#### AREA II OHIO ENVIROTHON



The Envirothon is an outdoor academic competition in which teams of high school students test their knowledge of soils, wildlife, aquatic ecology, forestry, and current environmental issues. Each team consists of five students, all from the same high school. They work cooperatively with each other to answer questions at five test stations. The tests are graded and the top four teams are recognized. The 2020 focus is "Agriculture and the Environment: Knowledge & Technology to Feed the World". Mahoning & Columbiana SWCDs are hosting this year's Area II Envirothon on Thursday, April 30th at the Salem campus of Kent State University. All Envirothon participants will receive t-shirts, and the top four teams will move on to the state competition. #### JOEL MCROBERTS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP



The Joel McRoberts Memorial Scholarship was created in 1998 in memory of Joel, who was a District Technician with the Lorain Soil & Water Conservation District for 20 years. Joel died in 1997 of leukemia. The scholarship was created at the request of his widow Connie McRoberts, of Litchfield.

Joel McRoberts was a big supporter of agriculture and higher education. Although he never attended college, he understood the value of education and always encouraged students to further their education and better themselves. Joel was devoted to farming and the farmers in Lorain County. He had a deep appreciation of our natural resources and their protection. This memorial scholarship is administered in his honor.

The scholarship is available to any student in Lorain County who will be majoring in an agriculture or natural resources management related field at any two or four year college. They must have a minimum GPA of 2.5.

With the generosity of the individuals in Lorain County, the scholarship has grown with time, expanding to include two awards annually: one for an incoming college freshman and one for any current college student with at least one year completed. #### SEEDLING SALE DESCRIPTIONS

#### **Evergreens**

**Norway Spruce:** Excellent tree for windbreak and wildlife cover. Although not immune to deer damage, deer generally leave this evergreen alone. This fast-growing spruce grows best on well-drained soils and will tolerate a lot of shade. It will retain its dense drooping branches as the tree matures. Grows to 50 ft.

**Colorado Blue Spruce:** Stiff, silvery-blue to green needles 1 inch long. Handsome ornamental specimen in single planting or dense, colorful screen or windbreak, space 6 ft apart. Ordinary soil, average moisture. Grows to 100 ft

White Pine: A tall, stately tree with an attractive conical shape and branches nearly to the ground in open stands. Adapts to a variety of sites, but prefers moderately moist, sandy loam soils. Grows to 80-100 ft.

#### **Hardwood Species**

American Common
Persimmon: Slender
with an oval-rounded
crown, often very symmetrical. White, fra-



grant flowers are very sweet and a favorite of honeybees. Grows 25 to 40' in height and 20 to 35' in width. More than one tree is needed for pollination to produce fruit.

Paw Paw: Beautiful native tree does well in moist to well drained soils, in shade to full sun. Purple flow-



ers in the spring, green waxy leaves in summer, golden fall color and edible fruit.

#### Black Gum (Tupelo):

Pyramidal tree with medium vigorous growth. Reaches 20-30' high with a spread of 30-50'. Brilliant red fall foliage. This tree can grow on dry upland sites or just as well in



moist or wet sites where other species will not grow .

**American Sycamore:** A massive shade tree growing 75-100' with equal or greater spread. Likes moist soil and does well along streams.

**Mixed Hickory:** This mix is dominated by shagbark, but also includes bitternut, pignut, black, and shellbark hickories. Good selection for wildlife and reforestation projects where a variety of nut sizes and tree forms is desired.

**Chinquapin Oak:** This tree is in the white oak group, has silver-gray bark, and long, thin leaves. The acorns are nearly black, about  $\frac{3}{4}$  to 1 inch long and are a favorite food source for turkey and deer.

#### **Shrubs**

American Hazelnut: A multi-stemmed small tree. Medium-fast growth rate. 10-15' in height with a spread of 10-12'. Edible nuts mature September-October.

Winterberry Holly: Known as one of the best deciduous plants for fall and winter color. Female plants produce bright red berries in early fall that




persist until midwinter. Grows 6-12' high with a 6-12' spread. Tolerates wet, swampy conditions. Likes acidic soil.

**Redbud:** Large shrub/small tree reaching 20-30' in height with a spread of 25-30'. Flowers are reddish purple in bud, opening to a rosy pink with purplish tinge in early spring.

Wild Plum: One of the first trees to bloom in the spring. Produces a bright red or yellow edible fruit. Provides excellent food and cover for wildlife. Height at maturity is 25 ft.



Smooth Sumac: Thicketforming shrub or small tree. Provides excellent food and cover for wildlife. Dark green summer foliage, followed by scarlet fall color and bright

## POND MANAGEMENT STARTS EARLY IN THE SPRING

Unwanted growth of aquatic vegetation is a common problem pond owners experience each year. Adding pond dye and muck reducers in early spring can limit the amount of maintenance required over time and reduce the risk of a fish kill. When incorporated early, the dye can limit the growth of aquatic vegetation and the muck reducer can reduce fertility rates leading to a healthier, happier pond. This is also a good time of year to manually remove organic debris, install nesting boxes, and to incorporate vegetative buffers around the pond's edge to filter excess nutrients. We are pleased to offer a new selection of native wildflowers at this years' 2020 seedling sale. Native wildflowers not only offer aesthetic beauty, they add many ecological benefits to our landscape. Native wildflowers require less maintenance than traditional landscaping plants which decreases the amount of water and fertilizer used, filter pollutants from stormwater, improve soil health, attract pollinators and other wildlife. Many of these plants would make excellent additions to new or established rain gardens!

We are now taking orders for fingerling-size fish for stocking your ponds!

Largemouth Bass, Bluegill, Hybrid Bluegill, Channel Catfish, Yellow Perch, Redear Sunfish (Shellcrackers), Fathead Minnows, Japanese Koi, and Triploid White Amur are all available.

You will need to bring a container filled with <u>your</u> pond water to pick up your order. Approximately 5 gallons of water for each 100 fingerling size fish

is needed. We suggest using a trash can with a new plastic liner—then add the pond water so the top of the bag can be tied shut for transportation. Remember, the Amur are 10"-12" long and need a suitable container.

Triploid White Amur are stocked to control leafy pond vegetation. Algae is not a preferred food. Since the Amur were first stocked in Ohio in the fall of 1987, you may need to replace your Amur. The life expectancy is in the 10 to 12 year range. Recommended stocking rates for the Amur are 2 to 5, per surface acre of water, based on how much weed cover is in the pond at its worst point over the summer.

Stocking recommendation for Largemouth Bass is 100 and for Bluegill 500 per surface acre of pond area. Yellow Perch and Redear Sunfish (Shellcrackers) can be stocked at 100 per surface acre of pond as well.

Channel Catfish can be stocked in ponds that are half an acre or larger. Catfish will not reproduce in a pond, however, they provide excellent fishing. The stocking rate is 50 per surface acre of pond area. A 4"-6" long Catfish stocked this spring will double in size by next spring.

Japanese Koi will eat aquatic vegetation such as duckweed and water meal, while adding a little color to your pond. The recommended stocking rate is no more than 5 Koi per acre.

Nature's Pond Conditioner is a oncea-year treatment that adds a natural green color, while lowering fertility levels in your pond.

We have also included in the fish sale, the opportunity to purchase Steve Fender's book, titled "Pond Management" 2018 Edition for purchase at \$20.00 each.
