Once again, we are about to enter the season of Lent, that time each year where we take time to prepare for the coming of Easter, the celebration of the Resurrection, one of the highlights of each church year. I don't know about the rest of you, but it always seems like Lent sneaks up on me every year. After all, it still feels like we just finished the Advent Season, celebrated Christmas, then welcomed in a new year. It seems strange to me that it's already time for Lent. Yet, here we are, and Lent will begin on Wednesday, March 2, the day of Ash Wednesday.

One of the interesting oddities of Lent, at least to me, comes with figuring out when it begins each year. Lent, like Advent, runs for forty days. But, it begins on a Wednesday each year. Why is this? Well, when we calculate the beginning date for Lent, we actually exclude Sundays from the forty-day count. In calendar terms, then, Lent runs for 46 days, yet the church calendar only counts forty days. Sundays are to be seen almost as "little Easters", a reminder of the coming celebration of the Resurrection.

As I've written about in past newsletters around the beginning of Lent, one of the things that many Christians choose to do for the season of Lent is to take up a new spiritual discipline, whether that may be a fast from some food or activity, or committing to reading a certain amount of scripture, or maybe taking on a new Lenten devotional practice. While we, in the Church of the Brethren, do not require one to fast, or to engage in a new spiritual discipline during this season, choosing to do so can be a very helpful practice. Like we do each year, we have purchased Lenten devotionals from Brethren Press as one option for you to use as a spiritual discipline in the run-up to Easter. This year's devotional was written by Walt Wiltschek, the District Executive of the Illinois/Wisconsin district, based on the theme "We wait for light." The devotionals are available in the sanctuary, or you can contact myself or Mikayla to have one mailed or delivered to you.

However you choose to mark the season of Lent, I want to invite you to take time to reflect on your faith, to study and pray, and to prepare for the coming celebration of Easter. Lent reminds us of the story behind Easter, one that makes all of the great joy of that day possible.

Kay's return to worship:



Things to remember:

Please remind your campers that after registration, they will need to click the "Make Payment" button on the financial tab. The prompt to enter a transfer code will pop up immediately.

Unless your church transfer code is for 100% of camp fees, they will need to pay their deposit to be officially registered (not just enrolled) for camp.

We encourage you to have your campers and their families register and pay online. By using the transfer code, they will know exactly the amount they owe, greatly reducing errors.

We ask that you do not gather camper family payments and submit them on families behalf.

For the church portion, we will email you an invoice to submit to the church for payment. These invoices will begin April 1, 2022 and run monthly through the duration of summer as needed.

If you notice any changes that need to be made to your invoice, please let us know as soon as possible.

National Youth Conference

The registration fee, which includes food, lodging, and programming, will be \$550. Youth who have completed ninth grade through one year of college at the time of NYC (or are age equivalent) and their adult advisors will gather at Colorado State University in Fort Collins, Colo. Online registration will open in early 2022 on www.brethren.org.

We have just received a text from him thanking GG for being able to spend a warm Christmas with his boys, get cleaned up and presentable, and able to start making contacts for construction work in this area. "Thank you so much. You guys really helped me out in a time of need and I will not forget this. I am very thankful and it is not taken for granted." He is now collecting references to give us so that we can pass these along to those needing construction and millwright work. He already has some work lined up.

Kay Gaier is an ordained minister in the Church of the Brethren and a graduate of Bethany Seminary with a Master of Divinity degree. She also holds a Master's degree in Counseling and Family Studies from Michigan State University. Kay served for 14 years as pastor of the Wabash Church of the Brethren. In her time as pastor, she served as a volunteer in several District leadership roles including District Moderator, the Shalom Team, and participation on

Teaching Committees for several Ministers in Training as part of their Ministry Formation experience. As a result of her participation in a nationwide forum on "Small Churches", Kay initiated the development, implementation, and a session presentation for a regional conference on Small Church Ministry.

Kay's role within the Co-Interim DE Minister position will draw from her experience and interest in the gifts and challenges for pastors and congregations in their life together over time. Her focus will be supporting pastors and congregations as they experience the issues that come through a congregation's life cycle. Important in that work will be connecting with the district

Praise God for the return of four girls abducted from Chibok area of Nigeria

Praise God for the return of four girls who were abducted from Kautikari, in the area of Chibok in northeast Nigeria, on Jan. 14, 2022. Kautikari village is located east and about 20 kilometers drive from Chibok town, predominantly occupied by Christians.

The girls were abducted by ISWAP, according to Ayuba Maina, the District Church Council secretary for that district of Ekklesiyar Yan'uwa a Nigeria (EYN, the Church of the Brethren in Nigeria). He said the girls are still with the Nigerian military in Chibok, where their parents met them.

The girls are Lami Yarima, age 9; Na'omi Titus, age 18; Hauwa Gorobutu, age 17; and Rahab Thumur, age 20.

Chibok, which is about 150 kilometers from Maiduguri, the Borno State capital, has continued to suffer a series of attacks from both Boko Haram and ISWAP. Recently, members of the Chibok community have called for an end to the attacks in the area, seeking the return of the schoolgirls believed to still be in Boko Haram captivity. Kibaku Area Development Association (KADA), an association of people from Chibok, spoke during a press conference in Abuja, Nigeria's capital city, on Saturday. The group lamented that since the outbreak of insurgency over a decade ago, the area had been attacked more than 72 times, with more than 407 persons killed.

"On behalf of the entire Chibok community, we are using this medium to once again call on President Muhammadu Buhari to rescue Chibok community, an ethnic nationality, from total annihilation by the Boko Haram terrorists. This is because since the mass abduction of 276 of our daughters on April 14, 2014, where about 57 escaped on their own, we still have 110 of them still unaccounted for," said KADA national president Dauda Iliya.

"We call on all well-meaning Nigerians and Mr. President in particular, to rise up to the occasion and urgently save our people from total annihilation and starvation."

CHANNELS reported that the group also advised the federal government to seek support and synergize with the armed forces in tackling insecurity in the region. While asking the government to set up a camp for the Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in the community, the association is still hoping for the safe return of the remaining 110 schoolgirls abducted more than seven years ago.
