





Wangaard served as Bishop's Associate for Urban and Multicultural Ministry in the Minneapolis Area Synod of the ELCA. In 2012, David moved to Baltimore to serve as interim Senior Pastor at First Lutheran Church in Ellicott City. In 2014, David began his call at Lutheran World Relief. Rev. Wangaard is married to the Rev. Susan Tjornehoj who serves as Senior Pastor of Christ Lutheran in the Inner Harbor of Baltimore. They have one daughter, Ingrid who is a third grade school teacher in St. Paul, Minnesota.
