

From Vicar Stefanec...

Dear Trinity,

As we continue to consider how Old Testament individuals foreshadow Christ, we look to Samson. Samson was a judge of Israel, during a time when men did what was right in their own eyes. The people of Israel fell into idolatry and served Baals (Judges 2:11). So, "The Lord raised up judges who saved them out of the hand of those who plundered them," (2:16). Similarly to Christ, Samson's birth was miraculously announced. The Angel of the Lord appeared to his parents at a time when Israel was given into the hands of the Philistines for forty years. "Behold, you are barren...but you shall conceive and bear a son," (13:3).

Samson has profound strength, assuming his hair is not cut. However, Samson sins by choosing to take a Philistine woman as his wife, which is forbidden by the Law lest pagan wives lead Israel into further idolatry (Deuteronomy 7:3-4). Eventually, Samson is seduced by a prostitute in Gaza who learns that cutting his hair will remove his strength, and he is captured by the Philistines. They remove his eyes and have a sacrifice of celebration to their God. They call Samson in to entertain them, but he prays for his strength to return. Samson pulls the two middle pillars together, and the structure they are in falls down upon the Philistines and buries them along with Samson in the Earth (Judges 16:23-31). So, Samson partook in the sin of his people, and subjected himself to the slavery of the nations just as Israel did to themselves.

So it is also with Christ. Christ too is born to a barren womb, for no virgin can conceive a child on her own. While Samson partook of the sin of his people, Christ who knew no sin of his own became sin for our sake and assumed the sin of his people upon himself. While Israel was adulterous and married foreign wives and worshipped false gods, Christ took all their adultery and idolatry to the cross. Just as Samson was made a prisoner by pagans and tore down the edifice of idolatry upon himself, Christ was handed over to the Gentiles and was crucified so that he might destroy the sin, unbelief, and idolatry of all mankind. Just as Samson died in tearing it down, Christ was buried into the earth so that he might defeat sin, death, and Satan.

Let us then look to Christ as the one who has destroyed the sin of the nations and delivered us from the rule of

false gods. He has made us his own special possession so that we are free to be people of God.

For Prayer: O Father, I too am a defeated sinner, spiritually blind and in bondage to the devil according to my sinful flesh. Remember me, Lord. Give me strength to carry out what you have called me to do. May Christ in his sacrifice pull down the works of Satan and deliver me from captivity. In his name I pray, Amen.
