HARRIET

A MUST SEE FOR THE WHOLE FAMILY

"Harriet" is the first feature-length rendering of the life of African American hero Harriet Tubman, 1822-1913, (née Araminta "Minty" Ross), who served as a conductor on the Underground Railroad, a spy for the Union Army and a leader of one of the more daring raids during the Civil War, on the Combahee River, liberating over 700 enslaved persons. Most Americans know at least some of her story, which was, indeed, like a movie. She was, as the saying goes, larger than life, though relatively in reality small of stature.

There has been some criticism due to the lack of detail in the movie like that in the 2013 film, "12 Years a Slave," that reflects more historical knowledge of the reality of the era. That is only due in part because of the benefit of Solomon Northup's own words to lead audiences into both the protagonist's interiority and the horrors of enslavement. Northup's journey from resistance, adaptation and survival revealed to audiences the banality of systemic evil and shamed them if they dared look away, making "12 Years" simultaneously a beautiful and an ugly film. There was no such journals in the case of Harriett Tubman.

Much of Harriet is devoted to tracking her escape from the eastern shore of Maryland to the bustling streets of Philadelphia and back again, her adoption into the fellowship of the secret Underground Railroad, feted among her brethren for accomplishing the impossible, and guiding groups helping the enslaved flee to freedom. This is much needed black history for our children that will spark conversation as this country is trying to make black history a thing of the past.

The Pen or The Keyboard

Typing notes enables you to jot down more material, but you're more likely to remember those notes if you handwrite them, according to research from [Indiana University](#). "To learn something means you have processed it," says Dr. Towfigh. "And when you take handwritten notes you 'process' or learn more information. You begin the learning process as you listen to the lecture." Plus, since you look at the page on which you are writing, you naturally review the material and reinforce the information you've already processed, Dr. Towfigh says.

When it comes to children not only learn to read more quickly when they first learn to write by hand, but they also remain better able to generate ideas and retain information. In other words, it's not just what we write that matters — but how. "When we write, a unique neural circuit is automatically activated," said [Stanislas Dehaene](#), a psychologist at the Collège de France in Paris. "There is a core recognition of the gesture in the written word, a sort of recognition by mental simulation in your brain. "And it seems that this circuit is contributing in unique ways we didn't realize," he continued. "Learning is made easier."
