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The Summer SRCA Report

As summer concluded, we recruited arborist Christie Bryant to speak about tree maintenance to attendees of the District One Town Hall on August 27. Special thanks go to Pat Soltys and Bill Rosenfeld for going along with the SRCA recommendation to ask an arborist to speak!

Christine provided guidance to residents on how best to co-exist safely with that invaluable resource-- our tree canopy. She discussed falling trees and other tree hazards. The latter is something the board knows full well, having had a tree

fall on the manned, moving vehicle of one of our board members just this year. Fortunately, Pam Heisler, unlike her car, came out of that encounter unmarred.

September 9 was our seventh board meeting of the calendar year (including the annual membership meeting in March). We will meet again in November.

The SRCA and Tucker Civic Association are jointly sponsoring a city candidate forum on October 23 at the Tucker First United Methodist Church Activities Center (4315 Church Street, Tucker 30084). Doors open at 6:30 p.m. The Candidate's Forum will be moderated by Frank Luton starting promptly at 7:00 and ending at 8:00 p.m. Candidates from all three Tucker districts will be included in the forum. On our side of the city there is the contested District One race between Bill Rosenfeld and Christine Bloodworth. The stage and questioning will be shared with Noelle Monferdini (D2) and Anne Lerner (D3) who are running unopposed for re-election.

The SRCA now sponsor the Tucker High School foundation golf tourney and the Smoke Rise Sharks swim team. We encourage Smoke Rise neighbors to support the high school by participating in the Casino Night fundraiser to be held November 2 at the Tucker Recreation Center.

As the Community Garden heads into the harvest season, we are turning our attention to renewal of the seasonal plantings at the iconic Rosser Rd and Hugh Howell smokestack-- along with those at Greencastle Way, Glacier, Rosser Place, and Deer Ridge. We are evaluating our finances to determine if we can enhance the plantings at Stratmor, where the medallion was replaced this year, and possibly Silversmith. None of this would be possible without the investment and faith of our dues-paying members. We are grateful to each and every one of you. Thanks.

FODAC Charity Golf Classic at Stone Mountain October 10

The Friends of Disabled Adults and Children (FODAC) 22nd Annual Charity Golf Classic is returning on October 10 to Stone Mountain Golf Club, located on the grounds of popular attraction Stone Mountain Park. Stone Mountain Golf Club features two championship golf courses surrounded by scenic views of historic Stone Mountain and Stone Mountain Lake; the FODAC tournament will be played on the Lakemont Course.

Funds raised from the event help support FODAC's mission to supply home medical equipment (HME) to people with disabilities and their caregivers. FODAC is based in Tucker but serves the Metro Atlanta community by providing recycled equipment such as wheelchairs, scooters, walkers and hospital beds for children and adults during or after a health crisis. Last year, FODAC donated over \$10 million in equipment at little or no cost to recipients. FODAC, as a member of National VOAD, also provides support in the wake of disasters; the organization was instrumental in providing relief for seniors and those with disabilities in Houston, Florida, Puerto Rico and the Caribbean following Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria in 2017.

Breakfast and onsite registration starts at 8:00 a.m.; shotgun start is at 9:30 a.m. Awards are presented at the post-tournament lunch, including recognition of any holes-inone, lowest scoring four-some, longest drive, and closest to the pin.

The Rotary Club of Stone Mountain is supporting this year's event, helping to secure sponsors and providing volunteers to set up and work the event.





9/11 Memorial


On September 11, 2001, at 8:45 a.m., an American Airlines Boeing 767, Flight 11, collided into the World Trade Center's north tower in New York City starting a horrific chain of airline crashes that forever changed our country. Eighteen years later the emotional impact of that day still weighs heavily or our hearts and minds. This past week we paused to remember the anniversary of that fateful day.

DeKalb County first responders paid homage to those who lost their lives on 9/11 by holding a remembrance ceremony at the public safety complex in Tucker. The tribute, delivered by the DeKalb County Fire Rescue Department and the Police Department, was a truly moving service.

It was an emotional ceremony as we proudly recalled the lives of everyday heroes who gave their all and provided a sense of hope and resilience during this time of profound crisis. Equally, we remember the many sacrifices of U.S. military personnel in the ongoing fight against terrorism.



