

• Old Plastic •

From all these preservationist articles to my very own newsletter blurbs, you've heard plastic is bad with a capital B! However, let's face reality for two minutes. Plastic is

simply real and simply everywhere! And yes, there are alternative solutions for almost everything, yet the conundrum is; isn't it wasteful to trash your plastics now for a zero-waste lifestyle?

The answer isn't hypocritical but logical. Repurpose what you can, or give away items to others or dispose items in the appropriate manner. For example, your child drinks a gallon jug of orange juice and in a weeks time you are left with an empty, plastic container.

Zero waste lifestyle requires a switch to a cardboard juice box, thus no more plastic. Yay, although you still have that plastic jug. Before recycling it,

think of uses for it such as repurposing it as a watering can by poking holes in the cap or cut it up with the handle to creating a back up dust pan.

Unpopular opinion: zero Waste is cool. This means someone not as pro-active in recycling, or someone with children, or an upcyclist would benefit from your plastic debris. As the saying goes, 'one man's trash is another man's treasure' could mean finding a person that would be willing to accept your Tupperware or clothes that uninterests you. And unlike glassware, plastic flatware and dishes can be helpful to a parent in need.

The issue with that is 1. we don't have a fully equipped and functioning recycle center and 2. how do we pay for sorting and shipping. So until our island has a recycle solution, our top option is repurpose our plastics the best way possible. Plastic will always be around, but if everyone does their part to reduce, reuse, and repurpose, we will go along way to creating a better island.

Southeast Fall Time Harvesting:

Sitka Blacktail Deer Lowbush Cranberry Highbush Cranberry Hudson Bay Tea Sala Berry

Highbush Cranberry Apple Butter

2 quarts highbush cranberries

1 cup water

4 cups unsweetened applesauce

6 cups sugar

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon cloves

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 lemon, grated rind and juice



Lingonberries

Prepare jar lids. Boil berries and water together until berries pop and are soft. Put through a sieve or food mill to remove seeds. Reheat and add the applesauce, sugar, cinnamon, cloves and salt. Simmer until thick. Remove from heat and add lemon juice and grated rind. Spoon apple butter into jars, leaving 1/4 inch headspace. Wipe jar rims and cover with prepared two-piece lids. Process for 15 minutes in a boiling water bath.

Alaska History

Indian Doctors "Haida Shamans"

Every village had a "shaman" or Indian doctor for their present or future problems. Shamans were revered, respected and feared. They are told to be able to heal sickness out of a person, act as a median for disputes, and protectors from potential harm against their villages. When they practiced witchcraft, they did it outside of the village, where most shamans had set up living quarters as well. Their powers are believed to have come from the spirit world. In the 1880s, when missionaries came about, shamans diminished and it was only practiced in secret.

Tlingit Potlatches

The last greatest Potlatch recorded according to Robert Cogo was in June 1899. It was given for David Roberts to commemorate his clan, to dedicate a new community house, and honor his deceased uncle. Preparations for the event by the Tlingit chief started several years before and Haidas were witnesses to the potlatch, travelled to Tuxekan by canoes. During the five day long ceremony, there was lots of performing, big feasts, and gifts given away. On the last day, there was a big send off for those travelling back home with songs of farewell.
