As Sheriff Rotter told the Bulletin, "In 32 years (of law enforcement) I have dealt with a few vandalism cases in cemeteries but never an all out theft of a headstone."

Train Buffs Look Ahead!

The Union Pacific railline will be transporting donated heritage fleet engines and side cars through lowa and will stop overnight at the South Amana maintenance depot arriving about 7:30 p.m. on Friday, November 18 and departing from the South Amana depot about 8 a.m. traveling east through Homestead enroute to Silvis, III.

While there will be no public access to the heritage train cars in South Amana as that depot is closed to the public, but you may stand alongside the track, at least 25 feet away, as the train passes from Grinnell (where it will leave about 5 p.m. Friday) to South Amana and the next morning as it heads through Homestead to points east.

As the UP reported, the Union Pacific will be delivering a small portion of its heritage fleet that was donated to the non-profit Railroading Heritage of Midwest America (RRHMA) in November. To learn more go to the UP.com website and look for the Heritage / UP Steam tab.



The donated engines include Challenger No. 3985, TTT-6, the No. 5511 and a Centennial No. 6936 plus several passenger rail cars. All will leave Union Pacific's steam shop in Cheyenne, Wyoming, on November 11, and will make periodic maintenance stops along the way through Wyoming, Colorado, Nebraska and Iowa. The donated locomotives will not be under power during this trip and will be pulled by diesel locomotives.

Union Pacific plays a leading role in preserving railroad history, and maintains the finest heritage fleet in the world, which includes the world's largest steam locomotive, the Big Boy No. 4014, and the fastest steam locomotive, the Living Legend No. 844.

Again this year the Tannenbaum Forest will benefit the Stead Family Childrens Hospital, University of Iowa, Iowa City. All of these small things help kids and their parents relax and regroup as they cope with the stresses of a hospital stay and all that entails. These nurses were so happy with the support they had seen and felt at the Forest while they put up their tree, they were enthusiastic believers in Tannenbaum magic!
