Representative Projects

National Marine Fisheries Service Office of Protected Resources Collected Automatic Information System (AIS) data to assess effectiveness of a rule requiring vessels 65 feet and greater to slow their speeds to 10 knots or less near port entrances along the U.S. Eastern seaboard and in North Atlantic right whale aggregation sites known as Seasonal Management Areas. Reports were compiled from the data and then sent monthly to seventeen international shipping companies to assist them in ensuring compliance within their fleets.

Greater Farallones National Marine Sanctuary Provided environmental policy and regulatory support, which included reviewing permit applications, conducting emergency response efforts during groundings, coordinating with agencies and stakeholders, and assisting on other resource protection programs and priorities.

National Petroleum Council Provided technical and editorial support to the Operations and Environment Subgroup of the National Petroleum Council, a federal advisory committee. The study was requested by former Secretary Chu and was prepared by a team of experts from industry, state and federal government agencies, conservation groups, financial institutions and academia.

Smithsonian Environmental Research Center Provided dive support for an invasive species survey in the kelp forests between Monterey and Carmel, California, and within the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary. Counted invasive species, which was primarily *Watersipora*, in 1-meter quadrats along transect lines.

Half Moon Bay Yacht Club Biological Assessment Conducted a biological assessment of the water and land resources surrounding the Half Moon Bay Yacht Club related to a proposed floating dock and pier for a California Coastal Development permit.

San Francisco Estuary Institute's Fitzgerald Marine Reserve Pollution Reduction Program Led a team in the collection of water samples that were used to evaluate differences in contaminant concentrations from storm water discharges from the watershed into the James V. Fitzgerald Marine Reserve. The reserve is designated as an area of special biological significance by the State of California and is recognized as one of the richest, most biologically diverse intertidal environments on the California coast.
