Pastor's Pomrenke's Message April 2021

Good Day Beloved,

It's hard to believe that spring is here ... but it Is! Spring Has Sprung Upon Us! It makes me think of the other things in our lives that we are not ready for them to come but they do ... seemingly without any warning. We have taken a journey this Lenten Season unlike any we have in the years I have been at St. Paul's. Holy Week is upon us and I hope you are prepared for the emotional roller coaster that this week brings. This week, in my opinion, is the most important week of the church year. Christ's birth is truly important, but it is solely in the events of this week that give us hope.

So, what will be different for us this year following Our Savior's resurrection? Will it just mean that we can finally have the things we gave up for Lent? Or does it have a deeper meaning. I pray you said a deeper meaning.

Once again let us ponder the words from Luke 23: 44-47 ... "44 It was now about the sixth hour, and there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour, 45 while the sun's light failed. And the curtain of the temple was torn in two. 46 Then Jesus, calling out with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit!" And having said this he breathed his last. 47 Now when the centurion saw what had taken place, he praised God, saying, "Certainly this man was innocent!"

Building and Grounds Update

Status of Projects:

About two years ago, the congregation developed a list of projects for the church that needed to be undertaken in order to maintain the infrastructure. The congregation has done an outstanding job in providing their talents and financial support for maintaining and improving our Lord's house. The following identifies the status of current projects and projects that still need to be addressed. Once this work is complete, it will be much easier to maintain everything. Most beneficial would be the development of a long-term maintenance program, which would be most cost effective for the church, hopefully avoiding large projects such as we have had the past two years.

Current Projects:

- The new air conditioner that serves the kitchen, bathroom, nursery, and main entry hall is complete.
- All thermostats in the main building have been replaced with new digital Wi-Fi units, similar to the ones in the educational building. Temperatures can be monitored and changed from anywhere. These thermostats will help us to reduce our energy costs.
- New kneelers for the altar and cushions for the pews have been ordered and are expected to be installed by mid-April.
- New projection screens and cornices covered in fabric to match the chairs have been installed.
- Electrical wiring for the new projection screens, new projectors, and TV has been installed.
- Two fans in the right and left front corners of the sanctuary have been moved to the right and left back corners of the sanctuary. This will reduce obstruction to the projection screens, and provide more light in the back of the sanctuary, as has been requested.
- Lighting for the piano and organ has been improved.
- New exit lights with emergency lighting have been installed. All of the old emergency lighting was out of date and not working. Current new emergency lighting, which has been installed, meets the current life safety code requirements.
- Pastor worked with a contractor to complete the wiring and programming so that both projectors and screens, along with the TV are now fully operational.









Future projects:

- The playground needs to be re-mulched. This
 has not been done for several years. The
 estimated cost is about \$3,000.
- Replace the floor in the main hallway/narthex of the church. Estimated cost \$2,500.
- Replace the floor in the kitchen. Estimated cost \$1,500.
- Replace the exterior door and framing from the Pastor's office to the outside. Approximate cost \$1,000.
- A long-term project will be to repair and replace the deteriorating asphalt in the parking lot and entrance drives including repainting the striping for parking spaces. We have not received a quote for this work but it will cost approximately \$15,000 to \$20,000.

As part of our Sunday School's special group Easter activities, all children will come together outside (or in the church if weather is bad) for an opening of songs, an Easter lesson and parachute fun as we hear and celebrate the Easter story by releasing our "alleluias" that we silenced during the season of Lent in a large box during our opening. (Parachute activity TBD if weather is bad) After our opening, everyone will continue on to our Easter egg hunt and some simple refreshments. Put on your Easter best, bring your singing voice, a friend and an Easter basket and join us on April 4th as we celebrate our Risen lord!

Other Upcoming Dates to Circle on Your Calendar: Last day for Sunday School and our Sunday School Closing Program – Sunday May 23rd. Our Sunday school will be sharing some things they have learned throughout the past year at Sunday School as well as some special music with the congregation during the 10:30 AM worship service on the 23rd. We are also planning an outdoor fellowship picnic following the service. Games and other fun activities will be available for the kids spread out in several areas. If weather is not good, we will have a rain date on May 30th. More information will be coming next month.