Stuff

"Stuff" that we no longer want or need seems to be an ever-growing problem in many of our homes. So, what do you do with all that "stuff?" Uh, let's



see...you can sell it (EBay, yard sales, etc.), take it to the street and let the county dispose of it, see if your neighbors or maybe your children want it, OR you can donate it to a worthy organization that would put it to good use.

In our community (about 10 minutes away) is one of those worthy organizations you will want to consider – Friends of Disabled Adults and Children (FODAC). FODAC is located at 4900 Lewis Road, Stone Mountain, GA 30083, right around the corner in the industrial park.

FODAC was formed about years ago by a couple who accepted used mobility devices (wheelchairs, scooters, etc.), cleaned them up in their garage and gave them to people who needed them. FODAC's mission is to enhance the quality of life for people of all ages who have any type of illness, physical disability or injury. Each year, they provide more than 5,000 items at little or no cost to the recipient.

And here's how you can help...

Donate "gently used" home medical equipment and household items at the FODAC warehouse, where either Derrick or Keenan will help you unload your donations.

Or if the items are large, call FODAC to arrange a pickup by calling (770) 491-9014 and ask for the donations manger Irma (extension 114) or go to www. fodac.org/donationrequest. Items to be picked-up by the FODAC truck need to be easily accessible and in a good, resalable condition.

There are some items that FODAC is unable to accept.







District One Update **Bill Rosenfeld & Pat Soltys**

First of all, thanks to all who came to our Town Hall meeting last month. It was great to see nearly 100 people in attendance. It was a very lively and engaged session with good questions. Our first presenter was Christie Bryant, President, Georgia Arborist Association, who spoke about trees - identifying diseases, hiring tree companies,

permits and importance of our canopy. There were a number of questions regarding getting a tree permit to take down trees. Tree removal guidelines are on the City Website at https://www.tuckerga.gov/departments/building_permitting/tree_removal_guidelines. php. Permits are required if you are cutting down more than 5 non specimen trees in a year or a healthy specimen tree. While there is not a professional license for tree companies, there are business licenses. You need to be sure that any company hired has insurance and workman's comp for its workers. It should be registered with the Georgia Secretary of State and should have a Tucker Business License.

Traffic plans were discussed by Matthew Lee, Executive Director of the Tucker Northlake CID. He spoke about the new, elevated express lanes on 285, changes to some interchanges and the overall traffic plan. The plans effecting I-20 to Henderson Mill area are slated to begin in 2022. More info can be found at dot.ga.gov under projects.

Bill Rosenfeld and Pat Soltys addressed code enforcement and what code enforcement officers do. Areas where there was a lot of discussion included maintenance of right of ways, trash and building or property improvement. There are currently 134 cases open in District One code enforcement. All codes can be viewed at The Tuckerga.gov website under code enforcement.

You may have noticed fewer signs in the right of way. Signs in the right of way are not legal any place in the US. Tucker has begun enforcing and removing these signs. A guideline is that the right of way is from utility lines and forward. It varies significantly. No signs are allowed on traffic signs or utility poles. This includes real estate, garage and estate sales.

Term Rental properties were discussed including the current code limitation of no more than 2 unrelated people. An update was also given about problem properties.

The moratorium on zoning changes at the former Sears property lifted on August 30 and we are seeing interest in submitting proposals for the piece of land at the corner. The center piece next to the school was sold in July.

The city is working on a Non-Discrimination Policy to protect the rights of all and should be on the Council agenda very soon.

LT David Schoeppner gave a police update and answered questions.


An Unexpected Visitor by Sheila Willis

Are You Recycling?



Smoke Rise residents receiving garbage pickup from DeKalb County's Sanitation Division are eligible to participate in the Residential Recycling Program – at no additional cost! The annual sanitation assessment fee includes garbage collection, yard trimmings, and recycling.

All acceptable, recyclable materials go into one county-issued, blue, recycling roll cart – placed at your curb on collection day. (No sorting required.) In the past 20 months, the county's recycling program has diverted more than 21,000 tons of recyclable materials from the Seminole Road Landfill. The residential, single-stream recycling program collected 13,200 tons in 2018 and more than 8,100 tons so far in 2019.

Recycled material, collected from residential homes, is accumulated at the county transfer stations and transported to Pratt Industries Inc. in Conyers, GA for processing. Nearly 102,000, or 59 percent, of the county's 173,000 residential households are participating in the recycling program. The Sanitation Division has 40 of its more than 200 trucks assigned to residential recycling.

