
PJA Website

20 years of Knives in the Woods 1993-2013

With every martial art society there are milestones that are celebrated. Some are done in grand fashion, and some are done in a discrete backwoods camping grounds...obscured by tall redwoods and fog...with all participants in camouflage and protective gear. The latter would be the 20th year of Knives In The Woods (KITW) held August 16-18, 2013.

It was in 1993 when Master Combat Knife Instructors Robert Krull, Don Richardson, and Robert McKean started an "invitation only" training camp that focused on military combat knife techniques and use. The curriculum developed from years of experience in the SpecOps Community and in Law Enforcement has led to one of the most intensive training weekends any martial artist could imagine.

Both Master Krull and McKean were students of Prof. William Montero. Although there was an eleven year gap between their attendance of the Pacific Judo Academy, chance brought them together and a strong bond was developed between the two. Both men were interested in the combat arts of knife fighting and received their early instruction from Prof. Montero. As a captain in the Hawaiian Territorial Nation Guard, Prof Montero would escort Prof Okazaki to the Military bases in Hawaii and assist in the teaching of hand-to-hand combat and knife fighting to US soldiers. Master Krull continued to refine his knowledge of knife fighting during his military service and martial arts career. Master Richardson and Master Krull met through the martial arts but knew of one another through the Military SpecOps community. Both men, along with Master McKean, spent years working and refining the knife program into what it is today.

During the first 10 years the camp was held at Master Krull's ranch home in Calistoga CA. This beautiful wooded hillside ranch was the inspiration for the course name "Knives in the Woods". After Master Krull's passing in 2004, the remaining two Master Instructors, along with the new Master Combat Knife Instructors Mike Tucker and Chris Nicholas, have conducted classes in Arizona, New York, Nevada, and Northern California. Keeping to the tradition of invitation only and preserving and protecting the deadly arts learned at the hands of Master Krull, only 143 people have participated in the program since its inception.

The August 2013 weekend celebration was attended by 33 veterans of the KITW program, many of whom have attended between five and ten events. This alumni only workout saw participants traveling to Crescent City CA from Southern California, the San Francisco Bay area, Florida, and New York, amongst other places. For this special event, the KITW instructors were told to take off the red shirts and enjoy the weekend as the four Master Instructors took the lead.

Participants took to the field, and after a short warm up, the work began. New drills and concepts were shared after a short review of the basics. Participants were then treated to a special lecture and field demonstration from Dr. Jim Warren, Major, U. S. Army Reserve, as he taught knife wound trauma management. After that it was time for the Gauntlet exercise. The name says it all as students fight their way through the field one opponent at a time.

Master Richardson, Master Chief, USN Retired, a Veteran of the Viet Nam war, gave insight into the mindset required for physical confrontation and how to cope with the realities of violence. This lecture gave students and instructors alike an opportunity to ask in depth questions from a Master Instructor with over 20 years experience in the SpecOps community.

After lunch, participants learned how to sharpen knives to a razors edge. Then it was back in the field for the final hours of training for the day. This was followed by a fantastic steak dinner prepared by the host dojo. This was not the end of the day though and the customary "pupu" session was held back at the hotel. Master Instructors sharing stories and life experiences, as well as, creating bonds between participants that will last well beyond the weekend.

On day two, participants entered the field bruised, battered, and sore. This did not slow down this group though as they were reviewing drills and new material from the previous day. Soon participants were steaming in the morning cool and the mood was set for day two. Dr. Warren gave an addition lecture on chest wound trauma and students were given the chance to sharpen knives and hone their skills on any area requested.

When it was time to close the event, this year's course survivors received a certificate of completion and a special 20th anniversary KITW patch. Three new people were inducted into the Concrete Warrior Knife Society and each of the "walking wounded" was presented with a special black and blue heart to acknowledge their continued hard work despite injury.

Having participating in almost all of the KITW events and having taught the system for 10 years, I was proud to share my knowledge and watch the continued progress of those who have dedicated themselves to this unique following. I am proud to be continuing a legacy passed to me that is not for all to see. A system of training that pushes the physical and mental limits of all its participants. And as I started the long drive home, Master Richardson sent a note to say Master Krull would be proud of all who were in the field this weekend.

...still moving forward and continuing a promise made to Bob Krull 9 years ago!

Chris Nicholas holds the rank of Rokudan (6th dan) in Danzan Ryu Jujitsu and is one of the founding members of the Pacific Jujitsu Alliance. He is also a charter member of the Concrete Warrior Knife Society, the ranking body for the Knives in the Woods program. Chris is currently one of four Master Combat Knife Instructors and has been instructing the blade since 2003.


