"... He that keepeth thee will not slumber. Behold, He that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep." Psalm 121: 3b, 4

But he assured the man that he wasn't perturbed because he was on his Master's business and he had no doubt that his God who had always taken care of him would see him through this difficulty, too. Soon the ticket collector came by and tipped his hat to Spurgeon's companion whereupon he whispered something to the ticket collector and he left without asking for their tickets. Mr. Spurgeon thought this was strange and said so. Then the man made himself known, that he was the general manager of the line they were on and that he felt it was divinely arranged by God that he happened to be on the train at this particular time and could be of service to Mr. Spurgeon. Things do not just happen for God's children. A wide awake, never sleeping Father takes care of the most minute detail of their lives.

I'm sure Elijah was thankful that God doesn't sleep; for he taunted the worshippers of Baal, after they had cried unto their God from morning unto evening and even cut themselves till the blood gushed out, with "cry aloud, for peradventure he sleepeth and must be awakened." Then God clinched the fact when He answered Elijah's sixty-three word prayer before the amen could be attached, with the all consuming fire from heaven that even licked up the water and dust.



.... "For I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus." — Gal. 6: 17

Paul on the road to Damascus met Jesus, while he was on a mission to apprehend all he found that were of "This Way". Meeting Christ, caused his inner being to cry out, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" and he became branded with the "Mark of Jesus". There is such a need this day, that the marks of Christ should be manifested. Religious orders of men, and churchianity have failed. So many who bear His Name do not bear His Image. Therefore the poor sinner is deceived, and seeks elsewhere to find the peace that his soul is craving for. How many times have I heard, "If that's Christianity, I don't want any of it!" Someone failed to wear the Marks and express the Image of Christ.

Jesus "bears acquaintance". The farther you walk with Him, the longer you know and serve Him, the deeper His Brand is burned in your body, soul and spirit and the more you will love Him and want to please Him. True beauty in love is not seen in the courtship, nor even


the honeymoon, but after years of sharing toil, trials, sickness and hard times; to then see a man look at his wife and she at him with love in their eyes that words can't describe — that is to behold love in maturity and full bloom.

It is good to see a sinner come to Christ, and in true repentance open his heart and soul to God, for there is a mark placed on him as he accepts Christ as his Saviour. But it is even better to watch him as his love grows and we can see the Marks of Christ increase and the Brand of Jesus deepen with every advancing step of his Christian way. For the farther you go with Christ, the more you will love Him. When we love Him enough we will want to commit ourself completely to Him. Just as the bride must be willing to lose her identity and take the name of the groom, even so must we follow Christ and lose ourselves in Him; for He said "If any man will come after me let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me".

I am sure there were some physical marks on Paul from the 195 stripes he received, the stonings, and the months of imprisonment; yet I feel that the marks of Christ were deeper in His spirit and soul, for he longed with a consuming passion for men to know Christ in all the power of the Gospel, who could even forgive the "chiefest of Sinners".

am a man. Who am I? What am I? What brought me into being and to whom am I responsible? If I am not filling my responsibility and if my destiny is not certain, is there something I can do to correct it?

These are the kind of questions asked by men and women, boys and girls of our generation. This is not the only generation that has sought for answers to questions like this because these questions have been being answered since the dawn of history.

Genesis 1:1

It was his job to dress and keep the garden of Eden. But when we remember also that his was before the ground was cursed with briers and thistles Adam's job was a delightful one.

Of all the earthly creatures, Man undoubtedly is God's masterpiece. Any of the things, creatures, and beings could be masterpieces in themselves, but man is the masterpiece of masterpieces. God's goodness is displayed . . . even to the point to provide woman for the man.

The Bible Story Of Man

WHAT IS MAN?

In generation past the great song-writer expressed questions concerning man in relation to the great Creator. He beholds the vastness of God's creative handiwork in great admiration. He wonders about the angels which God had made. He sees all the animal kingdom also and realizes that God gave this man dominion over all of this and David sings, "What is man that thou art mindful of him or the son of man that thou cisitest him." This passage is mentioned in the New Testament (Hebrews 2:6-8). We must think deeply on this special statement: "... thou art mindful of him."

Psalms 8:3-9

When I consider thy heavens, the work of thy fingers, the moon and the stars, which thou has ordained; What is man that thou art mindful of him or the son of man that thou visiteth him? For thou hast made him a little lower than the angels, and hast crowned him with glory and honour. Thou madest him to have dominion over the works of thy hands; thou hast put all things under his feet: All sheep and oxen, yea, and the beasts of the field; The fowl of the air, and the fish of the sea, and whatsoever passeth through the paths of the seas. O Lord our Lord, how excellent is thy name in all the earth.

Man can make things. In fact, man can make and has made some wonderful things. When we think of the many wonderful labor-saving devices and the luxurious appliances man has made we are quite proud of him. But where did man get this inventive genius? Where did man get the energy? Where did man get all this intelligence. He received it all from God.

The artisticly talented man has done quite well in making likenesses of himself in sculptor and on canvas. But only the likeness is there. He never has attained to the ability to give life—to the image of man. He indeed never shall attain to that ability. Only God can do that. What did God do when he made man? He put into man the thousands of wonderful mysterious things that medical science is trying to discover. The way the human grows and matures . . . the way his body recovers from sickness and injury . . . the way the human reproduces himself . . . and many other things too wonderful to understand. Again we read a part of a Psalm:

Psalms 139: 3-1

For thou hast possessed (formed) my reins: thou hast covered me (knit me together) in my mother's womb. I will praise thee; for I am fearfully and wonderfully made: marvelous are thy works; and that my soul knoweth right well. My substance (frame Heb. bone) was not hid from thee, when I was made

in secret, and curiously wrought in the lowest parts of the earth. Thine eyes did see my substance, yet being unperfect; and in thy book all my members were written, which in continuance (day by day) were fashioned, when as yet there was none of them.

What if man had not fallen from his first estate? What if he had not sinned? Our imaginations can only tell us what we think it would have been. But man did sin. We will study about his fall and failure in a future lesson. In this lesson we will continue to explore the question: "What is Man? or "Who Am I?"

God did not disgard the offspring of Adam. He made a plan whereby this fallen man could be redeemed. We will study this in future lessons.

Man's sin changed all of man's future destiny. But let us examine a scripture that shows that God blessed man after the flood. God had a plan that nothing could stop.

After the flood, however, man is not confined to a garden as he was before he was driven out. He was commanded of God to multiply and replenish the earth. God says that man is now in command over all of God's creation on earth. It seems that God has transferred a responsibility upon man that he did not have before. The earlier race was to multiply and replenish the earth, but now, after the flod, God commands the family of Adam (now Noah) to do so.

God also gave notice that it was a serious thing to shed blood. Man will never be able to educate himself away from this warning.

Genesis 9:1-7

And God blessed Noah and his sons, and said unto them, Be fruitful, and mulitply, and replenish the earth. And the fear of you and the dread of you shall be upon every beast of the earth, and upon every fowl of the air, upon all that moveth upon the earth, and upon all the fishes of the sea; into your hand are they delivered. Every moving thing that liveth shall be meat for you; even as the green herb have I given you all things. But flesh with the life thereof, which is the blood thereof, shall ye not eat. And surely your blood of your lives will I require: at the hand of every beast will I require it, and at the hand of man; at the hand of every man's bother will I require the life of man. Whoso sheddeth man's blood, by man shall his blood be shed: for in man's bloor, by man shall his blood be shed: for in the image of God made he man.

OBITUARY OF FRED FERGUSON


