September Tournaments

The first September tournament was a Wild Card on Thursday September 8th. Twenty members fished catching 60 bass for a total weight of 69lbs 1 ounces. Seven members brought in 5 bass limits.



Bruce Zorn and Dave Keith tied for first place angler division. Bruce got first as the result of the largest bass tie breaker. He caught his fish with texas rigged shaky tail green pumpkin worm (right second from top) and Zoom junebug Mag II worm (right third from top). Dave Keith was 2nd catching his 5 bass limit on wacky rigged green pumpkin (left top) or watermelon red (left second from top) finesse worms. Most of Dave's fish came from fishing the wacky worm under and around docks. Paul Galfund won first place co-angler with a 5 bass limit. Paul caught his fish on a texas rigged green pumpkin swamp crawler (bottom right) and a deep diving crank bait (bottom left). Dave and his co-angler were the only mem-

bers having success in shallow water. Most other member were catching fish in brush piles and along drop offs in 12 –18 feet of water.

Fishing Report

Lake: Coronado

Date: 9/16/16 Time: 7:00 to 11:30 am Air Temp: 71-85 Water Temp: 82

Weather Conditions: partly cloudy Wind: ESE

@ calm – 5 mph

Water Color: Clear

Area Fished: Fished points, drop offs, docks and steep banks with Texas rigged junebug Utail worm, jig head with a green pumpkin prosenko and Kelley J jr top water.

Results: Caught 6 small bass (10—11 inches) on the top water bait early (7—7:45). Then move out into deeper water and caught 18", 17 1/2", and 4 that were 12" - 13". Caught all the fish in deeper water with the jig head with the green pumpkin pro senko fishing the sides of points with the boat in 18—20 feet of water casting into 14—16 feet.
