

OF GRACE AND HOLINESS

Palm Sunday is here! It means Holy Week and Easter are here – much too fast. As prepared or unprepared as each of us may be, I invite us to try and create or enter the mood for the coming solemn celebrations and what God is ever ready to work in our lives. For the Passion Play cast, we always encourage them at rehearsals to try and get in their respective moods. So, we too much try and be in the mood of this holy season. I thought of something that might help us to remain focused through the celebrations – grace.

The issue of grace is one of the long-standing debates between the Catholic and the Protestant churches. Both do agree that without grace we human beings cannot please God or be acceptable before God. Without grace, we are all condemned, like Barabbas.

Barabbas was a revolutionary, a guerilla or rebel. Matthew refers to him as a notorious prisoner (27:16). Luke and Mark refer to him as "one involved in a riot (Mark 15:7; Luke 23:19). He is also referred to as a bandit. This is one of the children of God whose lives were substituted with Christ's. Jesus substituted his life for mine. He substituted his life for yours. We speak of "substitute teacher." I invite you to use this week to reflect on how Jesus achieved this. Here are some aids to help you.

How does grace work in our lives, in your life? Again, this is the great division between the Catholics and Protestants. Both do agree that grace is God's gift, won for humanity by the sacrifice of Christ Jesus. It's a question of our justification or means of salvation. The Protestants hold firmly to the ideas that grace works extrinsically on each of us. It simply means that grace does not penetrate and cleanse our human nature from within. So, for little Isabel Villanueva, whom we baptized last Saturday, her Original Sin remains. Yes, she did receive God's grace but it's much like a cloak that covers the corruption of her human nature. Thus she's acceptable to God, even though she remains depraved deep within her. It was said that Martin Luther (Protestant Reformation) said that a justified soul is like a "snow-covered pile of dung."

I don't mince words when I proudly proclaim that I'm so glad to be a Catholic. I have not been brainwashed, but if anyone thinks so, then I'm mighty glad that I've been brainwashed. I don't want to be a "snow-covered pile of dung." I want to attain that original nature in which God created me and saw that I was beautiful (Genesis chapter 1). Once you reach a vital conclusion, it affects other aspects of life. So, what follows this Protestant teaching on grace is that my actions are worth nothing toward my justification or salvation. Yes, they help me to be holy, but that's all.

As Catholics, we believe that baptism does indeed cleanse us intrinsically, and makes us truly a "new creation" (2 Cor. 5:17). Through baptism we share in God's divine nature. We are indeed made holy! Amen to that! This then means that we can become holy again, even after we commit sins after baptism! Thus the need for more grace, apart from the grace of baptism! Thus we have our wonderful, Christ instituted 7 Sacraments, through which we receive graces at various points of our lives. When we're sick, we receive the grace of healing through Anointing of the Sick. When we sin we receive the grace of forgiveness through the Sacrament of Penance. Through Confirmation we receive the grace to be strong soldiers for Christ. Through the Sacrament of Marriage we receive the grace to live a holy married life. Through the Sacrament of Ordination, the priest receives power to sanctify God's children in the name of Christ. And through the wonderful gift of the Holy Eucharist, we receive the grace to, what can I say, be like God! Share in God's Divine Life!

I invite you to use this Holy Week to reflect on how Jesus has been sanctifying your life through these grace-filled Sacraments. It all began when He substituted His life for Barabbas, you, and I. It all begin on Palm Sunday, through Holy Week, all the way to Easter Sunday. I'll not miss these grace-filled celebrations for anything in this world. Because he subbed for me. Because I need those graces to strive to be holy. Because, this is the week grace flows freely for all.
