## From Pastor's Desk...

July is full of events that touch our lives: we celebrate our nation's birthday on the 4th with red, white, blue, fireworks, parades, festivities- and, hopefully, great gratitude to our Lord that we are blessed to live in this land and a call to remember and work to defend and uphold our freedoms. July continues with fairs, rodeos, cattle shows; sweet corn, and ever growing crops. Summer is a special time to give thanks for where we live as we enjoy these special activities which are part of the fabric of our lives in the land of the free.

Freedom is one of those ironic things of life. It is something we all desire and strive to have, but something that comes with caution and boundaries. Freedom with boundaries? Doesn't sound much like freedom. Freedom, we might think, is to do whatever we wish to do, right? No. We all know that. Try driving 100 mph down Central Ave. and see what happens; hint: I'll be visiting you in the Hawarden Jail or the hospital, and worse yet you may take others with you. Or freedom can be I can say what I want, act how I want, live how I want. Many do. But at what cost? There is a cost to all our words, actions, and lives- a cost for benefit or a cost for hurt and pain. In our desire for freedom we must live within its boundaries.

Lutherans are well known a church of the Gospel as freedom- Christ has died for you, you are free! You were in prison to sin and death, but Christ came and paid your bail and suffered your punishment in your place. Now you're free. Throughout history and even today Christians have used their freedom in God-pleasing ways to serve their neighbors. All of us are active in some sort of good works in our callings- where God has placed us in our families, at our work/labor, in our communities, and in the congregation. But our old nature likes to control and abuse our freedom for our own self-service. God's law in the 10 Commandments and written on our hearts keep us in the boundaries.

ESV 1 Peter 2:16 Live as people who are free, not using your freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God. Freedom in Christ means that we are indeed free from the punishment and judgment of the law- we are alive who once were dead. Now that we live in Christ as His free people, we live as servants of God- free to serve our neighbor, love them, and do the tasks God gives us to do. This is freedom with boundaries: God is God; He decides right and wrong and we live according to His Word; Christ alone is our Savior; there is no other gods; we live freely within the boundaries of the 10 Commandments and serve our neighbor- it's just what we do. And this is freedom.

As we think of what this might look like, I can't help but reflect on how God is our Father and we live as children. Our Father brought us into the family through the blood of His perfect Son Jesus- we belong; part of the family. In the family there are rules- do this and don't do that. There's lots of freedom in doing what's right and not doing what's wrong. "You can do anything in the yard, but don't go past the fence. You can play with anyone but share, speak nicely, say please and thank you." Get the idea? Freedom with boundaries in our life as citizens and as Christians.

## Given a New Life in Order to Serve


Jesus taught a powerful lesson about servanthood, recorded in the 13<sup>th</sup> Chapter of John's Gospel. He taught that lesson on the night of the final meal He would eat with His disciples. We're told all twelve were gathered in an upper room with Jesus in their midst. Off to the side, nearly forgotten, was a basin. In the basin was water. No one was standing behind the basin. No one had it in his grasp. It stood unattended, unnoticed. You see, that basin was meant for the washing of feet. In ancient times, the mode of transportation was a little messier on the road than it is today. The person who was traveling would not only come into your home with a little dust and dirt, but his feet would be dung-stained as well. Washing feet was the job of the least servant. To put it in our terms, the servant with the lowest amount of seniority got the basin as the guests came into the home. He would kneel down and wash their feet.

On that night, when the twelve were gathered with Jesus in their midst, the basin was unattended. There were no men pushing and shoving to see who could be first in line. "No, no, my turn, you got to do it last time. I get to be first. Get behind me. I get to serve. Who do you think you are, pushing in front of me? It's my turn." The basin stood alone—until Jesus got up and took the basin and knelt down and began washing the feet of each disciple. It was a very awkward moment. You see, they recognized the One with the basin. They knew where He came from. He was the Son of God, from the right hand of the Father. Finally Peter, speaking up as if to voice the concern, the awkwardness, and the embarrassment of the whole group, said, "Lord, You can't do this. Of all the people in the room, You shouldn't be doing this!"

The Lord was teaching them about a newer, grander, more blessed way of life. He was getting them ready for what was going to happen less than 24 hours later. As He hung on that cross, and they watched Him bleed and groan and gasp, that same thought must have washed over them that should come to us as you and I picture that scene. It's supposed to be the same feeling the disciples had when Jesus took the basin. "Lord, this isn't right. You're not supposed to be doing this. I'm the one who should be there. I'm the one who should be suffering, not You." But the Lord makes it clear that, through that cross, He gives more than an example; He gives us new life. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, we receive a new life as we look to Him and recognize the blessings of His service, of His ransom, of His deliverance. We come to rejoice and hold onto and remember that great beginning. That beginning, our salvation through Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, is what enables us to live lives in service for Jesus.
