“What If Christmas Is Ruined?”

“Death Takes a Holiday” is from season 9 of the classic television show *M.A.S.H.* The episode takes place during the Korean War and centers around a U.S. soldier who is shot in the head on Christmas Day by a sniper. The wounded soldier is brought to the M.A.S.H. unit where Hawkeye, B.J. and Margaret try to save his life. After Margaret finds a picture of the soldier's wife and family in his personal effects, B.J. becomes determined to keep him alive long enough so that "his kids won't have to think of Christmas as the day their daddy died." Despite their best efforts, the soldier dies shortly before midnight. However, the medical team is undeterred and keeps working on him, refusing to ruin Christmas for the soldier's family. Finally, they declare him dead on December 26.

There's lots of things that can ruin Christmas, and this year, the coronavirus seems bent on ruining Christmas. Our congregation had already come to grips with not having a Christmas dinner or a cantata or even singing carols together during worship. But now with in-person worship suspended through December 13, the specter of no in-person worship on Christmas Eve seems like a very real, though unwelcome, possibility. As pastor, I've asked myself, “What if Christmas is ruined?”

Thankfully, there have been times when Christmas appeared to be ruined, but in the midst of ruination, creative people made the most of their circumstances.

I once heard the story of a young man whose father lost his job before Christmas. With little if any money, it looked like Christmas was ruined. But the innovative father went to an appliance store and was given several large stove and refrigerator boxes. The father decorated the boxes and cut windows and doors in them, turning them into a village for his gleeful children. Years later, his children said it was their “best Christmas ever.” They made the most of Christmas, despite their circumstances.

Christmas certainly appeared to be ruined in 1914: the nation, indeed, almost the entire world was engulfed in World War I. Nonetheless, all along the Western Front German and British soldiers famously began serenading each other with Christmas carols from their trenches. In some places, soldiers from opposing sides of the battlefield cautiously approached one another and began sharing Christmas gifts with their enemies: cigarettes and

(Continued from page 1) chocolates and playing cards. They made the most of Christmas, despite their circumstances.

As it turns out, Jesus is no stranger to ruined Christmases, for the Christmas story isn't just about mangers and angels and shepherds. It's also about Eastern foreigners following a star to the Holy Land. Stopping in Jerusalem—the logical place to stop—they unwittingly tip off a jealous king, telling him that another King had just been born. They continue on to Bethlehem, pay homage to Jesus, and then return home by a different route. Likewise, Jesus' family slips away safely to Egypt, leaving an enraged Herod who orders the murder of all infant boys in Bethlehem. There's no "making the most of their circumstances." There was only "Rachel weeping for her children and refusing to be comforted." Innocents had died. Christmas was ruined. However, God preserved that story next to the story of the adoration of the magi to remind us that Christ is found even amidst our ruined Christmases. God never shrinks away from the disasters of our lives. In fact, that's what Christ's Incarnation is all about.

Sometimes we make the most of our ruined Christmases. Other times we can't even do that. But always, Christ is beside us, even in the midst of our ruination.

As a United Methodist Church, our worship is shaped by the Word of God. To that end, we often follow the Revised Common Lectionary which suggests four scripture lessons for each week. Here are the scriptures which are suggested for each Sunday this month. Please read them as part of your devotions in order to prepare your hearts for worship, whether in-person, on the radio, or on Facebook.

Sunday, December 6, Second Sunday of Advent

We are in the midst of Advent, and the scriptures anticipate the coming of Christ. Scriptures will include Isaiah 40:1-11; Psalm 85; 2 Peter 3:8-15a; and Mark 1:1-8.

Sunday, December 13, Third Sunday of Advent

Scriptures include Isaiah 61:1-4, 8-11; Psalm 126; 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24 and John 1:6-8, 19-28.

Sunday, December 20, Fourth Sunday of Advent

Hopefully, we will be able to host in-person worship today and for the rest of the month. However, that determination won't be made until mid-December by our Bishop and Cabinet. Regardless of the outcome, you will be notified via Call-'Em-All and Facebook. Scriptures include 2 Samuel 7:1-11, 16; Luke 1:46-55; Romans 16:25-27 and Luke 1:26-38.

Thursday, December 24, Christmas Eve

Services will be held at 7 pm and 11 pm. If we are permitted to hold in-person worship, an additional service will be added on Wednesday or earlier on Thursday to provide a safe environment for everyone. Scriptures include Isaiah 9:2-7; Psalm 96; Titus 2:11-14; and Luke 2:1-20

Sunday, December 27, First Sunday after Christmas

Scriptures include Isaiah 61:10-62:3; Psalm 148; Galatians 4:4-7; and Luke 2:22-40.

