

The bottom black and white image was discovered when the Shroud was first photographed by an Italian man named Second Pia during the shroud's 1898 public exhibition in Turin, Italy. Then in the darkroom, Pia was shocked when he saw the negative image develop into a detailed black-and-white "positive" image. The unexpected positive image revealed wounds from the "man of the Shroud's" torture and suffering that corresponded with the Gospel accounts of Christ's Passion.

(From www.shroud.com website) The scientific consensus is that the image was produced by something which resulted in oxidation, dehydration and conjugation of the ... structure of the microfibrils of the linen itself. Such changes can be duplicated in the laboratory by certain chemical and physical processes. A similar type of change in linen can be obtained by sulfuric acid or heat. However, there are no chemical or physical methods known which can account for the totality of the image, nor can any combination of physical, chemical, biological or medical circumstances explain the image adequately. Thus, the answer to the question of how the image was produced or what produced the image remains, now, as it has in the past, a mystery.

We can conclude for now that the Shroud image is that of a real human form of a scourged, crucified man. It is not the product of an artist.


