SOCIAL OUTREACH Rolleville Shelter Renovation

Starve Poverty International, key partners in the Exuma Foundation's social outreach program, were on the island in late January to tackle a major renovation of the Rolleville Emergency Shelter. With the re-establishment of the Rolleville Emergency Shelter Committee and a new direction for management, the timely work will ensure that new temporary residents have a safe, clean, and secure living space. Installing three new roofs on the units was a major aspect of the work, but Starve Poverty volunteers also repaired porches and interior spaces and applied fresh paint in just a week.

The renovation of the Rolleville Emergency Shelter is a great example of how the Exuma Foundation facilitates partnerships that benefit the community. A big thanks to Starve Poverty!

The Exuma Sailing Club (ESC) is one of the most exciting things happening in Exuma! Under Dallas Knowles' leadership, the club now has 25 kids involved and a growing fleet of Sunfish and Optimists, in addition to the E and C Class Bahamian sloops. The ESC recently acquired a new C Class boat, "Bye Gully", which makes even more



room for the senior sailors in the club that have graduated from high school but want to remain involved. The ESC spent October and November practicing and preparing the boats for the 2019 sailing season. The club's C-Class boat "Termite" took 2nd overall in the Bul Reg Regatta.

EDUCATION

The Exuma Learning with Technology Project early results and extension to the high school

This school year has seen the most progress so far with the <u>Exuma</u> <u>Learning with Technology Project (ELTP)</u> which is in no small measure due to the Ministry of Education's agreement to appoint Mrs. Crystal Ferguson as an itinerant teacher. Some of the major highlights and positive outcomes this school year are:

- Significant progress in key numeracy skills among students who initially tested below grade level within only a few months based on data collected in October and December.
- Improved teacher participation, enthusiasm and technological competence. Ongoing teacher training focuses on developing Personalised Learning based around mastery concepts.
- The students' enthusiasm for this program is a joy to see. Not only do they love working with the Chromebooks and the Khan Academy, they are also motivated by their progress.

This year we would like to further develop the program in order to support those students in Grades 5 and 6 who are most at risk because of significant deficits in numeracy. History has shown that these students will leave Primary School and move into the High School not equipped to graduate. Currently LN Coakley has 35 students who are "at risk" with numeracy and literacy benchmarked at below Grade 4 levels. The Foundation is currently working with Sandals, LN Coakley Administrators and teachers to address this issue. The ELTP has the potential to revolutionise the educational landscape. Exuma beekeepers travel to Grand Bahama for the Caribbean Bee College and the University of Georgia travels to Exuma to start a research project

The Exuma Beekeeping Initiative continues to evolve into a self-sustaining program that sets a great example for new beekeepers here in Exuma and beyond. Our hives produced over 150 gallons of honey in 2018. The honey supports the program through sales to our campus visitors, and now by reliably supplying Grand Isle Resort and Smitty's Convenience Store. We appreciate everyone who has participated by taking home a jar of honey!

Besides providing beekeepers with low cost equipment, bees, and mentorship, we have twice supported travel experiences to make sure our beekeeping community is kept up to date and exposed to the highest professional standards. In November, we supported a group of six to travel to Grand Bahama for the Caribbean Bee College. Sponsored by the Inter-American Institute for the Cooperation on Agriculture, the Office of The Prime Minister, and the University of Florida, this was a wonderful opportunity for Exuma beekeepers to receive training right here in The Bahamas.

Bee Lab, a program partner that has gone above and beyond to <u>help us establish our beekeeping program</u>. In collaboration with Emory University, UGA is undertaking a study on varroa mite viruses, a highly destructive and difficult to manage force in the beekeeping world today. The study is using Exuma's thriving honey bee population as a control for this study as we are a lot closer distance from Athens, GA than Australia, the other known varroa mite-free location in the world. It was a great learning experience for us to participate in this research and we look forward to the results!
