



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

15th Sunday Ordinary Time Year B July 11, 2021

"Your mission, Christian, should you choose to accept it....." Jesus is giving mission instructions today for His apostles. Notice He sends them in pairs, each having a spiritual partner (prayer-buddy) and gives them His 'authority'. They are going out in His Name, so their credentials are 'His presence'. He is actually the 'third' in each pair of apostles. They are to do what Jesus does, and say what Jesus says. Yet, most strikingly, they are commanded not to take any supplies-only a walking stick and sandals on feet. "No food, no sack, no money in their belts... no second tunic" (Mark 6:8-9) What? Here is Jesus' real mission to them: Will they trust Jesus to provide all that they need in their mission work? Any gain from this mission project will not be counted in the number of converts or other Christian bases opened, but rather whether the faith of the apostles' is stronger and deeper after their work. If their trust is deep and clear to others, then that faith will preach itself! For the people they meet along the way, the real credential of their work is the very 'presence of Jesus Himself'. Can they carry Him in all of their interactions? If they can, then everything will be provided. To me, any effective mission of Jesus is one of 'witness' and 'presence'. Imagine what it must have been like to encounter these apostles: they show up suddenly in your town, filled with joy, getting by on nothing, and telling wondrous stories of Jesus (God made man) and the life changing effect He has upon people. They can calm wild spirits and bring peace to every situation, but they aren't 'pressure-selling' anything and don't intrude obnoxiously into local politics. They speak simply about the 'Kingdom of God', and they live every day giving God glory and loving all neighbors. They don't have any salesman's bag of tricks like glossy brochures or promotional gifts. The apostles only have the Name of Jesus and His 'Presence of Peace'. As people of hope, they embody Jesus' teaching to trust God to meet our every need, like Jesus had said in Luke 12:29-30 "As for you, do not seek what you are to eat and what you are to drink, and do not worry anymore. All the nations of the world seek for these things.... Instead, seek his kingdom, and these other things will be given you besides." So often, our stressful striving for what we think will bring us peace, only brings us more grief. Jesus alone, brings the contentment and long-view perspective we need to make it through whatever we face. It is only the 'presence of Jesus' that can meet such needs. Hearing Jesus' mission command makes me think how perfectly Peter fulfilled it in the wonderful story of the Acts of Apostles 3:6, when he met a crippled beggar and said, "I have neither silver nor gold, but what I do have I give you: in the name of Jesus Christ the Nazorean, rise and walk." We can only guess that such similar good work is accomplished in every apostolic mission. But again, I am most struck by the simplicity of Jesus' command. It is as if Jesus just wanted the apostles 'out there' among people as a different force that is positive and prayerful, not looking to get anything out of anyone, but just doing good, helping people however one can. And when asked the reason for such a different way of living, they say, 'I come in the Name of Jesus'. I am sure people asked them, "Why are you doing such good work? You have got nothing-How are you happy?" The apostles commented, "It is Jesus: He gave me peace- a second birth into fuller life!" Such joyful trust and simple living that the apostles reflected, had to make an impression on anyone they encountered. Yet, I also love how Jesus taught them that even if such different life didn't make an impression on people, then move on. If you are rejected, keep your peace and keep on witnessing. There's no vengeful stand to make or condemnatory prophecy to proclaim over anyone who rejects you. Just smile, shake it off and keep going. Even in your departure from them, witness and share the 'presence' of Christ. We just heard last week in Mark 6:3 about Jesus' own hometown rejecting Him. How did He respond? He picked up (no, not rocks to throw!) Himself after being put down, and moved on fresh to some new good work: he didn't stand and argue, or throw back insults or demand hometown privileges over them. No, He moved on, and thank Him He did, as He eventually came upon us. Jesus' mission is always larger than any one 'tussle' or 'turf'. And since we can imagine that all of Jesus' and the apostles' words and actions were scrutinized so deeply I bet how they handled rejection may have had positive effect for Jesus. People may have reconsidered their view of Jesus and Christians by how the apostles handled being put down. It is not a stretch for me to imagine that even the 'letdown' afterward was another 'opportunity' to reach out to them. I think about the debater who said to his opponent after getting put in his place in an argument that, 'You have such a fine way of beating me in debate--I don't mind being bested at all by you because you do it with such grace!" Even in rejection, we may influence someone for Jesus! Persecution is an opportunity to share love and grace with the persecutor (right in line with Jesus' teaching, to "Love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you" (Matt 5:44). Even your persecutor is in need of a Savior (ask St Paul)! Peace, Fr Brian
