

Dear Folks,

Once again, we are beginning a new year. This year is slightly different as it also represents a new decade. Now's the time people tend to evaluate their lives, celebrating what they like and setting goals to change what they don't. Studies tell us by the 6<sup>th</sup> week of the New Year the vast majority of those resolutions made in good faith have fallen by the wayside.

While you may consider setting a new resolution, St. Paul's is making a change, not to something new, but going back to something old. During the fall, because the majority of people expressed an interest in one Sunday service, and our attendance numbers decreased, especially at the 8 am service, the Church Council voted to "try on" one service. The time was 10 am. No one had their original time of service. The change was made with the understanding a survey would be taken and a time of discussion would be held at our Congregational Meeting in November. While the survey still showed over two thirds liked the one service, there were still some voices who wanted their 8 am or 10:30 am service. At its November meeting, the Church Council voted to go back to 2 Sunday services – 8 am and 10:30 am with Sunday School at 9:15 am.

Change is hard. We see it in how many New Year's resolutions are broken, and we quite often see it in the church.

We think of the Bible as being static and unchanging, but even there, change can be found. In the Old Testament God is found in the temple. In the New Testament, God is found in His son Jesus with the temple no longer holding a central place. The Bible reflects the faith journeys of its writers as well as the Word of God for us. Each Biblical writer reimages Scripture for their own time and place. Although we have 4 Gospels that tell us the good news of Jesus, only 3 tell us the Christmas story of the Son of God becoming human, and each tell it in a completely different way. It's Luke's version we hear on Christmas Eve. The 4<sup>th</sup> gospel doesn't tell us anything about Jesus' birth.

As people of God, we gather to worship, accepting the mystery of those things we cannot understand. In this new year of doing an old thing, let us open our hearts and minds to meeting God in unexpected, new ways. Come, worship at any of our 3 weekend worship services, and commune with God in this sacred space where all are welcomed. Make this opportunity of choice for worship count in your life!

#### **Social Ministry News**

On Saturday, November 23<sup>rd</sup>, we sponsored our annual Thanksgiving Dinner for Seniors. 113 people were served, including those who attended, meals that were delivered, and everyone who worked at the dinner. Thank you to all who helped in any way to help us to have another successful event. Thank you also to Thrivent for helping us with their financial contribution.

Fifty children's names were received from Children & Youth, and ornaments with their names and gift suggestions were put on the Angel Tree. Within two weeks of church services, all of the names were taken. Thank you to all who have purchased gifts to help make these children have a Merry Christmas.

On Sunday afternoon, December 8<sup>th</sup>, nine of us boarded the bus and visited twelve of our elderly and shut-in members, delivered their Christmas treat bags, and sang a few Christmas Carols to each of them. Thanks to all who participated.

#### Council of Churches Schuylkill Haven & Vicinity

Schuylkill Haven & Vicinity Council of Churches Update As one of two of St. Paul's representatives for the Schuylkill Haven Council of Churches, I wanted to share all the good work that gets done through this organization with you, the members of St. Paul's. The Council meets every other month, rotating host sites amongst the 17 different dues-paying churches on the Council.

Pastor Kathy serves as our treasurer, and our church secretary, Linda, serves as both our other representative from St. Paul's and the leader of the Media Relations ministry. She works to keep our website updated. At all meetings, community ministries are reviewed. The Blood Bank ministry updates us with dates blood is collected in Schuylkill Haven, as well as results from previous collections. There was a collection on September 26 where 41 pints were collected, and data is still pending on the November 21 collection. Assignments are given for a Borough Prayer Assignment. A pastor from any of the 17 churches goes to the Schuylkill Haven Borough Council monthly meeting and leads the Council in prayer. Development is reviewed. Grants are applied for by members of the Council to help assure that the Council of Churches has funds. There is a Diaper Bank. A representative travels to Easton or Philadelphia monthly to bring back diaper products that are available to families in need at the Schuylkill Haven Food Pantry. The November collection included 1408 infant and children diaper products and 719 adult products. The Schuylkill Haven Food Pantry reviews their supply and gives a count of how many families used the service monthly. In the months of September and October, 181 families and 179 families respectively, used the Food Pantry. The leader of this

ministry also stated she was looking for volunteers for the month of December.

The Council of Churches is given an update from the Pastors Meetings that are held, as well as Social Action, and Special Services. Under Special Services, the Council announced the date and site for the Schuylkill Haven Area High School's Baccalaureate for the Class of 2020. The annual Unity Service also was planned, where all Council of Churches representatives and pastors come together to worship and recognize the volunteers that help make the community ministries happen. The service this year will be at 3pm on February 16, 2020 @ 3 pm. Stay tuned for more details. Social Action is a very important ministry. There is a cell phone line that can be contacted by anyone in Schuylkill Haven or a member of one of the churches in the Council for assistance. This cell phone is covered 24/7/365 by a pastor from the Council. Pastor Kathy also holds this phone and fields phone calls at times throughout the year. In the previous two months, it was reported that various needs arose: paying utility bills, emergency housing, emergency food pantry, and gift cards. Some phone calls render certain individuals ineligible due to repeat requests or greater needs. Through the Council of Churches, the funds are available to help people in the community that have fallen on hard times. Referrals are made to Servants to All, our local shelter in Pottsville, for the homeless. Emergency night stays are given at a local hotel, food is provided and the lights are kept on in houses of those unable to pay the utility bills.

Guest speakers also share needs within the community. The November meeting had a Chaplain from the Lebanon VA. He updated us on needs for veterans, reminding us the VFWs and VSO within our community act as good advocates for our veterans. He made us aware of a program called Warrior to

Soul Mate for veterans and their partners to help with relations post-combat. There is a No Veteran Dies Alone program, and he reminded us veterans should apply for resources, even if they have in the past and were denied. It is important that veterans apply, even if they feel others need it more than they. Applying and being denied helps other veterans receive resources! There is also a need for volunteer drivers to transport veterans from Schuylkill County to the VA.

Lastly, I'd like to mention that the Council of Churches funds the yearly backpack program in the Schuylkill Haven School District. It costs approximately \$10,000. Kids identified as needing additional food over the weekends are given a book bag with food to take home to assure they are not hungry while school is not in session. The yearly CROP walk is also organized by the Council of Churches, where over \$5,700 was raised this year to go to fighting hunger.

I was amazed at all the amazing ministries all made possible through the Council of Churches. I would like to continue updating our members about all the good works being done within our community on a daily basis. We are a very important cog in this organization because we are a financially stable church with an active pastor, secretary, and because of YOU! We should be proud of our contribution as member of St. Paul's to this greater good. United through the Council of Churches, we are able to help many more than we would be able to help if we did solitarily.
