
We had a great turn out for our Voter's meeting last month. Thank you all for your support! We welcome the following people who were newly elected to start serving on our Church Council in January:

Surviving the Holidays By Jenny Moonen

Hello my dear friends at St. Paul's. As the end of the year is quickly approaching, I am taking some time to reflect on the past year. One of things I am most grateful for is the wonderful friends I have made through my job here at St. Paul's. You all are truly wonderful people with hearts full of love for our savior Jesus Christ!

This month we celebrate Jesus coming into the world as a tiny baby. This is a time of great celebration and joy! Although this month is a time of happiness in our church lives, the holidays are often very hard on our mental health. According to NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness), a study shows that 64% of people with mental illness report that the holidays make their conditions worse. It is reported that 1 in 4 Americans ages 18 and older have a diagnosable mental disorder (hopkinsmedicine.org), which I suspect may actually be higher in the past year. Below are ten tips from FleurishPsychotherapy.com to help you cope with the stress and anxiety that you may experience with the holidays.

- Breathe When you are stressed and anxious, Practice Gratitude Expressing gratitude take deep breaths to calm yourself and lower your heart rate and blood pressure.
- Eat Healthy and Exercise I know this is hard to do during the holidays with all that good food around, but you are worth it!
- Contribute Give a gift to the Angel tree or food shelf or your favorite charity. Volunteer. Visit someone who is lonely. The act of giving back helps generate positive emotions.
- Laugh Finding a way to laugh changes your body chemistry and can help change your perspective.
- **Prioritize -** You can't be everywhere and you can't do everything. Accept this and decide which activities events and are most important.
- **Treat Yourself** Do not skip out on your self care activities - read a few minutes, take a bubble bath, put on your favorite lotion, take • And I would add, most importantly, PRAY, care of you!

- won't make all your problems disappear, but it is a good reminder of what is going right in your world. Before you go to bed try writing down 5 things that you were thankful for during the day.
- Plan an Escape Plan if you know of a particular event that is going to stress you, figure out a way to remove yourself from the situation - bring a heavy coat to go for a walk or have a room that is off limits to the guests where you can escape for a few minutes of peace if you need it.
- Journal Often the holidays are stressful because there are so many things floating around in our heads. Take a few moments each day to write whatever comes to mind. It helps to clear your mind and therefore decreases your stress levels.
