With the warm weather approaching, we have the need to send home some reminders about dress code:


- No bare feet. If your child has gym, please have them wear sneakers, not flip flops or sandals.

#### First Grade

We can't believe the end of the year is quickly approaching! We are also excited about our upcoming field trip to the Baltimore Zoo on Tuesday May 23rd!

For social studies and science, we have been working with our final theme: **] am Curious about how people overcome challenges.** 

In Unit 1: Bubbleology – The students discovered how to make bubbles, what Causes bubbles to pop,



and the shape of all bubbles. The students loved being able to blow bubbles in and outside of the Classroom.

In Unit 2: Between a Rock and a Hard Space – The students

will explore the difference between wants and needs, and examine how to get goods and services from their environment.

In (Jnit 3 – Inventors Take Action – The students will learn that people invent things to overcome Challenges. At the end of the unit our first graders will have an opportunity to design an original invention.

In math, the students have been adding twodigit numbers with a one-digit number. They have discovered that sometimes when joining the ones together a new ten is made. In May, the students will also explore measuring with non-standard units so they can answer the questions, "How many?" and "How many more?" We will end the year with solving word problems using our basic facts that we have been practicing all year!

#### Second Grade

We've come a long way baby! The progress the students have made this year is impressive! We are now in the middle of Theme 4, Unit 1: "We are Researchers."

Students have been busy conducting research and experimenting to discover ways to be healthy. They are learning how to analyze data and communicate as researchers. In our final unit of study "We Are Change Makers," students will explore empathy, leadership, and teamwork to problem solve and learn how to make a positive difference in the world.

In math, students have been representing and interpreting data using line plots, pictographs, and bar graphs. Soon we will be moving into our M<sup>2</sup> Unit on Area. Students will be building arrays and participating in several hands on learning activities. There's still a lot to look forward to!

As the year comes to a close, please continue to support your child's learning. At this point of the year, teacher expectations for student independence and responsibility are high. Keep reading and practicing math facts. Remind your child of behavioral expectations. We have noticed an increase of toys and non-school related items coming to school that are becoming a distraction in the classroom. If your child doesn't have permission to bring the item to school (i.e. earned stuffed animal visit or show and share), please have them keep it at home. We prefer toys not to be in the students' lockers. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.

We have truly enjoyed the honor of being a part of your child's academic, emotional, and social growth! Thank you for your support in making this a successful year!

#### The Second Grade Team

#### Third Grade

WOW! We can't believe we are writing our last newsletter entry for the school year already! In so many ways it seems like the time has flown by! The students have made a lot of growth and progress this year, that's for sure! Many say that third grade is the toughest. So, congratulations! We're almost done!

We will continue to work hard through May and into June, so don't let the weather or summer's approaching fool you. There is still a lot of material to cover. Continue to try to keep a routine/schedule going! In reading, we are finishing the theme of Creativity. In this theme we have been using literary and informational text to engage students in exploration.

In math, we will continue to multiply and divide larger numbers, so get out those flash



cards and start drilling the basic facts again. It will make a big difference as your child prepares to use these skills for life. Many

students need extra practice in this area. We've also been reviewing solving multiple step word problems and creating different graphs to represent data.

All subject areas will be working together to complete an Environmental Action Project. Students will be researching different environmental issues. Students will be collecting data, analyzing data and developing a solution.

Our science classes will be generating and comparing possible solutions to an environmental problem. The focus is to meet the criteria and constraints of the problem.

In closing, thank you for the time and dedication you have given to your child and the school this year. We know that you are your child's first and best teachers, and we have been lucky to have had an opportunity to work with all of you.

The Third Grade Team

#### **Grade Four**

We continue to work on fiction and non-fiction text and on comprehension skills: problem and solution, cause and effect, fact and opinion, drawing conclusions, main idea and details, summarizing, and author's perspective. We are getting ready to conduct the last set of F& P testing (identify reading levels and students ability to answer comprehension effectively). Grammar instruction will focus on adverbs, negatives and prepositions. All students will continue to participate in advanced learning strategies such as Socratic seminar, higher level questioning and continue to be exposed to the Jacob's Ladder program,

In math we are working on Geometry- angles, shapes and symmetry (4G.1; G.2 and G.3), Measurement- measuring angles with a protractor (4MD.5), Multi-step word problems (4.NBT.4; 4.NBT.5 and 4.NBT.6). It is important for student to continue to practice their basic facts (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division) to improve their fluency and help to complete math problems.

