA.

Upon arrival at the Coast Guard Yard, *Legare* launched into another phase of offloading gear and other equipment to clear the ship's remaining supplies. Every space was emptied of tools and inventory, with that material stowed in additional conex boxes.

By week's end, all items were removed from the ship, and most of the crew had returned home port. Sixteen engineers remained to lay up all machinery and formally sign *Legare* to the

Coast Guard Yard. Though **Spencer** is currently drydocked, it now belongs to our crew. Over the next few months, we will provide support to other Cutters, and seek opportunities to gain qualifications that will assist with our reconstitution onboard **Spencer** this fall. As always, *Legare Spencer* remains grateful for the unwavering support. Your generosity has played a pivotal role in ensuring that *Spencer* continues to uphold the highest standards of service and readiness. We look forward to sharing more updates as this journey unfolds!