Residents are encouraged to place acceptable items in their county-issued 35- or 65-gallon recycling roll cart. Acceptable items for recycling in DeKalb's program include:

• Cardboard • Shrink wrap • Plastics (#1-7) • Aluminum (soda) cans • Packing paper (no wax) • Mixed paper (newspaper, magazine, printer and copy paper, looseleaf paper, notebook, etc.)

What about glass? The county stopped accepting glass in the recycling program, to ensure it will be processed and recycled in a responsible, environmentally-friendly way. You can recycle glass at several drop-off locations. (Get specifics at: www. dekalbsanitation.com,) Although not ideal, you can also dispose of glass by throwing it away with the rest of your non-recyclable garbage.

What about furniture and appliances? If you can't repurpose a piece of furniture or an old appliance, your residential, curbside collection service does include pickup of these items! Call the Sanitation customer service line, to report bulky items for pick, up once they have been placed at the curb. You can also call ahead or check the website, if you're not sure about a particular item.

What about disposing of old paint? Paint can be placed at your curb for pickup on your scheduled collection day, if the paint has solidified, and will not pour. You can use kitty litter or another drying agent to solidify liquid paint. Or, remove the paint can's lid, and stir daily, until the paint hardens in the can. Full cans of paint must be dry to the bottom - not just crusted over. (Cans with liquid paint can spill and leak onto roads – which is extremely difficult to remove!) Also, be sure to place paint cans beside the garbage roll cart - not inside the roll cart with household garbage. The lid must be removed, and either placed in your recycling container, or placed with your bagged garbage.

What about tires? The Sanitation Division will collect up to four passenger tires from residential customers at a fee of \$2.00 per tire. Or, residents may take a maximum of 10 passenger tires to the Seminole Road Landfill located at 4203 Clevemont Road, Ellenwood, GA 30294. Call (404) 687-4020 for more information.

What about other items a resident can dispose of at the landfill? You can take garbage, yard trimmings, furniture, personal vehicle tires, appliances and construction and demolition material to the landfill, for a disposal fee. Check online for details.

Some things are not accepted in the county's recycling program. If an item gets into the "system" that's not recyclable, it must be removed during some part of the process. That takes up extra time (which equals extra cost). Also, some items break, tangle, or clog recycling equipment in facilities (which also equals extra cost). You get the picture.

Bad to the Bone:

Osteoporosis Screening and Treatment

Last month I talked about the risk factors for Osteoporosis or thinning of the bones. Osteoporosis (OP) can lead to debilitating and sometimes life shortening fractures. Those who need to be screened are those with the most risk factors. One in two post-menopausal women are at risk for an osteoporosis related bone fracture. Older men have a one in five risk. Having a family history of a broken bone after the age of 50, female sex and menopausal status rank among the most common risk factors. In addition, there are many other secondary causes of OP. You can read last mont's article about this online.

The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force approved two basic recommendations for screening in 2018: Screen women 65 and older with bone density testing and screen women younger than 65 who are high risk. They have no specific recommendation for men although they recognize many men are at risk. They give no recommendation about how often to be screen but most doctors will screen every 2-3 years. (This is a Medicare screening interval suggestion). You may also have other high-risk reasons to screen.

The main way to be screened is to have a Bone Mineral Density (BMD) test done, usually in an imaging center, or sometimes, a doctor's office. The most complete and reproducible Bone Mineral Density test is called a DEXA scan. The DEXA scan compares the density of your bone in the spine and in the hips to normal values. The result of the test is given as a "T-score". A normal T-score is between -1.0 and 1.0 (or higher). Minus numbers mean the bone is less dense or thinner than normal. The 'bigger' the negative number, the thinner the bone is. A T-score of -1.0 to -2.4 is called pre-osteoporosis or Osteopenia. Anything thinner than -2.5 is categorized as Osteoporosis, and should be treated.

There are other numbers given on the report that your doctor will see. Many DEXA reports come with a calculation called the FRAX score. This is helpful in someone with pre-Osteoporosis. (Osteopenia). If you have a high FRAX score, you may possibly need to be treated during the Osteopenia phase. The FRAX score is an educated guess as to your risk of having a significant fracture over the next ten years. If the FRAX score is not automatically reported on your test result page, your doctor can plug all your risk factors into a FRAX calculator and can calculate your risk. You cannot calculate a FRAX score without having a T score number to plug into the calculator. Those with a FRAX score reflecting a 20% risk of bone fracture in the next 10 years or a 3% hip fracture risk should be treated, even if they only have Osteopenia.

