Pastor's Message

In November 1620, the Mayflower anchored in Plymouth harbor. Over the course of the winter, ravished by disease, hunger and cold, half of the colony perished. As the Pilgrims buried their loved ones, one after another, a young Indian brave named Squanto, silently watched, and was filled with love and compassion for the sad and grief-stricken settlers. The next spring, with Squanto's help, the Pilgrims prospered. He taught them how to survive in the new land. He taught them how to plant corn and squash, what berries to eat, how to fish and hunt. By harvest-time, the Pilgrims had much to be thankful for. And so do we. The true test of thankfulness is whether we can give thanks from the heart for what we do have despite the struggles of life.

Consider Douglas, a little first grader. Douglas was a different kind of boy: quiet and shy, frail and afraid. He didn't have many friends but he liked school and most of all he liked his teacher. When Thanksgiving Day drew near, the teacher asked her class to draw a picture of something for which they were thankful. Most of the class drew turkeys. But not Douglas. Douglas drew a hand. Just an empty hand. His odd, abstract image captured the imagination of his peers. Whose hand could it be? One child guessed it was the hand of a farmer, because farmers raise turkeys. Another suggested a police officer, because they protect and care for our freedoms. Still others guessed it was the hand of God, for God feeds us. And so the discussion went. No one, however, asked Douglas what it meant. As the other children went on to other assignments, the teacher paused at Douglas' desk, bent down, and asked him whose hand it was. The little boy looked away, shyly, and softly murmured, "It's yours, teacher." Suddenly she recalled the many times she had taken his little hand to give him courage to walk here or there. How often she had said, "Take my hand, Douglas, we'll go outside together." Or "Take my hand, Douglas, it will be all right." Of all the effort she had put into planning her lessons so carefully she had never realized how important and meaningful the small act of simply offering her hand had been. Has someone offered you their hand? Have you offered your hand to someone in need?

On Sunday we will celebrate the first Sunday of Advent; the season where we look forward to celebrating the Birth of the Christ Child. The greatest gift of all time. The Bible says, because God so loved the world He gave His only Son. I say a greater helping hand has never been given. How do we thank Him? How do we share that gift? During this Holiday Season, this Season of Giving, this Season of Love, this Season of Thankfulness – what gift will you give? How will you show your love. To whom will you extend that helping hand? As you ponder that thought, may I suggest that you consider remembering the needs of this church? A place for you, your family, your neighbors to come together, to be a community, a source of strength and hope, a place to thank and worship God who is the maker and founder of all gifts. This place, this house of God, could use a helping hand; without help this holy house cannot survive and will not be here to help anyone face the struggles that await us tomorrow. The future is determined by what we choose to do today.

Chimney Rock Congregational Council Minutes - November 18, 2024

Call to Order—President Randy Olson called the November 18, 2024 meeting to order at 6:30pm. Others present were Monica Dejno, Jerry Erickson, Richard Gunderson, Forrest Nutter, Randy Olson, Pastor David Sands, Dan Solfest, and Barb Sylla. Barb McGee and Bev Paulsen were absent.

Devotions—Pastor Sands read from John 18 and led in discussion. Monica led in prayer.

Secretary's Report was read by Barb. Don and Richard motioned to accept, and motion carried.

Treasurer's Report—Dan distributed the report ending October 31, 2024. Richard and Barb motioned to accept, and motion carried.

Old Business:

- 1) No bid yet for painting/repairing small bell tower windows.
- 2) Community Resources—Monica and Barb have checked the ADRC website and will meet to decide what information and links to post on our website. Monica also mentioned that dialing 211 offers free and confidential local assistance for anyone in need.
- 3) Thanksgiving Eve Community Service is at Immanuel Lutheran in Strum on Wednesday, November 27, at 7pm. Pastor Sands will have a part in the service.
- 4) Barb has not contacted local newspapers yet to inquire why our worship schedule is not being included, but it was possibly deleted during the beginning of Covid when in-person services were not held.

New Business:

- 1) The Ministry Team Contract will renew in January. Forrest reported that the cost of living allowance has increased 2.53%, which would mean an increase of \$45/month for Pastor Sands and \$5/month for Monica. Monica wishes to decline an increase. Forrest has contacted the synod and will also report any feedback he receives from them at the December or January council meeting, at which time the contract will be finalized before being voted on at the Annual Meeting.
- 2) The consensus was to give Katie Solfest Buggert \$500 in appreciation for recorded and in-person music she has been providing this year.
- 3) McAdam Kensmoe and Brooklynn Olson have reserved the church for their wedding on October 11, 2025. The council approved her cousin, April (Olson) Hillestad, to officiate. Pastor Sands will do the pre-marriage sessions with the couple.
- 4) Stoves—We thank Mavis Erickson, who has ordered two new kitchen stoves which will be delivered on November 19.
- 5) Water samples passed inspection.
- 6) Lent—It was the consensus of the council not to be a part of the "round robin" in 2025. Also, due to low attendance at midweek services, we discussed having only Ash Wednesday and Good Friday services during Lent.
- 7) Immanuel and Elk Creek youth are having a Living Nativity at Elk Creek Church on Sunday, December 8, at 4:30pm and 6pm. They will be collecting non-perishable food items, paper products, and monetary donations.
- 8) Wreaths Across America program/ceremony will be held at Eleva American Legion Hall at 9am on Saturday, December 14. Placement of wreaths will begin at Eleva cemetery, then on to Chimney Rock Cemetery at approximately 10:30am or 10:45am, then to East Bennett Valley, and finally to Norden.

The next council meeting is scheduled for Monday, December 16, at 6:30pm.

Adjournment—Don and Jerry motioned to adjourn. The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer at 7:43pm.