In science, we will explore the topics of weathering and erosion and space. Students will discuss weather predictions and changes to the Earth. The "Big Ideas" we will investigate is how the Earth's surface changes over time and how the earth's position effects the appearance of celestial bodies.

Social Studies

Students will continue their study of Maryland. We are wrapping up our discussion of the Civil War. We will start discussing Economics. 4<sup>th</sup> grade will take a social studies benchmark the week of May 22.

The Fourth Grade Team

#### **Grade Five**

Writing - To drink or not to drink...chocolate milk...that is. That is the question fifth graders will continue to answer and support this month. The students will focus on opinion/argumentative writing. They will need to develop their thesis and support that thesis with facts, evidence, and quotes. One of the most challenging concepts the students will encounter is to thoroughly explain what the quote means and why it is relevant to their thesis. In addition, they will need to include possible counterarguments. Once again, this is a process in which we will work on step by step.

**Reading-** This May, fifth graders will dive into some deep reads! In our ALPS single subject class, the William and Mary Patterns of Change unit will conclude with discussions and projects centered on the novel <u>Wednesday Wars</u>. In guided reading groups students will continue and complete their novels and activities, as well as read some nonfiction books. Our May StoryWorks magazine has some intriguing reads about one child's experience in a Japanese internment camp, paired texts on saving African animals and a fiction story about a homework completing robot. Fifth grade is making a splash with some great reads this May!

**Math -** During Unit 9, all students will revisit geometry by analyzing what makes shapes different. Students will classify plane figures, or two-dimensional shapes, by their attributes. They will be able to sort shapes into a hierarchy of categories according to the properties they share.

Mrs. Willison's and Ms. Rohbaugh's class will be completing the M3 unit "Funkytown Fun House." In this unit, the focus will be around the Funkytown Fun House in which Stretch the Clown resides. Students will be introduced to the terms similarity and congruence. They will learn that for two figures to be similar, their corresponding side lengths must be in proportion and their corresponding angles must be congruent. Students will also learn that all congruent figures are similar, but not all similar figures are congruent.

Mr. Mawhinney's and Mrs. Coopersmith's class will be completing the M3 unit "Record Makers and Breakers." In this unit, students will be using actual Guinness Book World Records to analyze change. Students will also learn about algebra as a set of concepts tied to the representation of relationships through words, tables, and graphs. They also learn about algebra as a style of mathematical thinking for formalizing patterns in change.

**Social Studies** - We will wrap up the year by learning about the Constitution Convention and how the U.S. Constitution helped to establish the government we have today. We will be looking at each of the three branches of government and the Bill of Rights.

Science – We will finish the year with our last unit: "A Perfect Place." In this unit students will learn that in any particular environment certain plants and animals survive well, while others cannot survive at all. They will identify and explain the features and behaviors of plants and animals that make them suited for certain environments and analyze what would happen if their environment was changed. The unit will conclude with students creating and naming an imaginary animal with real animal adaptations. For example, the animal may have wings, poison, and the ability to camouflage. Students will write an article about their animal and explain the advantages of the adaptations.

**Philadelphia**- Our trip to Philadelphia will be on Wednesday, May 31<sup>st</sup>. This trip will be an extended day trip. We will be leaving school promptly at 7:00 am and returning around 8:00 pm. A reminder will go home with students a week prior to the trip about when they need to be here and what they will need to bring.

**Projects-** The fifth graders will be completing two projects this month. One will be the "Science of Sound" project for Mrs. Humphrey in music and the other will be the state float project for Mrs. Brockman in media.

We are so proud of how far the students have come since the beginning of the year and we know that they will continue to make Windsor Farm proud in middle school. We hope you all have a great summer and will see all of our students and their families at promotion on June 8<sup>th</sup>.