Many types of doctors treat Osteoporosis. Your family doctor, an endocrinologist, a nephrologist, an oncologist or rheumatologist --if you are on steroids or chemo-- are all competent to treat Osteoporosis.

There are multiple U.S. FDA approved medications-- both oral and injectable types. Each medication is slightly different in the way it works to rebuild bone. It is important to have your doctor choose the treatment that is best for you. In some cases, almost any of the categories will work. Your doctor should discuss with you the benefits and risks of the treatment they recommend.

Before being treated, you should have normal calcium levels and know if you are deficient in vitamin D. In certain instances, other blood work is required prior to starting treatment. Supplemental Vitamin D (varies, but 1-3,000 International Units/day is a good start), Calcium (600 mg if you have normal Calcium levels) and weight-bearing exercise should be used along with your selected medication for OP.

Lastly—and this is my opinion-- there seems to be a shifting in the way doctors look at Osteoporosis. Instead of being a disease that is treated and cured, it is now being regarded as a disease that is chronic and is followed. If you are at risk, ask your doctor about a DEXA scan.


Crafty Morning Glories Enjoy a Workshop

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

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Amen, Let's Eat! Apples 🍑 🍎 🍎 💆

The fall produce markets are beautiful with still many choices of tomatoes and summer fruits and vegetables and the addition of fall favorites like muscadines, corn, okra and sweet potatoes, pumpkins, squash, apples of all varieties and fresh peas. It's a favorite time of year!

A trip to the North Georgia Mountains is a day well spent, especially if you come home with some fresh apples ready to go into your favorite recipe or added to your freezer for use later in the winter. Which apples are best for eating and which for cooking? Honeycrisp, my all-time favorite, can be used for both. For pies or baking any dessert, I like to use a mix: Granny Smith, Gala, Winesap, Rome or Fuji. Most apple orchards have handy charts to identify the best apple for your purposes.

The winner for the best apple to pack as a snack, due to its taste and beauty, is the traditional Red or Golden Delicious. My first recipe is for a Caramel Sauce that is a delicious enhancement to fresh sliced apples for any occasion. This recipe makes a lot and can be refrigerated in an airtite container for several months. It can be drizzled over the French Crème Apple Torte recipe (below) in place of the brandy sauce if preferred. To keep fresh apples from turning dark, soak in pineapple juice until ready to use, or keep some Fruit Fresh (ascorbic acid) in your pantry to sprinkle on.

Frozen apples can be quickly thawed to add to most recipes, especially desserts like apple cake or pie or apple crisp. Peel, core and slice apples into quart size freezer bag. Add ¼ cup of sugar and sprinkle with Fruit Fresh to keep apples from turning brown. Close bag and mix well, press out air and freeze. If apples are kept dry during the prep stage, you will be able to remove a few slices at a time to add to oatmeal or other hot cereals.

Caramel Sauce

½ cup butter

2 cups dark brown sugar

1 cup light corn syrup

1 can sweetened condensed milk

2 T. Water

1 T vanilla

Melt butter on low heat, add sugar and other ingredients. Increase heat to Medium, stirring constantly until melted and smooth. Serve over ice cream, pound cake, cheesecake. If desired add 1 cup chopped pecans.

French Crème Apple Tort

Line 9-inch springform pan with pastry.

Mix the following and spread on unbaked pastry:

1 (8- oz) package cream cheese

½ cup sugar

1 egg

½ tsp vanilla

Apple Layer:

Slice three golden delicious apples thin and arrange in circular design on top of cheese layer. Sprinkle with mixture of 1/3 cup sugar and ½ teaspoon cinnamon. Sprinkle ¼ cup sliced almonds on top.

Bake at 450° for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 400°, continue baking for 25 minutes. Cool before removing rim of pan.

Glaze:

½ cup apple jelly

1 T. brandy

Melt apple jelly on low heat and add the brandy. Mix well and use pastry brush to apply glaze to top of hot torte. Cool before serving.

Optional: Drizzle glaze or caramel sauce over tort while still warm or serve as topping when slices are plated.
