

THE MINISTER'S MESSAGE

The story of Christmas centers on a familiar scene—the Nativity, with a spotlight on baby Jesus. We all know it well, and here at FCC Weston we'll be reminded again as we set up our make-shift stall, Larry Lambert hauls in a donkey and sheep, and children and adults take turns dressing up like Mary and Joseph, shepherds and the magi, while people gather in awe and a portable Bluetooth device fills the air with nostalgic melodies of Christmas. It's always moving to reflect on the humble birth of the Christ child in a Bethlehem



stable, laid in a feed trough traditionally called a manger, and wrapped in "swaddling clothes." Even a normal birth in those days would have been remarkably crude compared to our time. At best a midwife would have been present to help the mother, along with a couple of other women. Not so with the birth of Jesus. Mary had no help except from Joseph, who was a carpenter and not an obstetrician. She had no medication and no diapers or soft blankets for her baby. The "swaddling clothes" mentioned by Luke were not "clothes," like a shirt, pants or pajamas, but long strips of cloth wrapped around the baby— probably a torn up under tunic, not sterile, and by no means "baby-soft."

Like the coming of the Christ child, the birth of a baby is always special. Often two people, still considered kids by their parents, are suddenly transformed into a real married couple, "married with children," and a mountain of responsibility presses heavy on their shoulders. But having a baby these days seems more complicated and dramatic compared to the humble manner of Jesus' birth. Just thinking about all the "essential" paraphernalia is mind boggling. Friends and family hold a baby shower, usually well in advance of the birth, for giving gifts more practical and immediately usable than the gifts of the magi— diapers, wipes, soaps and lotions, blankets, bottles, formula, spoons and bibs, rattles and mobiles— everything needed for a whole year. And often the bedroom for the new arrival is already laid out with furniture, equipment and supplies, and a changing station suitable for major surgery at Presbyterian Hospital. New babies are always a wonder of wonders.

During this Christmas season this old man is feeling exceptionally nostalgic, head rushing with mixed emotions, wondering how Santa must struggle to climb in and out of the sleigh, much less squeeze down a chimney. But as was the case at our community Thanksgiving Service, my thoughts are all about our children, and the wonder of what each new-born may become in a short twenty to thirty years.

So I say again, "teach the children well, and feed them on your dreams." I am proud of Danielle for all she is doing to nurture the children of our church, and for the parents who truly believe that one day those children will lead a strong and vibrant congregation with a clear vision of God's will, purpose and mission. May all your days be merry and bright.

HANGING OF THE GREENS SERVICE - DECEMBER 1ST

December 1st is the First Sunday in Advent, and we will celebrate with the "Hanging of the Greens" Service at which time the sanctuary will be decorated with garlands and wreaths by several of our congregation's families. There will be the lighting of the first candle of the Advent wreath and favorite carols and hymns will be sung.

Advent is the beginning of the church liturgical year and the time of preparation for the coming of Christmas. It is the beginning of the Christian story, the preparation, the hope that the birth of our Savior brings.

Advent comes in the darkest time of the year; the Winter Solstice is in the middle of this season of the church year. Yet for the church this is the season of light. We light a candle each Sunday to put out the darkness, to witness to the light to the nations. This light comes into the world and will never be put out. And each week the sanctuary is brighter.

HYMN OF THE MONTH - "O COME, ALL YE FAITHFUL"

The hymn, "O Come, All Ye Faithful," was written by John Francis Wade, an 18th century Catholic layman involved in the music business in France. Copies of the hymn migrated to Portugal and then to England. First written in Latin — the original version begins with the words, Adeste Fideles — an Anglican clergyman, Frederick Oakeley, translated it into English. Today it is one of the most popular Advent/Christmas hymns, and is sung by Christians around the world.

One of the reasons for its popularity is the joyful character of its words and music. "O Come, all ye faithful, joyful and triumphant," it says — and the music has a joyful, triumphant lilt to go with the joyful, triumphant words.



The hymn calls us to come to Bethlehem to behold the baby Jesus. It calls us to come and adore him. It reminds us of the angel choir that accompanied Jesus' birth — and of the shepherds who gathered around his cradle. It reminds us that God calls us, too, to sing Christ's praises — and to give him glory in this Christmas season. Christmas is a busy season, and we have a thousand things on our minds and a thousand things to do. But through it all, let us remember to come and adore the Christ who came into the world in this season to bring us light for our darkness — and joy — and life eternal.

- The minutes were approved from the October board meeting.

- <u>Constitution & Bylaws:</u> Les Massey presented the updated constitution and bylaws. Board voted on approving changes to affiliations and baptism changes. The board voted on the adoption of the entire constitution. Bylaws still need some editing/reviewing.
- Nominating committee will need to have new board member options by December 1st.
- <u>Leveling Church:</u> The board voted to spend between \$3,200-4,000 to level the church. It will take about a week.
- New Minister Committee Report: Marilyn presented information from meeting with Larry Ross. Need to send out a congregational profile survey to the congregation to fill out.
