SATURDAY ARCHAEOLOGY FIELD SCHOOL

A 10-session Saturday morning program focusing on the rich historical archaeological remains of the county, the excavations will run from mid-March through May. Two units will work in western and in central Suffolk County on varied sites, including some testing of East End sites for National Register site nomination. The research will be directed by Dr. Sherene Baugher-Perlin, Fairleigh Dickinson University, and Meta Faden, Urban Archaeology Program Graduate Assistant, CUNY.

The <u>Graduate Student Organization</u> of the State University of New York at Stony Brook recently approved a grant of \$500 toward the operational expenses of the CETA-funded "National Register Nomination of Suffolk County Cultural Resources" project, housed in the Anthropology Dept., SUNY-Stony Brook. Upon completion of the year-long project in mid-March, at least 10 archaeological/cultural sites in the County will have been processed for submission to the National Register; currently there is only one archaeological site on the Register -- Ft. Corchaug.

The National Park Service has recently awarded a contract for the cultural resources study of Fire Island National Seashore; the project is being conducted by Dr. Laraine Fletcher for Cultural Resources Management Service.

Through the sponsorship of County Historian Chris Vagts, the S.C. Legislature recently included funding for the position of a professional curator for the Suffolk County Historical Society Museum, Riverhead. The position is being advertised nationally; all interested candidates are invited to apply to Mrs. Helen Hanna, Director.

The Nassau County Archaeological Association is the newly-formed counterpart of SCAA and is sponsored by the Garvies Point Museum of the Nassau County Museum System under the guidance of SCAA Vice-President and Garvies Point Supervisor Dan Kaplan. Dues: \$5 (including the Newsletter); next meeting: Sunday, March 4, 2:00PM at Garvies Point Museum; a film will be shown and Donna Ottusch will discuss survey techniques. The group is seeking volunteer assistance to unravel the mystery of the whereabouts of artifacts excavated by John Wilson and Birdsall Jackson of the Harbor Green section of Massapequa in 1934-35.