Stewardship Matters


I would like to take this opportunity to mention three stewardship matters. First, we are nearing the end of the year and we want to be sure that we meet all of our financial obligations for 2020. Our treasurers, Denise Patterson and Dwight Reynolds, are concerned that we may end the year with a shortfall of \$10,000 to \$20,000. However, I suspect that many of you remember the church in a special way at the end of the year. If so, please try to do so by Friday, December 10. That's because the following week of Sunday, December 13, someone from our Finance Team will send out a Call-'Em-All which will update you of our financial status. I am informing you now so you won't be surprised when the call comes to you. Hopefully, the call will bring you good news.

The second stewardship matter concerns our Capital Campaign. Over the past three years, we've received pledges toward five projects. With the installation of our beautiful new stained-glass windows, three of those projects are now complete. However, we still need funding for the renovation of our chancel. Sometime in the next few weeks, you will receive a letter from our Capital Campaign Committee which will give you the opportunity to participate in that project. I am informing you now so you won't be surprised when the letter comes to you.

Finally, every January we receive pledges for the coming year. Your pledge will support the general ministries of Aledo UMC and is an important part of your spiritual discipline. Once again, you will receive a letter in the mail in early January. I am informing you now, so you won't be surprised when the letter arrives in your mailbox.

I realize that three financial appeals in such a short time can be a little overwhelming, especially in these difficult times. That's why I wanted to give you this opportunity to prayerfully and wisely seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit to discern what your part might be. I, along with the leadership of Aledo UMC, will be in prayer with you.

We are following our United Methodist Church Bishop's guidelines to suspend church services, but maintain social services as needed.

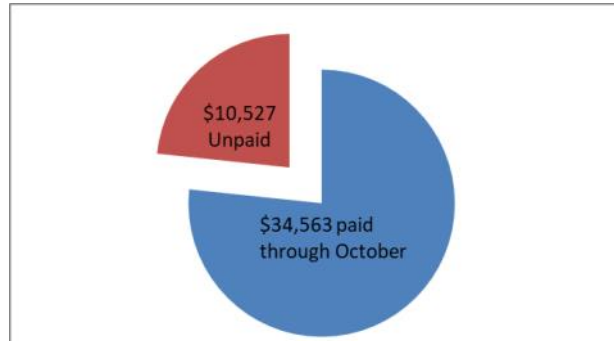
This weekly food distribution will temporarily replace the availability of our Caring Hearts frozen food and food packs.

How is our church doing financially?

Considering all of the current issues with the pandemic our church is doing fairly well but we still need your help. As of the end of October we owe \$10,527 in conference claims. This is two and one half months of conference claims. You may remember that the Illinois Great Rivers Conference provided our church a loan when the pandemic started in the amount of \$5,007. This loan will be forgiven if we are able to pay 100% of this year's conference obligations. If our giving stays the same for the remainder of the year, we could be short up to \$20,000 at year end of paying all of the church's obligations.



What can we do about this?

Our church is totally funded by our members and friends so it is up to each one of us individually and all of us together who make up this great church to solve the problem. We can't depend on someone else to take care of this! We've done it before and we can do it again. If you are behind on your pledge or your usual gifts please help us by catching up as best you can. If you are up to date on your pledge, please consider giving an extra gift as God has blessed you. Experience shows us that in order to raise enough funds to catch up and continue to fully fund the rest of the year, we will need some larger donations such as \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and \$2,500. Please pray about this and we thank each one of you for what you are doing to keep our church financially stable.

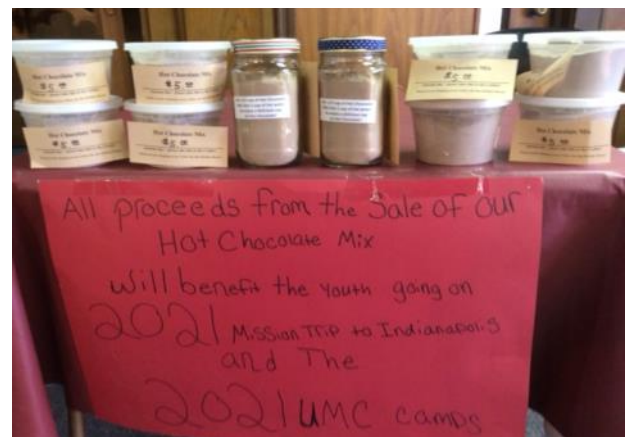
